## Inter Village ***It's A Knock Out!***

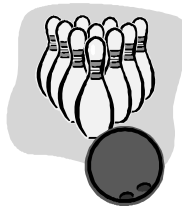
**Sunday, 21st July**

## **GENERAL CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE**

*The following advice has been provided by the Romsey Rural Safer Neighbourhood Team of Hampshire Constabulary.*

- ▶ Keep ground floor or other accessible windows shut and locked in rooms you are not using.
- ▶ Don't leave doors and patios doors open.
- ▶ Remember to lock up property before going to bed.
- ▶ Remember that insurance companies often will not pay out if a burglary is a result of insecurity.
- ▶ If you are taking the opportunity to do some DIY to the house, don't leave ladders and tools outside. Keep them locked up.
- ▶ Make sure you lock side or rear gates leading to you garden.
- ▶ Do not do business at the door. Often companies who tout at the door for gardening and home improvements turn out to be bogus.
- ▶ If you are in the back garden having a barbeque party, don't be tempted to leave the front door open for your visitors to let themselves in.

## Parish Council News

### Chairman's Annual Report

#### Roadside Footpaths

Last year I reported that Hampshire County Council had recommended no change to speed limits, due to low accident rates, and we were hoping this may assist us in pushing forward the roadside footpaths.

Last October we had the excellent news that the Dunbridge footpath had been approved and it was to be completed before April 2013 (yes, I do mean this April!). Unfortunately, I think that everyone will have noticed that this *completed* or even *commenced* item still seems to be rather conspicuous by its absence!!

#### Parish Lengthsman Scheme

This is supervised here by Andrew Simmonds and has continued to be of excellent practical use to us around the parish, with grass cutting, verge cutting, road sign cleaning and ditch clearing. The last item was with the assistance of our local subcontractor, Alan Lawrence.

However, there is a need for a pool of people with varying skills to be available.

#### Members Grant

This has been extremely helpful and has enabled us to improve the notice boards, assist the village hall over the cost of a new sewerage pipe and assist payment for the digger required for ditch clearing.

We shall also be purchasing a bench for the residents of Mill Rise to use whilst waiting for the community bus, with an additional grant.

#### Pot Holes

These are still a major problem, and while they are slowly being repaired, it is clearly not to a high enough standard to ensure a lasting repair, which is not good value for money.

#### Children's Play Area

This came up again last year, but as on previous occasions, no further progress has been made, even though there are funds available.

#### Council Tax & Our Precept

As I reported last year, the Village Hall Management Committee has taken on the responsibility for the hall maintenance. Therefore, as with last year, this has enabled us to hold our precept for 2013/14 the same as last year, unlike Test Valley, where some Councillors have used a loophole in the regulations to push through an excessive increase, despite having considerable reserves.

I think that I should point out that Neville Whiteley voted against this.



### News from Mottisfont

We're gearing up for lots of Bank Holiday and half term fun, with a Wild Art workshop on 28 May, and lots of opportunities for youngsters to fill in more of their "50 things to do before you're 11¾" outdoor play booklets.

At the time of writing, we're looking forward to the annual Songs of Praise celebration with the church, with fingers crossed for fine, dry weather! The walled garden is already full of colour – it's protected from the worst of the weather, so even though many wild plants are several weeks behind with their flowering, the roses are bang on time. They're beginning to flower now, with the ramblers coming out first, and we're expecting a spectacular display from the middle of June onwards.

For an extra special visit, try one of our special rose evenings – enjoy music, drinks, exclusive access and chat with expert gardeners at the Pimm's and Roses evenings on 5 and 19 June, or have a quiet stroll with gardeners on hand to answer questions on 12 and 26 June. If you're feeling creative, you could try your hand at painting roses in watercolour – one-day workshops run on 7 and 14 June.

#### Upgraded Dunbridge Sewerage Treatment Plant

I assume that as this is now completed, and is working OK, preferably without the overflow problems that Dunbridge has suffered in the past. However, I am still not completely convinced that Southern Water have finally accepted that they do own the covered tank in Mill Rise, despite finding that their effluent runs through it!

#### Level Crossing Safety

I reported last year that there have been an unacceptable number of barrier failures at Dunbridge and that electrical power failures can result in both Dunbridge and Kimbridge crossings being out of action simultaneously, resulting in drivers taking a risk and going across anyway.

I understand that these barrier failures are still occurring, with the potential for a major accident if nothing is done.

- ▶ If you are going out for the evening remember to use a timer switch on a lamp or radio to give the impression someone is home.
- ▶ If you go out cycling, remember to lock your bike using a decent 'D' lock, even if you leave it for a few minutes.
- ▶ Remember to shut car windows and sunroofs even if parked on your drive.
- ▶ If you are outside gardening, don't be tempted to leave doors and accessible windows open.
- ▶ If you are working in the front garden, remember not to leave expensive power tools lying around, even for a couple of minutes.
- ▶ Scrap metal has a high value, so be careful about leaving barbecues in the front garden, where they may be taken.
- ▶ Check security of sheds, garages and outbuildings.
- ▶ Regularly check boundary fences and walls to ensure they are in good order and not damaged.
- ▶ Ensure that garden statues, hanging baskets and large plant pots are appropriately anchored and secure.
- ▶ If you buy new garden tools, lawn mowers, hedge cutters, strimmers, etc., mark your equipment with your house number and post code, or even take a photograph, and register items free of charge at [www.immobilise.com](http://www.immobilise.com).

The early summer last year according to the Met Office was the wettest since records began more than 240 years ago. Figures covering three months up to 23 July, 2012, showed that more than 387mm (15.2in) of rain fell in England and Wales. That was more than double the average of 186mm (7.3in) for the period, resulting in two bouts of devastating floods in parts of England in June and July.

The previous biggest summer deluge since records started in 1766 came in 1789 when almost 350mm (13.8in) fell. So let's keep praying that this summer is blessed with plenty of Mr. Sunshine!

Indeed we need good weather for many things, including this month we have some very enjoyable fund raising and social occasions happening across the benefice.

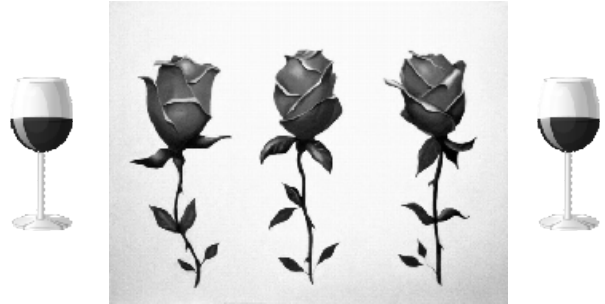

## KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

### Asparagus and Feta Tartlet

A nice, light summery meal, and a great complement for any summer salads or as a side dish for a barbecues. This recipe serves 4 persons.

#### Ingredients:

250g block of puff pastry  
200g feta cheese  
80g of grated parmesan  
Zest of 1 lemon, finely grated  
20 asparagus spears  
Olive oil for dressing

#### How to make it:

Pre-heat the oven to 200C (180C fan)/gas mark 6. Line a baking tray with parchment paper to prevent the pastry sticking to the tray. Hold the asparagus in your hand and bend the end of it until it snaps off and place on a baking tray; repeat this until all the asparagus is trimmed. Once on the tray drizzle with a little olive oil, sprinkle over the lemon zest and place in the oven for 10 minutes until the asparagus has softened.

Roll out the pastry and cut into rectangles of 12x6cm and place on the baking tray. Score a 1cm boarder on each rectangle. Sprinkle the parmesan over the middle of the rectangle and then put the asparagus in the middle of each one, 5 spears on each tartlet and then crumble the feta carefully over the asparagus.

Brush the 1cm boarder with olive oil and place the tray into the oven and cook for 15 minutes until the pastry has puffed up and is golden brown. Serve warm with salad or as a side dish with a summer barbecue!
