

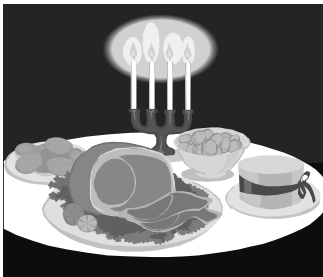

## Parish Council News

### Police Report

On 5th December three dwelling burglaries were reported at East Dean, Wellow and Awbridge during the daytime. Entry was forced, untidy searches followed, and items of jewellery and electrical items stolen. CID is investigating.

Speed enforcement is continuing in the area, and it was agreed that Barley Hill would be included, provided the unit felt it was safe to do so. One in every three cars stopped in Lockerley was fined recently.

Diesel dipping (checking vehicles for red diesel) is on the increase.

### Highways

Following two accidents with large lorries on the B3084 through Mottisfont and Dunbridge, the parish council agreed to contact the Police to see whether there will be a prosecution and will write to the

company whose scrap lorry overturned to request that they find a more suitable route. The council also discussed requesting an 'Unsuitable for HGV, access only' sign by the Duke's Head and at the junction with the A30.

New drains have been installed along Hatt Hill and appear to be working successfully. A bigger drain is still needed at the bottom of the hill. Potholes continue to be reported for repair in the area.

### Precept

The council has agreed not to increase the precept for 2012/13.

### Chinese Lanterns - fire hazard

there are thatched cottages, barns of hay and straw and of course in dry summers to agricultural crops. Please be aware of these risks and consider if these are really a good idea in the countryside.

### Recycling re-locates

Test Valley Borough Council will be moving their glass recycling bins currently situated in the Abbey farmyard to the Social Club car park in the next week or so. They have also decided that as all houses within the village have paper recycling bins they will be removing their paper bin. This move enables the collection lorries better access and therefore manoeuvrability.

## Spearywell Baptist Chapel

In October, a company named Landford Estates submitted a planning application to turn the Baptist Chapel at Spearywell, which has been unused for some years, into a single residence. The parish council decided not to object to the application, but asked for appropriate safeguards for the small graveyard attached to it.

TVBC has subsequently asked for the application to be withdrawn because they would like to see if anyone has an interest in owning or leasing the chapel for continued community use. If nobody comes forward in a reasonable time, the application will be resubmitted and the likelihood is that the chapel will be turned into a dwelling. ### MOTTISFONT & DUNBRIDGE W.I.

At our January meeting we welcomed Mr Peter Davies, Senior Director of Smith Bradbeer & Co Ltd, who gave a talk, with films, on the history of the company. In 1837 Mr. R. S. Smith opened a drapery store in Southampton, and this was the foundation for the next 175 years of the business now trading in Romsey, New Milton, Eastleigh and Hedge End. Mr. Bradbeer entered the business in 1892 and after his death in the 1920s, this passed to Mr. Gwilyn Davies, whose sons and grandsons are still running the Company.



The German bombing of Southampton in 1940 resulted in a direct hit on the premises and in 1963 a devastating fire swept through the Romsey store, but within a month the business had moved into Bell's Furnishing Store in Bell Street. In the early '70s the Romsey Store was extended to almost double its size, and since then many other extensions have been made, including taking over The Dolphin Inn on Market Square and making an alternative entrance where the coaches for the Inn used to enter. The restaurant was extended and a new hairdressing and beauty salon added.

Altogether a very informative and interesting talk on a local company.

Members then had a discussion on the resolutions that will be put forward by the National WI later in the year. We are looking forward to a lunch in February at The Grey Hound in Broughton, and a day trip in June to Oxford, together with many other events. On Tuesday, 14th February we will welcome Mr. S. Williams, who will be talking about "Portraits of Prague". Guests are very welcome.

Are you safe with animals? The next Test Valley Villages Lecture is on Wednesday, 22nd February at 8pm in the Village Hall. The title is "The transmission of diseases from animals to man - getting medics, researchers and vets to talk to each other". Dr Diane Newell, OBE, set up a Europe-wide network of scientists to improve communications between different disciplines in the fight against animal-borne microbes. She has interesting insights into the workings of the EU, the science community, and some of the issues currently facing researchers in the field of disease transmission. Her career has involved work at Porton Down, Southampton University and Southampton General Hospital, and as Director of the European network Med-Vet-Net.

We are fortunate that we can attract such good quality speakers to the lecture series, and the audiences are growing. Where the speakers represent a charity, we offer a donation from the proceeds of the lecture. Dr Newell chairs a local branch of Age UK.

This year we will be welcoming a new Curate for the Benefice and in July, Gillian Nobes will be ordained Deacon in Winchester Cathedral and will be joining me in the ministry of our Benefice, which is another exciting step for the future of our churches.

Please hold our Benefice in your thoughts and prayers.

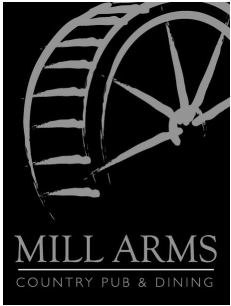

### METAL THEFT



Metal theft has been on the increase for the past five years, but it has now reached epidemic proportions. Lots of scrap metal transactions are in cash. Often, no identification is asked for when a sale is made, and

where a name and address is taken it is invariably fictitious. In one yard, all bar one sale in a month was by M. Mouse or D. Duck.

There is an urgent need for a change to the legislation. The conditions under which scrap metal dealers are licensed must be tightened, with an obligation to install CCTV, inspect and record photo ID of sellers, record details of vehicles used and cease the practice of paying for scrap metal in cash. #### How you can help

- Keep watch for vans and trucks driving around our streets looking for the opportunity to steal metal, and reporting the details to the local police or Crimestoppers (0800 555 111).

- Be aware of workmen removing metal items in the street. The thieves are using uniforms, stolen vans, etc. One witness recently reported that they did not look like real workmen... they were working too fast.

stolen metal is cleaned up, often by burning of the covering, and where the identifying marks are removed before being taken to the licensed dealers. The police and local authorities need to know.

### Recipe of the month: PICCALILLI

This old-fashioned cauliflower pickle has become quite in vogue in recent years and is great served with hams, terrines, cheeses or as part of a classic ploughman's lunch. My version uses shallots, but small pickling onions, cut in half can be substituted if you wish.

#### Ingredients:

100g of sea salt  
1 litre of warm water  
400g of cauliflower, broken into small florets  
300g of cucumber, peeled and diced  
250g of shallots, peeled and quartered (large ones in eighths)  
Half a green pepper, diced  
300ml of white wine vinegar  
150ml of malt vinegar  
1 teaspoon of pickling spice  
25g of plain flour  
1 teaspoon of mustard powder  
1 teaspoon of ground turmeric  
Half a teaspoon of ground ginger  
50g of caster sugar  
125ml of water

#### How to make it:

Dissolve the salt in the warm water and then allow to cool. Place the vegetables in the salted water (brine) and put a plate on top to keep them submerged. Leave them in the fridge for 24 hours.

Next, put the vinegars in a pan with the pickling spices and bring to the boil. Simmer gently uncovered for 15 minutes, then allow to cool. Strain the vinegar into a jug with a sieve and discard the spices. In a small bowl, mix the flour, mustard powder, turmeric, ginger and sugar together. Add a little of the strained vinegar and whisk it into a paste. Gradually add the rest of the vinegar to make a smooth mixture.

In a reasonably large pan (big enough to take the vegetables), transfer the mustard mixture and stir over a low heat until thickened (enough to coat the back of a spoon). Drain, but do not rinse the vegetables (as there isn't any more salt added to the pickle) and add to the pan with the 125ml of water. Bring to a simmer and cook for 4 minutes. Allow to cool. Sterilize a 1 litre Kilner jar with a non-metallic lid (if you are unsure how to do this, visit [www.ehow.com/how\\_4577254\\_sterilize-jars-canning.html](http://www.ehow.com/how_4577254_sterilize-jars-canning.html)). Fill the jar with the pickle and seal the lid. Store in a cool, dark place for at least 6 weeks before eating.
