



John Pragnell

MOTTISFONT has paid homage to a pillar of the community, John Pragnell, who died in September. Around 100 mourners gathered at St. Andrew's Church in the village to say a final farewell to John who was 88.

The service of thanksgiving for John's life was conducted by the Rector of Mottisfont, the Rev'd Ron Corne and lay Reader Gina Livermore, and included the hymns The Lord's My Shepherd, Lord of all Hopefulness, and Abide with Me. Afterwards John was laid to rest in the village cemetery.

John was a former treasurer at the church and was a Mottisfont Parish Councillor for 31 years. During his two terms as a Parish Councillor, between May 1964 and 1979 and between 1987 and May 2003, John fought for 30mph speed restrictions to be imposed on the village's roads, and other road safety measures to benefit the community. He was also the Parish Council's representative at the Test Valley Association of Parish Councils and St. Andrew's Church.

He was also a former trustee of Mottisfont Social Club and a governor at the old Mottisfont School.

John married his wife Betty at the village church on 9th August, 1947. When he was 14, John worked at the

village shop and bakery, which later became Mottisfont Tea Rooms. He was also village postman for four years, and during his early life John was a gardener at Mottisfont Abbey when it was owned by Mrs. Maud Russell, who handed the property and surrounding estate to the National Trust in 1957.

During the Second World War John did his bit for the nation by working at the Ministry of Food and Ministry of Supply, and he was in the Mottisfont Home Guard. Because of serious illness John was unable to join the forces. After the war John worked at Reed and Mallik, a local construction firm, and prior to his retirement in 1985, he was employed as a clerk at the National Westminster Bank in Romsey.

About 30 years ago John built a crib in the garden of his home in Spearywell Road, and with his wife and family organised annual Christmas carols around the manger. Over the years this raised thousands of pounds for local charities including the Romsey Hospital Appeal Fund.

John is survived by Betty and daughters Brenda and Ann and their families.

MOTTISFONT ABBEY DEVELOPMENT PLANS

The National Trust is planning to improve visitor facilities at Mottisfont Abbey. Alison Evans, General Manager at Mottisfont Abbey, has sent the *Acorn* the following information about the project:

"The project is to create new visitor facilities as the current provision is inadequate. We propose to site them in Abbey Farmyard, to comprise a new visitor reception space, visitor toilets, cafe and shop (relocated from the current site in the stable block), and possibly the volunteer-run second-hand bookshop. It will include a coin-operated pay phone available to everyone (to replace the one that BT have removed from the centre of the village), and the shop could be set up to include a village shop element, selling items

such as milk and stamps, if there is a proven demand.

"The parking that the Abbey Farmyard provides for staff and volunteers would continue. All visitors to the Abbey grounds would enter and exit from the new visitor facilities. In order to do this, there would be a new access path (open to everyone, not just visitors) running from the visitor car park alongside the road but several yards inside the current fenced boundary, to the farmyard.

"I am very grateful to the 35 members of the community who came to our planning consultation workshop on 2nd October. Planning Aid South ran this

LETTER TO THE ACORN

We would like to thank the Trust for giving local residents the opportunity to see, hear and comment on its proposals to redevelop Abbey Farmyard. In that spirit of openness, we would like to explain how some of us feel in our own words, and independently of Planning Aid South.

We welcome the idea of redeveloping the derelict Abbey Farmyard, but we have a number of concerns about the Trust's proposals. One big worry is this: it seems to us the plans will inevitably lead to permanent traffic congestion and nose-to-tail parking in the centre of the village all year-round.

The proposal is that the NT will create a new footpath from the Abbey car park to the new facilities – a shop, restaurant and visitor entrance – in the centre of the village at Abbey Farmyard. The plan is also to open the Bengers Lane gates to provide much shorter access to this area for walkers and cyclists (and, of course, locals). But motorists too will prefer the shortest walk to the new entrance.

The new path is 450m long from the centre of the car park to the visitor entrance. We believe that drivers will be parking on the verges in any or all of the following places: The village green and beyond in Church Lane, halfway up Bengers Lane, up to the field gate on Oakley Road, up to the barrier in Hatt Lane, and the Social Club. All of these would give drivers a shorter walk to the new visitor entrance than parking in the existing car park.

One way to stop fly-parking would be posts and bollards throughout the village centre and beyond; or otherwise yellow lines and parking permits. The problem here is not just creeping urbanisation of our peaceful village; it is also that parking restrictions aimed at 1-day visitors impose a 365-day restriction on locals.

We know that the NT aims to get a larger proportion of visitors away from the June peak. But as long as the rose garden remains a feature at Mottisfont, adding new attractions at the Abbey is only going to add to visitor numbers in the peak months. This already led to an emergency overspill car park in the field behind Dairy Cottage this year. This field is very much closer to the proposed new entrance, shop and restaurant than the existing car park. We are concerned that there would be continual pressure to allow it (or the field off Oakley Road) to evolve into a permanent, non-emergency car park. If that were to happen, the character of the village would be changed irrevocably.

Those of us who were here 20 years ago will remember that the Trust proposed then to locate the main Abbey car park in the field off Oakley Road, with an entrance in the village centre. Residents' objections

then led the NT to locate both the entrance and the car park away from the village centre. If that was the right decision with modest visitor numbers in 1989, it remains even more so now, with ever-greater numbers in 2010 and beyond.

By all means sensitively restore and develop Abbey Farmyard. But the National Trust and the community are jointly the guardians of a beautiful and historic village. We feel that allowing public access to the Abbey from the village centre would destroy the character of the place we are all proud to share with visitors and call home. So please keep the visitor entrance and the car park where they currently are – away from the centre of our beautiful village.
