## PARISH COUNCIL

Police Sergeant Christine Plascott has reported a spate of burglaries within the local area, which usually tend to occur at this time of the year. Due to an improvement in police engagement with the public, detection rates have been high. Garden tools are being used to break into houses, and the police would remind the public to keep tools and sheds locked. Tagged oil is proving useful in detecting stolen oil and the crime prevention officer is available to advise any members of the public with concerns.

Speeding is still a priority for all parishes. Hatt Hill has recently been monitored for speeding with the information still to be analysed.

For anyone interested in Farm Watch they should contact PS Plascott on 0845 045 45 45.

Following the parish consultation day on 2nd October, the National Trust is seeking a formal pre-application opinion on the possibility of locating visitor facilities adjacent to the existing National Trust car park. Once informal guidance has been received from the Test Valley Planning Team, the National Trust will come back to the Parish Council to speak more formally about the

project. They are also looking at a solution to the parking problems that occur in June each year in the rose season, and will report back. The parish council are concerned about a large increase to the number of visitors to the abbey. A vehicle and speed of traffic count will be requested to provide up to date information.

The Parish Council has decided to wait until the May 2011 elections in order to fill the current councillor vacancy. If you are interested in joining the Parish Council, please get in touch for more information on what is involved.

We have requested two salt bins, one for the village centre and one at the junction of Bengers Lane.

A number of incidents have been reported to the council where damage has occurred from Chinese Lanterns. We would ask that you consider the impact of Chinese Lanterns to properties especially thatched houses, animals and forests should you decide to use them.

## MOTTISFONT ABBEY

### **New Visitor Facilities proposals**

Following the very helpful and informative feedback in the autumn from local residents, we are investigating the possibility of moving the proposed new facilities to an alternative location to the Abbey Farmyard - possibly next to the visitor car park, subject to agreement from the Planning authorities, Natural England and the Environment Agency. Meanwhile, we have noted the strong concern expressed by people living around the Abbey Farmyard about the possibility that visitors might park on the road in the centre of the village instead of using the visitor car park. So we'd like to reassure residents that if the alternative location is not feasible and the Abbey Farmyard has to be reconsidered as a location, that we would modify the plans to ensure there is no pedestrian access to the Farmyard from the village. We hope to have news regarding the alternative location by March 2011.

### **New features at the Abbey for 2011**

Visitors are enjoying a new fitness trail around the grounds, which was opened by the Mayors of Romsey and Test Valley and by children from Lockerley Primary School just before Christmas.

We are hard at work taking out the modern counter from our cafe so people can see the Victorian kitchen, and enjoy sitting at the vast wooden table originally designed for this room.

We are also planning exhibitions for a new art gallery space on our top floor, in rooms that have never been open to the public before. The first show will allow us to display pieces from the Derek Hill collection of early 20th-century art with new loans from a London gallery. The summer exhibition explores our enchanted landscape, with original Flower Fairy illustrations and contemporary artists' visions of fairy land.

We're looking for names, stories and photographs of people who worked at Mottisfont and farmed its lands in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, so that we can tell our visitors more about the people who created this beautiful estate. ## MOTTISFONT & DUNBRIDGE W.I.



At our January meeting, members welcomed Margaret Down, who keeps her own sheep, and then spins, dyes and weaves the fleece. She demonstrated how easy it is to pull apart the fleece, but once spun, creates a strong thread. Evidently knitting originated in Arabia about 200 AD, and men did the knitting, with a six year apprenticeship. Woven cloaks have also been found in Peru, dating back 2000 years.

Margaret also dyes her fleece, using natural plants such as nettle, rhubarb leaves, grey lichen, red onion leaves, etc. She demonstrated her hand spindle, spinning wheel and loom, and showed us many items that she had knitted with her own wool. Altogether, a very interesting evening.

Members are looking forward to their annual Dinner at the end of January, and at our February meeting, we welcome Julie Horton and "All That Jazz".

Dear Friends,



Lent this year begins on the 9th March, which is just five weeks away. I wanted to point this out as this year we will be running a Lent Course based on exploring our faith. This Lent Course will be held at Philip and Janet Mutton's home at Yew Tree House in Broughton. We are hoping that we can get a good group together to study faith for the four Wednesdays of Lent starting on Wednesday, 16th March at 7.30pm (finish by 9.00pm). Coffee and nice biscuits are provided, and we hope to feed our souls and our minds as well as look at and ponder God's gift of faith to his people.

Just to remind us, what is Lent? Lent is a forty-day season that initiates the most sacred part of the Christian year. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes on the Great Vigil of Easter. Sundays are not included in the forty-day count because every Sunday is a joyful celebration of our Lord's resurrection. During Lent, Christians meditate on the great paschal mystery -- the salvation God won for us sinners by the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The word Lent is derived from the Old English lencten, which means "lengthen." It refers to the lengthening of the daylight hours that occurs in the northern hemisphere as spring approaches. It is in this period of transition from late winter to early spring that the season of Lent falls. Or we could say that life on this earth, by the breath of the Creator, is renewing and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land.

The duration of the season of Lent is based on the ancient church custom of lencten, and fasting before being baptized on the evening before Easter. This probationary period was called the quarantine (from the Latin word for forty). The

number forty occurs frequently in both testaments of the Bible. It signifies the time that is required for discipline, testing, and separation prior to achieving a goal or new beginning. For example, we read in the Old Testament that it rained forty days and nights during the Great Flood. Moses communed with God on Mount Sinai for forty days before receiving the Ten Commandments. The people of Israel were forced to wander in the wilderness for forty years. Elijah journeyed for forty days before he reached Mount Horeb and had a vision of God, and the inhabitants of Nineveh fasted and repented for forty days in response to the preaching of Jonah. The most outstanding instances of the number forty in the New Testament are the account of Christ's ordeal in the desert fasting, praying, and being tempted by the devil, and His various appearances to the apostles and others between His resurrection and ascension during which He strengthened their faith and prepared them for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

Next month I will explain how worship changes during Lent and what is the meaning of Ash Wednesday.

## PANCAKES WITH RHUBARB & GINGER COMPOTE

Pancake Day isn't until 8th March this year, so there's enough time to get your taste buds ready for something a little different from the usual sugar and lemony treat. This recipe makes about 8-10 pancakes, so plenty for all!

### Ingredients:

100gm of plain flour, sifted  
Pinch of salt  
2 eggs  
225ml of milk (with 50ml of water)  
Butter or oil for frying  
500gm of rhubarb (about 5 stalks), topped & tailed, chopped into small chunks  
100gm of caster sugar  
50ml red wine  
1 tsp ground ginger  
Crème fraiche or ice cream & icing sugar to serve

### How to make it:

Sift the flour and salt into a large bowl. Mix the milk and water together in a jug. Make a well in the flour and break the eggs into it. With a whisk, gradually beat the eggs whilst taking in the flour from the sides of the well. Then add a little at a time the milk and water mixture. Keep whisking until you have a smooth batter. Set aside.

Put the rhubarb chunks into a pan with the caster sugar and add the red wine. Heat until the sugar has been dissolved and then simmer with lid on until the rhubarb softens, adding little water if required. Stir in the ginger and simmer for 1 minute. Remove from the heat and replace the lid to keep the rhubarb compote warm.

To make the pancakes, heat a little butter or oil in a 18cm (7 inch) frying pan. When hot, ladle in some of the batter (about 2-3 tablespoons) and tip the pan from side to side to spread the mixture. Cook for about 30 seconds until the frill at the edges becomes brown. Flip the pancake over and cook on the other side, which should only take a few seconds. Put the pancake on a plate which should be placed on top of a saucepan of gently simmering water to keep warm. Repeat until you have used all the batter and have stack of pancakes.

Place a pancake on a serving plate and spoon some compote into the centre, then fold the pancake into quarters to make a parcel. You can put a couple of pancake parcels on each plate if you wish. Top with a crème fraiche or your favourite ice cream, and dust with icing sugar.

## JUNK MAIL, FAXES AND TELEPHONE CALLS

If you are fed up with receiving junk mail, faxes and unsolicited telephone calls, you can significantly reduce them by registering with one or more of the following services:

**JUNK FAXES** Register with the Fax Preference Service on 0845 0700702 (automated registration), or on their web site:

**JUNK TELEPHONE CALLS** Register with the 'Telephone Preference Service' on 0845 0700707 (automated registration), or on their web site:

<http://www.mpsonline.org.uk/tps/>

Making a Complaint: It is illegal for a company to call anyone registered with the above services. With junk faxes you will already have the printed evidence, but with unsolicited telephone calls, it is

important to record the following information:

- ◆ The date and time you received the call
- ◆ The name of the company
- ◆ The name of the person who spoke to you
- ◆ The address of the company (and, if possible, their telephone number)
- ◆ What they were calling about

**JUNK MAIL** Register with the Mailing Preference Service on 0845 703 4599 (automated registration) or on their web site: [www.mpsonline.org.uk/mpsr/](http://www.mpsonline.org.uk/mpsr/)

The location of all above is at: DMA House, 70 Margaret Street, London, W1W 8SS. Note that it takes some months for your registration to have an effect.

I would strongly advise anyone with vulnerable and/or elderly relatives to make sure they are registered, particularly with the Telephone Preference Service. Unfortunately, being registered does not deter some companies from flouting the rules and cold calling you illegally, because they know that few people will make an official complaint which could result in a prosecution. Therefore, it is very important for registered people to make a complaint. This can be done on-line, or via a complaints form. I have copies of the TPS and MPS complaints forms and I am also happy to assist in completing them.
