



## Exclusive! Major roadworks planned for Dunbridge

After extensive efforts by the Acorn's investigative journalist, codenamed Rockface, we can exclusively reveal plans being developed to implement a new road layout in Dunbridge. A new roundabout and raised section of road will speed traffic past the dangerous junction outside the Mill Arms and over the trains on the railway lines below.

A Council spokesman said, "This is a junction in need of attention. The new layout will give the planning and building control departments something to do during these recessionary times."

Andrea and Ian, Landlords of the Mill Arms, said, "No worries." When pressed further, they did concede that having traffic pass at bedroom window height with no apparent way into the car park might not be good for business.

Construction of the new road will involve the compulsory purchase of some land adjacent to the railway tracks. A Dunbridge resident, who wished to remain anonymous, said, "I've often wondered what was going to happen to that bit of land since I was a nipper."

The Council has confirmed that subject to a few further approvals, work on the scheme should begin in exactly a year, on 1st April, 2010.

## MOTTISFONT PARISH COUNCIL

**Village Hall** – The Parish Council is pleased to announce that it has been awarded a whopping £7,769 lottery fund “Awards for All” grant. This is to cover internal and external painting and the provision of a new oil tank. Work can now commence shortly to give the Village Hall its final spruce up following completion (at last!) of works to deal with “the crack”. Thanks go mainly to Jacquie who did the research and most of the work to secure this very welcome sum.

**Village centre speed limit** – Now the 30mph speed limit has been implemented, the Parish Council would like the message reinforced and have recently held discussions with Hampshire Constabulary’s Safer Roads Partnership team. The team has agreed to provide a more frequent police presence in the village, and to look at doing some speed checks. A site has been suggested, and they are currently looking at its feasibility.

**Village centre traffic calming** – Grant aid has now been secured from both Hampshire County Council and Test Valley Borough Council, but unfortunately it is £1000 short of the amount the Parish Council requested. This will be considered further at the meeting on 31st March.

**Noticeboards** – Two new noticeboards are currently being constructed by Fred Dowling, and will soon be erected – one to replace the board outside the Village Hall, and a new one in the village centre. Again, these are being funded mainly by grant aid, so thanks to Michael Woodhall,

our County Councillor, who awarded us this Members grant. We had hoped also to replace the Dunbridge Board, but the grant did not stretch this far. So thanks go to Stuart, who did a brilliant job at renovating this one at minimal cost.

**Annual Parish Meeting, Wednesday 15th April** – Please come along to this, your parish meeting. New for this year we have a guest speaker. Alison Evans, the National Trust manager, will be talking about the plans for Mottisfont Abbey and Estate. This is also your opportunity to find out what your Parish Council and other representatives have been doing and are planning, and to have your say. You will be welcome to raise any issues or concerns, or ask any questions of the Parish Council and guests. After the meeting there will also be the opportunity for informal networking over a glass of wine or fruit juice. So if you are a regular, please put the date in your diary. If you have never been before, make this a first – you will be very welcome.

**Change of clerk** – a fond farewell from Frances, who is resigning on 31st March, and a big welcome to Sue Holder, who is taking over from 1st April. Sue, I am sure, will have plenty to say in future editions!

Dear Friends,

April is a glorious time of the year especially in the Test Valley as nature begins to stir and new life shoots forth from the earth bringing the promise of long days and warmth and the end of winter. It is also significantly the conclusion of Lent, with the Message of Easter and Resurrection! We all are in need of this change after a poor summer last year, a hard winter, and added to this the difficult economic climate.

Therefore on Easter Morning the Church proclaims Rejoice, heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God's throne! Jesus Christ, our King, is risen! Sound the trumpet of salvation! These are the words we will use at the early morning service at Bossington Airfield as the dawn breaks and we celebrate again the wonderful victory of Christ's life over death.

But before these words can be used, we will enter what is known as The Easter triduum, marking the days of Jesus' passion and resurrection, and it is the most important time in the church year. It begins with the evening Communion of Maundy or Holy Thursday, travels through Good Friday and closes on Easter Sunday.

Prepared by the days of Lent, Christians celebrate on these holiest of days the saving work God has accomplished in Christ. From these events remembered, so sorrowful and so joyful, the church learns the deepest lessons. In rites and words, the mysteries of Jesus' final hours are with us again, his passion, his cruel suffering, his rising from the dead. And we discover the answer to the age old questions: Does God love us? Is God merciful? Does God care for us? We have only to look and learn from Jesus Christ. These are days for fixing

our eyes on the holy mystery of his cross and filling our ears with the words of his gospel. Nowhere else does God's love appear so vividly. In the love Christ showed for a sinful world we find the beginning of our church, the source of our sacraments, the key to understanding the human story, and our hope for eternal life.



I hope you will be able to join with us at our varying services engaging in the liturgy and worship of our churches throughout the Benefice so that on Easter Morning you too will be moved to say with us as we light the Easter Candle "The light of Christ, Thanks be to God!" Jesus Christ is risen, he is risen indeed Alleluia!

## Women's World Day of Prayer and St. Mary's Prayer Day

What a weekend for Broughton! Our lovely Church is steeped full of prayer from the countless worshippers who have prayed there over the years, and yet on the weekend of the 6/7th March there were even more prayers to add.

The Women's World Day of Prayer is a global, ecumenical movement of informed prayer, and prayerful action, which is organised by Christian women who call for a Day of Prayer on the first Friday in March each year. The service is written by a different country each time, and that country becomes the focus of the world's prayers on the day chosen. It begins as dawn breaks over the islands of Tonga in the Pacific, and continues across each continent until the last services of this special day are held back in the Pacific, on the islands of Samoa, and prayer has encircled the world for 36 hours.

It is a privilege to be able to take part in this and St. Mary's Church enjoyed a beautiful interdenominational service on Friday, written by the independent state of Papua New Guinea, 96% of whose residents are Christian, in a population of 5.8 million. At St. Mary's Church we were joined by ladies from Lockerley, and although our numbers were fewer this year, we had a lovely time of fellowship followed by refreshments. If you missed this year, why not put the first Friday of March in the back of your diary, ready to transfer into your new

one next year, and join this special service.

### St. Mary's Prayer Day

In the previous two years St. Mary's has held a Prayer Day, a time to visit the Church at a time convenient to you and pray with differing types of prayer. This year on Saturday, 7th March, the Church was open again for people to explore prayer. After coffee we were given a talk by David Foster, who unravelled the ways of Intercessions. The new room in St. Mary's was 'full of silence' and yet full of meaning, as we prayed in this way together, and I am sure our prayers will be enriched by this experience. It was good that this year's Prayer Day was so well attended. We had prayer and fellowship as some had never experienced before. We learnt a lot which we will be able to use in the future. And we enjoyed coffee and lunch together. What a lovely day! Our thanks to our Rector Ron who organised this for us.
