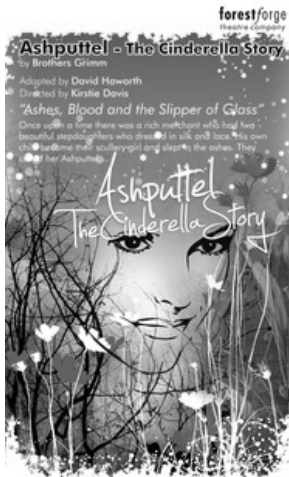

PARISH COUNCIL

At the September Parish Council meeting, Cllr. Simmonds reported that Hampshire County Council (HCC) had acknowledged receipt of our request for the speed limit review on the B3094, and that our request would be passed to their consultant, Mott Gifford, who is undertaking a countrywide review of 'A' and 'B' road speed limits on their behalf. The B3084 is in the amber category of risk, and no firm commitment could be given at this stage as to the timing of the review, other than to confirm that the entire programme is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2011. Hampshire Highways had no policy of providing chicanes.

Cllr. Simmonds also reported a new HCC pilot scheme to introduce a Parish Lengthsman*. HCC will pledge £10,000 to be split between 10 villages in Cllr. Gibson's constituency, to go towards hedge cutting, grass cutting, ditch cleaning etc.

It was reported that the new notice boards, to replace old ones around the village, were ready for collection.

An increase in the number of pedestrians in the village was reported.

Alison Evans from the National Trust reported that the National Trust were making plans for new visitor facilities and would welcome comments from the parish council. A meeting has been scheduled to discuss this further.

The PC have discussed the issue of dog mess around the parish woods, fields and paths but it is expensive to put up dog bins and pay for emptying them. Since only a few people and their dogs cause the problem, we don't think it is fair that everyone should have to pay. It is hoped that everyone can make an effort to ensure that at least the footpaths are kept clear, whether along the roadside or across country. It would also be good to support Pat Francis's idea of a poster to alert people from outside our area of the issue (see the article opposite).

The next meeting is on 11th November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Everyone welcome.

CHILDREN - CAN YOU DESIGN A POSTER TO HELP PREVENT DOG MESS IN OUR VILLAGE?

Did you know that in 2008 the UK dog population was estimated to be 7.3 million, with dogs producing approximately 1,000 tonnes of excrement each day? Yes, each day. Imagine what that would be like if it was in one place!

As well as being unpleasant and a nuisance, some very nasty diseases can be contracted from dog mess. Removing it immediately restricts the likelihood of infection. The best way to pick up dog mess is by using a doggy bag and placing it in litter or doggy bins, or taking it home and putting it in an outside bin. Please don't hang doggy bags on trees and in hedges (these are called 'Witches Knickers!').

Unfortunately a lot of people think it doesn't matter if their dogs foul the footpaths in the countryside, but it does matter if they foul an area where grass is being grown for hay or silage, which is used to feed livestock. It's not very nice to tread in either.

Dog mess is a real problem on footpaths in and around

the village, so with the support of the Parish Council I am asking children to design posters asking people to clear up after their dogs.

The posters should be A4 size. Please make them bold and colourful so they attract attention.

This is not a competition, as I hope to use all of the posters, which will be laminated and placed at appropriate places around the village.

Dear Friends,

We enter November with all of its calls for us to remember on differing days in the month. From Guy Fawkes Day comes the old English 17th Century poem which calls us to "Remember, remember, the fifth of November, gunpowder, treason and plot." Yet of course, November causes us to remember for many other reasons, and most especially so 8th November, which is Remembrance Sunday. With our troops daily laying down their lives in Afghanistan, and all those who were killed in Iraq, it is crucial that we take some time to remember the ultimate sacrifice these young men and women are making, and in general remembering all those who have laid down their lives and given the ultimate sacrifice for our country. Please join us for services throughout the Benefice in Broughton, Houghton and Mottisfont on 8th November.



Yet November is also about remembering the incredible Saints of the Church and their beneficial practices, because to remember the heroes of the faith and follow their examples are good things, or as the first Prayer Book of 1549 said, "And here we do give unto thee most high praise, and hearty thanks, for the wonderful grace and virtue, declared unto thy saints". Therefore on 1st November we will be holding a Songs of Praise in All Saints Church in the evening at 6.00pm. All Souls Day follows on 2nd November. Christians have been praying for their departed brothers and sisters since the earliest days of Christianity. Early liturgies and inscriptions on catacomb walls attest to the ancientness of prayers for the dead. Praying for the dead is actually borrowed from Judaism, as indicated in 2 Maccabees 12:41-42. In the New Testament, St. Paul prays for mercy for his departed friend Onesiphorus (2 Timothy 1:18). Early Christian writers Tertullian and St. Cyprian testify to the regular practice of praying for the souls of the departed or, as St. Athanasius said, "Death is a pilgrimage, a lifetime's pilgrimage which none of us must shrink. It is a pilgrimage from decay to imperishable life..." On this date at Houghton Church at 7.30pm there will be a special service to remember those who have died in the Lord.

Please join us for our services in November, and take time to worship and pray and offer thanksgiving.

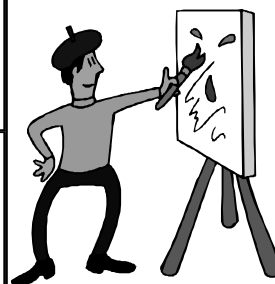

The Thomas Dowse Trust

MOTTISFONT SOCIAL CLUB

After receiving a very good response to the plea for help in last month's *Acorn*, we are pleased to announce that this year's Children's Christmas Party will go ahead on Saturday, 5th December, at 2.30pm. Local villagers Doug Haste and Catherine Jenkins have offered their time and assistance, and will work together with Tracy Holmes of Mottisfont Social Club to organise this year's party.

Mottisfont Social Club fully funds a Christmas Party every year for children affiliated with a member. As you will be aware from last month's *Acorn*, the Social Club is trying to promote a 'Return to Village Life' campaign, and as part of this have offered to open up their party and invite the children of Mottisfont and Dunbridge. In essence, the Social Club have donated their venue and the entertainment, which we are told this year will be done by Professor Potty.

Although the Social Club have agreed to share the venue and the entertainment, there are still some additional costs that need to be covered, such as the children's gifts, crackers, table decorations, etc. We must therefore say a special thank you to the following companies, from whom we have received very generous donations to help with covering these expenses:

- ◆ **Hamptons Tree Care** – A fully qualified and insured arboricultural company based in Winchester.
