Having your say - the Parish Plan

Have you thought what you want Mottisfont and Dunbridge to be like in the next few years? Now is your chance to have your say.

In common with over 5,000 other parishes in England, the Parish Council is preparing a plan. With this edition of the Acorn, we have enclosed a coloured sheet that asks for your views on what you think should be in the plan. Some ideas have already been suggested, and you are asked to tick one of three boxes to indicate how important you think each one is. But even more important, we want you to give us your thoughts and ideas. There's a space on the form for these, and you can add another sheet if you want to.

What happens next? Firstly, you are invited to attend a meeting in the Village Hall at 7pm on 16th July to discuss the plan. This will be followed at 7.30pm by the scheduled Parish Council meeting. You can hand in your completed questionnaire then, or give it to a parish councillor at any time, or put it in the "post box" provided in the Village Hall. Alternatively, you can hand it in at the village fete, where all completed questionnaires will be entered into a prize draw. So fill yours in – it could win a prize.

The results of the questionnaires will be published in a future edition of the Acorn. And remember, all the contact numbers for parish councillors are always on the back page. <u>Footpath Map</u> The provision of a Public Footpath Map is being considered, and will be on the agenda for July's meeting.

<u>Noticeboards</u> The existing boards are in need of some attention, and the possibility of a new one in the village centre is being considered (subject to grant aid being available). Estimates are currently being obtained to:

- Replace the Village Hall noticeboard with a new one, relocated at the front of the hall.
- Repair the Dunbridge noticeboard by replacing the perspex and corking the backing.
- Provide a new noticeboard for the village centre (suggested location by The Old Forge).

<u>Highways Issues</u> A site meeting was held recently with Hampshire Highways Officers to discuss and try to progress a number of outstanding maintenance issues, including flooding at the bottom of Hatt Hill, lifting a drain cover in Bengers Lane, the ditch by the Saw Mill entrance, Spearywell Road which needs piping, as well as some capital projects like the extension of the Dunbridge pavement.

<u>Next Meeting</u> Will be held on Wednesday, 16th July, in Mottisfont Village Hall at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend.

The Thomas Dowse Trust

The Thomas Dowse Trust was created to provide people up to the age of 25 years with financial assistance towards educational requirements. The Trust meets four times a year (March, June, September and November) to award grants to those who show a need for financial assistance towards their education, whether it be for Pre-School, School, College or University.

The next Trust meeting will be held in September. All applications for the September meeting must be submitted to the Secretary, Mrs Christine Hoskins, The Old Thatch, High Street, Broughton no later than the end of August. Any application received after this date will be carried forward to the next meeting in November.

If you live in the Benefice of Bossington and Mottisfont and would like to apply for a grant, application forms can be obtained from the church, the village hall or the Secretary.

Dear Friends,

With all the busyness of life it is good in the summer to be able to take time in the rhythm of the week for some rest, a place for a pause. For many this will mean taking a holiday, a break from the everyday routine. A change is as good as a rest the old adage reminds. Another way of often refreshing ourselves is to attend to our prayer lives. In the Medieval Church and even today in the monastic life, a way of refreshment was and is to pray regularly. This gives nourishment to our weary souls.

The Monastic Hours can be explained thus: Vespers (at the end of the day) Compline (upon retiring) Vigils (some time during the night) Matins (at sunrise) Prime (during the first hour of daylight) Terce (at the third hour) Sext (at the sixth hour) None (at the ninth hour) Vespers (at the end of the day)

It is good for us who cannot attend to such a rigorous prayer life to select perhaps just one of these times and use it for our own. Place is also important. Find somewhere you can have some peace. A wonderful place to pray at this time of year is out in the garden or in your favourite place as you walk the dog or go for a cycle ride. You can pray anywhere; it doesn't just have to be in a sacred building.

St. Cyprian (died c.258) said, "One must also pray in the morning, that the resurrection of the Lord may be celebrated by morning prayer. Likewise at sunset and the passing of the day it is necessary to pray. For since Christ is the true sun and the true day, when we pray and ask, as the sun and the day of the world recede, that the light may come upon us again, we pray for the coming of Christ, which provides us with the grace of eternal light... So let us who are always in Christ, that is, in the light, not cease praying even at night. This is how the widow Anna, always praying and keeping vigil, persevered in deserving well of God... Let us who by God's indulgence are recreated spiritually and reborn, imitate what we are destined to be. Let us who in the kingdom are to have only day with no intervening night, be as vigilant at night as in the light. Let us who are to pray always and render thanks to God, not cease here also to pray and give thanks."

Wonderful thoughts!

Here are some useful traditional prayers used in the Monastic Offices: O God, you are my God, I seek you,

my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you,

as in a dry and weary land where there is no water.

So I have looked upon you in the sanctuary, beholding your power and glory.

My soul is satisfied as with a rich feast, and my mouth praises you with joyful lips when I think of you on my bed,

and meditate on you in the watches of the night; for you have been my help,

and in the shadow of your wings I sing for joy. (Psalm 63: 1-2; 5-7)

FREE BUS!

Did you know there's a free bus that runs between Romsey railway station and Mottisfont & Dunbridge station on Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays from 4th May to 28th September? Neither did we!

It has just two other stops: Mottisfont Abbey entrance, and Hillier Gardens entrance, and it takes 35 minutes to get from station to station.

Departures from Romsey railway station forecourt are at 1040, then every two hours until 1640. Departures from Mottisfont and Dunbridge station are at 0935, then every two hours until 1735.

Operated by Test Valley Community Services, the bus is intended to help those arriving by rail to get to the Abbey and Hillier Gardens. Their leaflet states "The Bus is free to everyone".
