But, if like us you do not see yourself as a poet, perhaps Mark Twain's view of April is closer to your experience.



Spanner in the works at The Mill

Engineers from Poke Spanner Research, testing revolutionary techniques in geothermal imaging, have uncovered what is believed to be evidence of an 11th century monastic building in the grounds of The Mill Arms. Early investigations have revealed the possible use of building techniques thought until now only to have been used in England since Grand Designs first appeared on Channel 4.






SNIPPETS FROM THE PAST



From the minutes of the Annual Meeting of Mottisfont Parish Council dated 18 Oct 1982, Chairman, Mr A Sykes: "The Clerk reported that the County Surveyor had arranged for improvements to the sight lines at the Bentley

Bends to be included in the work improvements for the current financial year.

"The National Trust felt that 'Residents Only' parking signs in Keepers Lane would not be as effective as one might hope in solving parking problems and hoped that the Parish Council could be persuaded to manage without them. It was decided to take no further action on the matter.

"British Rail would be installing the half barriers at Dunbridge level crossing early in November. The Parish Council had previously approved the work and there had been no objections from residents. Mr Chase requested that the Clerk ensure that the promised work to improve the junction at the Mill Arms would be carried out.

"Donations from the Mottisfont School Fund: At the close of the village school in July 1982, the residue of the School Activities Fund was donated to various organisations in Mottisfont. The Headmaster had kindly sent a cheque for £11-04 to the Parish Council, with the idea that it should form the basis of a fund to provide some kind of memorial to the late Mrs Russell. Mr Pragnell had offered to administer the fund and it was agreed to hand this over to him. It was recommended that the fund should close in three months. when it should be decided what form the memorial should take.

The Village Hall Committee had applied for the £30,000 grant to provide additional toilet and kitchen facilities within the existing brick building."

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Friends.

Last month I mentioned my visit to the Holy Land at Easter, and the incredible variety of Christians from all over the world that were visiting and celebrating at

that time. As Holy Week and Easter are almost upon us- (Easter Day is 8th April), I would like to convey something of the vitality that I found in Jerusalem and the Holy Land.

From all we see on television and in the papers we would imagine the land to be a war torn desert, but far from it, it is a vibrant place, fruitful to the brim with exotic fruits and peoples. More impressive still was the view of the old wall of the City of Jerusalem, and the closeness in proximity of places like the Garden of Gethsemane. There is the incredible variety of well known biblical sites such as the River Jordan, Lake Galilee, the Garden Tomb or the vibrant market places filled with colour and sound.

For me there was something of the Risen Lord in all of these places, indeed we celebrated the Eucharist at the Garden Tomb, (one of the places believed to be where Jesus rose from the dead), and this has stayed with me. Transpose that place of the celebration of the Eucharist from that sunny flower filled garden to the early Easter morning of the celebration of the Eucharist at Bossington at 6.30 am, and again there is something of the incredible mystery of Christ who is omnipresent, and whose unique personality touches something deeply in our souls. He is inimitably present with us as we celebrate the Eucharist and he transposes into us that life giving and enhancing spirit that does away with death, and proclaims life and life in all its fullness.

Please join us during Holy Week and Easter at our churches in the Benefice as we focus again upon the sacrifice, the love and resurrection power of the Risen Lord.




Parish Lunch - another success!




