The Pitfalls of Purchasing a High Definition (HD) TV

There is considerable confusing (and very misleading) advertising around purchasing a High Definition TV, to be used for viewing HD TV programmes, HD Blue Ray discs, etc. This confusion centres on the two terms used in adverts to describe this type of television: "Full HD" and "HD Ready".

**Full HD**: These TV's will have two important numbers in the description: 1920x1080, which is the screen resolution, a measure of the fine detail that can be seen. This means that a TV with this description *should* be able to display HD source material correctly in full high definition. Unfortunately, this frequently doesn't apply in the cheaper end of the market, where TVs can suffer from a number of defects, such as poor colour and/or the picture falling apart when there is movement on the screen, etc. In addition, these cheaper models may also have high power consumption. In short, you get what you pay for! One other question to consider is do you really need an HD TV in the first place? If there is only space for a 32" model and this is viewed from over 2m away, it is unlikely that the extra fine detail will be visible, even to someone with 20/20 vision!

**HD Ready**, sometimes with 'Supports up to 1080i' (or 720p) in the description: These TVs are generally much cheaper and this description gives the impression that adding an extra HD receiver box, or Blue Ray disc player will allow you to watch programmes or discs in Full HD. Unfortunately, this is simply not true. What this description actually means is that the screen resolution on these TVs is not good enough to display HD source material in full high definition (examples of typical HD Ready screen resolution numbers are: 1366x768, 1024x768, 1280x768). Therefore, the HD source material must first be down-converted (i.e. downgraded ) to display it on these lower resolution screens. The result may be better than viewing the same programme on SD (standard definition), but in many cases there could be little difference.

#### Dear Friends,

We are very much in the Season of Lent again but what are the origins of Lent? Did the Church always have this time before Easter?



Lent is a special time of prayer, penance, sacrifice and good works in preparation for the celebration of Easter. The two elements which are especially characteristic of Lent -- the recalling of baptism or the preparation for it, and penance – are given greater emphasis in the liturgy. It is by means of them that the Church prepares the faithful for the celebration of Easter, while they hear God's word more frequently and devote more time to prayer. The word Lent itself is derived from the Anglo-Saxon words lencten, meaning "spring" and lenctentid, which literally means not only "springtide" but also was the word for March, the month in which the majority of Lent falls. Since the earliest times of the Church, there is evidence of some kind of Lenten preparation for Easter. For instance, St. Irenaeus (d. 203) wrote commenting on the celebration of Easter and the differences between practices in the East and the West. Lent becomes more regularised after the legalisation of Christianity in A.D. 313. The Council of Nicea (325), in its disciplinary canons, noted that two provincial synods should be held each year, "one before the 40 days of Lent." St. Athanasius (d. 373) in this "Festal Letters" implored his congregation to make a 40-day fast prior to the more intense fasting of Holy Week. St. Cyril of Jerusalem (d. 386) in his Catechectical Lectures, had 18 pre-baptismal instructions given to the catechumens during Lent. I myself wrote my dissertation on St. Syril of Jerusalem and on his dramatic Baptismal Liturgical practices. Of course, the number 40 has always had special spiritual significance regarding preparation. On Mount Sinai, preparing to receive the Ten Commandments, "Moses stayed there with the Lord for 40 days and 40 nights, without eating any food or drinking any water" (Ex 34:28). Elijah walked "40 days and 40 nights" to the mountain of the Lord, Mount Horeb (another name for Sinai) (I Kgs 19:8). Most importantly, Jesus fasted and prayed for "40 days and 40 nights" in the desert before He began His public ministry (Mt 4:2). Although the practices may have evolved over the centuries, the focus remains the same: to repent of sin, to renew our faith and to prepare to celebrate joyfully the mysteries of our salvation.

We are holding a Lent Course for the Benefice in Yew Tree House, High Street, Broughton. You are warmly invited. It begins at 8pm and is finished by 9.30pm. Just bring a Bible. 29th February, 7th March, 14th March and the 21st March. Feel free to come to all or some.

#### Recipe of the month: BEETROOT & CHOCOLATE CAKE

Beetroot is both now in season and the 'in thing'. The beetroot in this trendy chocolate cake helps keep it fudgy and moist. This recipe has a cream cheese filling and a chocolate ganache to boot!

#### Ingredients

20 grams of cocoa powder 250 grams of self-raising flour 1 teaspoon of baking powder 250 grams of caster sugar 100 grams of dark chocolate, broken into small pieces 200 grams of soft margarine 250 grams of cooked (not pickled) beetroot (about 1 large beetroot), chopped 4 large eggs, beaten 200 grams of mascarpone cheese 60 grams of unsalted butter, soft

chopped A little white chocolate, grated, to decorate

200 grams of icing sugar, sifted

250 grams of dark chocolate,

200ml of double cream

#### How to make it

First, grease and line with parchment two 21cm (8") sponge tins. Into a large mixer bowl, sift in the cocoa powder, flour and baking powder. Using another bowl (heat-proof glass or stainless steel) melt the chocolate and butter together over a pan of hot, but not boiling, water. Using a food processor, puree the cooked beetroot and then whisk in the beaten eggs. Now add the chocolate/butter mix and the beetroot/egg mix to the mixer bowl with the dry ingredients. Using a mixer, beat the combined mixtures together thoroughly on a slow speed. Then pour the mixture, half & half into each tin. Bake for 35-40 minutes at 180°C (160°C fan)/Gas Mark 4 until when a knife inserted into the centre comes out clean. Leave the cakes to stand in the tins for 10 minutes before turning out on a wire rack to cool. To make the filling, beat together the mascarpone, butter and icing sugar. Spread on top of one of the cakes and place the other cake on top so that the filling is in the middle. Finally, make the ganache to go on top. In a pan, bring the cream to just boiling and remove from the heat. Add the chopped chocolate and beat in vigorously until well combined and smooth. Allow to cool slightly, then spread on top of the cake. Leave to set. Decorate with some white chocolate shavings or a decoration of your choice.

A Mothers Day treat perhaps?
