From the Village Hall Committee, thanks again for making the Village Fete a great success!

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Hatt Hill Footway: Having attended our village fete last month, our County Councillor Michael Woodhall saw for himself the number of people that walk up Hatt Hill to our Village Hall. He has now agreed to meet Andrew Simmonds to discuss this project, and has stated that there is no reason why this could not be done in the foreseeable future. The Parish Council remain hopeful!

Village Centre Speed Limit: This should have been implemented during September.

Traffic Calming in the Village Centre: This has been delayed due to a set back in obtaining funding. An application has now been put in for a Test Valley Borough Council Small Scale Environmental Initiative grant, so hopefully we will soon know if we can get this project off the ground.

Village Hall: The repair of "the crack" is scheduled for September so hopefully this is now done. Also both the external and internal painting of the hall will take place in the coming year.

Noticeboards: Applications to Hampshire County Council have been made for funding for the replacement of our existing two boards at Dunbridge and outside the Village Hall, and an additional new board for the village centre.

Station Parking: The car park is due to be re-marked to provide more spaces and to relocate the disabled space away from the entrance gate onto the Romsey-bound platform.

Next Meeting: due to be held on Wednesday, 19th November, in Mottisfont Village Hall at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome to attend.

PARISH PLAN CONSULTATION: RESULTS

In the July Acorn, we enclosed a questionnaire asking you what you thought were the priorities for the parish. The response was very good – over 50 questionnaires were completed representing a third of the households in the parish. The full results are on the parish website www.ukvillages.co.uk/village/Mottisfont-Hampshire.

The things you put at the top of your list were: dealing with flooding at Lockerley Road and Bengers Lane; supporting the Village Hall and its events; and working with the Police to maintain a dedicated rural officer. The top three were followed by the need to create a footpath by the station on Barley Hill; retaining the Dunbridge allotments; and reducing the speed limit on the B3084 to 30 mph. You also thought that working with the National Trust and housing associations to improve tenanted housing was a high priority.

The Parish Council will be sending these results to our County and District Councillors and we will use your views to support our case for action. They will then be included in the next draft of the Parish Plan. More news about that will come in a future edition of the Acorn.



MOTTISFONT & DUNBRIDGE W.I.

At the September meeting, Andrew Hawkins, a speaker for the Hampshire and I.O.W. Air Ambulance, gave a detailed talk on the valuable work they undertake. Their helicopter, which is leased and based at Thruxton, is far better equipped than a road ambulance, carrying drips, defibrillators, spinal boards, drugs, and incubators.

It costs £80,000 per month to operate the service, so fund-raising is vital and provided by donations. Andrew appealed for old mobile phones, used computer ink cartridges and asked that we put any unwanted clothes and fabrics into the yellow recycling bins based locally.

Several members are hoping to attend the Autumn Council meeting at the Anvil, Basingstoke, on Wednesday, 22nd October. The speakers are Rhys Jones, young explorer extraordinaire who has conquered the highest peak on each of the seven

continents, and Anne Musto, an explorer from the other end of the age spectrum, who cycled round the world on retirement and just could not stop.



The first round matches of the group skittles tournament will take place at 7pm on Wednesday, 29th October, at Wellow Golf Club. Six teams will enter this year, and a delicious supper is available for members and spectators.

Let's Face the Music and Dance - a return to Irving Berlin at the playhouse in Salisbury is planned for an outing later in the year.

The next meeting on Tuesday, 14th October, at 8pm at the Village Hall, sees a welcome return to Stuart Wineberg, who will talk about Scuba Diving. Who knows, this could be an activity members could enjoy!

Dear Friends,

“Stop storing up treasures for yourselves on earth, where moths and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal. But keep on storing up treasures for yourselves in heaven, where moths and rust do not destroy and where thieves do not break in and steal, because where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” (Luke 12:33-34)



I think this text is so relevant at the moment with the financial markets in turmoil. Let's face it, even if we don't have huge amounts stored away in stocks and shares, we all have worries over our pensions and other investments - all are affected by the Credit Crunch. According to some scientists, worrying could actually be genetic. There's a certain gene that has both a short and a long version. People with the short version are more prone to fear and anxiety. People with the long version seem to not worry as much. Now, are you worrying that you have the shorter version? Jesus says that we should not place worry at the forefront of our thinking. No, we should place faith in God first, then all else will follow. This doesn't mean we don't do anything about our situation. Rather it means we take action prayerfully, then will follow other action to put things right.

This really works; try it when things are getting you down. Take some time with one of the psalms. Jesus said, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."

Safer Neighbourhoods Beat Report

A recent edition of the Safer Neighbourhoods Beat Report contains the following advice about reporting incidents:

"However unimportant you think things may be, if it causes you to think, should I call the police, then please do. Many people get on with their lives not reporting little things that are causing them problems until, that day when they explode and call the police about all the trouble they have been having over the past weeks and months and nothing is being done about it! The problem is that if you don't report these things to the police then as far as we are concerned, everything is fine. Conversely, if things are reported, it enables us to identify a potential problem and act upon it.

"Reports to the police highlight a problem in the early stages so it can be dealt with. You can report incidents on 0845 045 45 45 or 101 or call into Romsey police station. In an emergency dial 999."

LOCAL HISTORY GROUP: PIPELINE PRESENTATION

There will be a Talk and Slide Show on how the new gas pipeline between Barton Stacey and Lockerley was laid. This will be held at Mottisfont and Dunbridge Village Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday, 22nd October. The talk will be given by one of the Project Managers, who will explain why the pipe line is needed, what it will be used for, and how they and their contractors, Land and Marine Nacap, carried out the job, e.g. drilling under the railway and rivers, and putting the fields back together. There will also be a chance to ask questions, such as will it mean we will get gas in the village?

The evening will start with a short film on laying the 1972 gas pipeline, followed by a brief talk by the

Hampshire & IOW Air Ambulance on how they support large engineering projects. This will be followed by the talk and slide show on the new pipeline.

Entrance is £2 and will include refreshments. Proceeds go to the Air Ambulance.
