



TRAIN SERVICES AFFECTED BY WORKS AT SOUTHAMPTON

TRAIN services from Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station will remain unchanged for at least another year. South West Trains' new timetable comes into force on December 13, but there will be no alterations on this line in the foreseeable future.

However, whilst Network Rail is carrying out major engineering work on the Southampton Tunnel between 5th December and 10th January, some delays and re-timing of services between Southampton and Salisbury can be expected. A special timetable will be issued for this period. This will affect services calling at Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station. Buses will replace trains between Southampton Central and Eastleigh stations on 5, 6, 12, 13, 19 and 20 December, when the tunnel will be closed completely. Trains will be restricted from using the tunnel at other times too, and there will be no train services on the rail network at all on Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Next year, new passenger information help points are due to be installed at Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station, and dot matrix signage at Romsey Station, as part of a parcel of planned improvements along the Salisbury-Romsey-Southampton line.

PARISH COUNCIL

At the November Parish Council meeting, Cllr. Simmonds reported that under the Traffic Management Programme Update 2009/10 for the Test Valley, the review of the 40mph speed limit on the B3084 was mentioned, and the initial preparatory work had been completed. The review of the speed limits on A and B class roads, in accordance with Department for Transport Circular 01/2006 was complete, and the prioritising of roads was commencing. It was also reported that the Kimbridge Lane bridge repairs were complete, and the road resurfacing is scheduled for December 2009. Regarding Bengers Lane, the drainage and resurfacing work has been rescheduled for January 2010.

The Parish Council has resolved to offer a contract for the village hall external lighting to Coastline Electrical. The cost quoted to supply and wire the external

lighting is £880.00 plus VAT, and the cost quoted to remove the old, and supply a new consumer unit is £747 plus VAT. In addition, the Parish Council resolved to place an order with Barker and Geary for a replacement gate.

It was reported that the replacement notice board at the village hall was ready, and the National Trust has agreed to a second notice board on the wall of The Old Forge, which will replace an existing map board.

The Parish Council would also like to remind landowners of their responsibility to keep footpaths clear.

The date of the next meeting is 13th January, 2010. Everyone is welcome.

THE VILLAGE PANTO

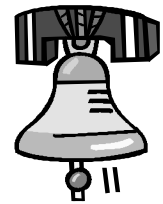
A review by Maisie Lake, aged 9 and 3 quarters.

Dear Friends,

Christmas is almost upon us, and we shall be bombarded with piped carols and Christmas number one's for weeks on end. But where in all of this is the truth behind this great festival of Christmas? Well, perhaps it is in the wonderful words of Mary in the Magnificat, "My soul tells out the greatness of the Lord" Or as the angels declare, "Fear not: for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy." (Lk 2:8-10)

To put the two together is to say "My soul tells out the greatness of the Lord, for he brings glad tidings of great joy". This is the true Christmas message: do not fear, but imbibe his love and recognise his eternal truth and presence.

The wonder, the overwhelming wonder of Christmas, its enduring magic and mystery, is this astounding reaching out of the love of God to the world and to each one of us. To enter the Church of the Nativity at Bethlehem, the doorway is so low that you have to stoop to enter. The baggage which

all of us carry, of status, pride and possessions, must be left behind if we are to come and adore the child in the manger. Our God is not an autocrat, a powerful tyrant, like a Roman emperor or a Victorian headmaster, though sadly the Church (and for some people their own families), have distorted God in this way, Our God is a God who, as St. Paul says, "empties himself", "makes himself nothing", stoops down to the lowest part of our need. He comes into the world in a filthy, dung-ridden cave for cattle. His family flee from massacre and terror to be asylum seekers in Egypt. He is among the outcast and the marginalized, and at the end he dies an excruciating death between two thieves outside the holy city, condemned by religious leaders and political power brokers alike. "He humbled himself", made himself nothing, and of him we dare to say, yes, here is God. We call it 'incarnation', the enfleshing of God, God taking our nature upon himself. The Creator in a free outpouring of re-creating love for a

world gone wrong, for human beings who think themselves little gods, for men and women enslaved to greed or drugs or distorted desire, comes down to the lowest part of our need. And why? That we may find in that love "so amazing, so divine" the very thing for which we were made, that which reaches out to change and transform us, to draw us to share in that love, to become Christlike, to be even, as St Peter tells us, "partakers of the divine nature"?

Please join us, bring all that you are, all your concerns, and all your thanksgivings to our Christmas services, and join with us as we celebrate the casting out of fear and the gift of faith in the new Born King!

Action for Youth in Romsey Deanery

Schools work. There are significantly improved relationships with some secondaries. Ongoing at Test Valley is the chance to help run a Christian Union with a Year 11, all of which happened after being invited in to talk on adoption and abortion to a Year 10 class. This was spontaneous and scary, with no preparation, but led to a good result that is now awaiting follow up.

Even more exciting, after a prayer breakfast, is a games, food and ideas afternoon to be held near Mountbatten school on the last day of term in December. The purpose of this will be to ask the young people who come whether they would like a Christian Union and how they want to go about setting it up. Obviously, I would be there to advise and instruct. There are possibilities about getting in to Romsey school via the primary school, and getting into the private schools I think will be about contacts and networking. I am getting there, and well on the way to being a visible presence.

I have visited most churches/parishes/benefices and discovered people, locations and names. It is a huge deanery, but what a wealth of opportunity. I have been to Romsey youth groups regularly, and I have led successful sessions on God as Father and as Shepherd, have been present at Rownhams youth groups, open and cell (Pizza Lovers for Christ), and have met with their leaders. I will be visiting the church

on a Sunday soon. I have visited North Baddesley to see their Youth Alpha group (with an excellent young leader) and Sunday service, and will be going to their coffee shop next year. I have spoken on 'Highs and Lows' at the Kings Somborne 'Alive' service, and seen (and spoken or been introduced at) Awbridge, Bossington, Broughton, Mottisfont, Longstock, Stockbridge, Timsbury, Michelmersh, Lockerley, Sherfield English, and many other places since I started. I am finishing off my visiting rounds possibly by the end of January, and then the task of tying up these connections will truly begin!

It is an amazing area, with so many diverse styles – from Matins at some, to family worship at others! An idea for some future plans for next year that Pete Maidment (Diocesan Youth Officer for Winchester Diocese) and myself have had is to focus on training more. He has some course materials in mind that would benefit inexperienced and new youth workers, but also the more experienced ones, who either may be running out of ideas or time or even both! There is one course, Growing Leaders, which I have done training in myself. That was very useful. There is a youth version of it that will be great for a younger audience.

Plus, very simply, I am starting to meet youth workers and helpers to discuss their vision and see where they feel God is taking them, their

youth and the churches within their ministry. I believe that part of my role will indeed be encouraging smaller churches to network with larger ones, and vice versa, and to link up with activities and events. I also think that visiting communities and people where they are, seeing the context they work in and with, is vital too, because not everyone is able to travel, and we all need help and ideas for our individual locations. This is starting to happen now with paid and unpaid volunteers, and I feel so comfortable doing it. This is what my job is about, and completely what I am here for. As you should feel part of my role, I hope you will see how potentially useful this could be.

I guess another side of my role is to discover what happens in churches, and to make them aware of what goes on in the rest of the deanery. Then, training will be useful for all, and I can advertise, particularly for training and big events like 10-10-10 (see notes to follow!), increased provision and better opportunities, linking and meeting up so that young people can find church communities they want to belong to and are comfortable with. Then they may just start inviting their friends to experience the same! Please pray for me, the deanery and the young people we work for and with.

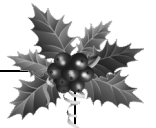
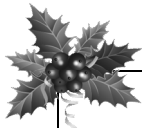
