AWBRIDGE FIRST RESPONDERS: MORE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

The role of Awbridge First Responders is to attend when requested to do so by the Ambulance Service. Dunbridge is very much part of the area we are asked to cover, and we were called out to Dunbridge in February and to Mottisfont in December, even though Mottisfont is not officially our area. We currently have only one Responder in Dunbridge, and would dearly like more in this area.

We try to cover as many hours as we can. Most nights are covered, but there are gaps in the school holidays. Can you help us fill these gaps? The age requirements for a Responder are 18-75. The basic training takes place at the Ambulance Headquarters in Winchester, and lasts for 2 days. The induction dates for this year are the following weekends: 29-30 March, 26-27 April, 24-25 May, and 28-29 June.

The training is thorough but not too onerous. Responders are intended to compliment, not replace, the Ambulance Service or Paramedics. Many see the most rewarding part of being a Responder as providing reassurance to people who are alone and vulnerable. Our local knowledge ensures we can respond quickly to a call, and help guide the ambulance to the correct address. Awbridge First Responders has been active since October 2006, and has responded to 60 calls to date. We want to continue helping, but need more people to volunteer and become part of the group. The minimum requirement is 2 shifts per month, and we need cover during both day and night. If you are interested in becoming a Responder, our next meeting is on Thursday, 13th March, at 7.30pm in the Awbridge Village Hall. Alternatively, contact Kay Murrant on 340289.

This year the UK Operation Christmas Child (OCC) campaign exceeded expectations by sending over 1.3 million boxes to some of the poorest children in Eastern Europe and Liberia. 70,175 of these boxes were sent directly from our Eastleigh warehouse.



Did you know that OCC is not the only campaign Samaritan's Purse is involved with? We work on many fronts to help those in the need around the world. This year we are particularly focusing on our *Turn on the Tap* appeal which aims to raise £500,000 to help water projects in countries such as Mozambique, Ethiopia, Swaziland and Sudan.

The Broughton and Mottisfont Village Bus Committee has reluctantly had to increase fares from 1st April 2008, to take account of increasing costs – particularly maintenance costs and fuel prices which have gone up by more than the rate of inflation since the current fares were established last year. The new fares will be as shown below. Remember – your FarePass is valid on these scheduled journeys.

For Group Hire the charge has increased to £1.50 per mile. The Committee wishes to point out what a favourable rate this is for local community groups. Fill the bus and it works out at less than 10p per mile per passenger.

The Thomas Dowse Trust



Dear Friends,

There are plenty of Godly happenings taking place in our Benefice at the moment, and some are aimed at fresh expressions of worship and outreach, welcoming new people to our churches, and those who are interested in exploring the Christian Faith.



As well as our usual worship, we have introduced on the first Sunday of each month a 10.00am service of worship at St Mary's, Broughton, called Open Door. This service brings into the parishes a new type of worship with vocalists and musical instruments accompanying the worship. The March Open Door's theme will be entitled "Called, Challenged, and Commissioned". The first service last month was well supported, and we hope to see lots of people coming on the 2nd March.

We have also introduced a once a month breakfast on the second Saturday of each month at the Tally Ho pub in Broughton at 8.30am and finishing promptly by 10.00am. Working with Broughton School we are to introduce a regular school assembly, which will be happening in St Mary's Church. Our first assembly will be happening on 26th March at 10.30am. All are welcome from any of the villages, especially the parents and families of the children.

Amidst all of these things we are also reminded of our Lenten calling to take up something extra for God. Perhaps this may be taking more time for prayer or reading the bible or attending the Wednesday Meditations focusing on the Lord's Prayer. Even if you have missed most of these we still have the beauty of the Holy Week Liturgy to experience, with a Maundy Thursday Holy Communion at St Mary's at 7.30pm. This is the service that marks what is known as the beginning of the Paschal Triduum. In the three days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday we move through Christ's passion, culminating in destroying death and restoring our risen life. It begins with the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday with foot washing, a symbol of loving service, then on to Good Friday's deeply moving meditations at 2.00pm at St Mary's Broughton, focusing on the Cross, or the 10.00am Family Service at Houghton. Then the glory of the Resurrection on Easter Morn, celebrated throughout the Benefice, the first Easter Day Service will take place at Bossington Airfield at 6.30.am.

Details of the place, day and timings of the services can be found in this publication. Please join us as we liturgically and spiritually accompany Christ through the Passion to the glory of the Easter Resurrection.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



The Neighbourhood Watch Association has passed on some useful advice, well worth taking note of:

From 21st May 2008 Hampshire Constabulary will be working in conjunction with Hampshire Trading Standards Service on a joint project to tackle doorstep crime. You may be aware that there are considerable links between distraction burglars and certain rogue traders, particularly builders, UPVC window fitters, Tarmacadam layers and gardeners who look for business on the doorstep.

Please be extra vigilant and report anything that may be suspicious (people or vehicles), or indeed if any stranger calls at your home uninvited, offering to do work. Please keep an eye out for vulnerable neighbours, too. Incidents should be reported to Trading Standards on 0845 603 0081, or to the Police on 0845 045 4545.

We have also had reports of cards being put through letter boxes saying that a delivery company has tried to deliver a parcel, but it gives a premium rate phone number to call to re-arrange delivery.
