Is this open democracy?

On Friday, 24th January, the Romsey Advertiser broke the news that Test Valley Borough Council was considering allocating land next to the railway station at Dunbridge as a site for travellers.

The article went on to describe how planners had contacted a number of land owners to ask if they would be willing to put their land up for "consideration as a gypsy, traveller or travelling showperson site".

The *Acorn* contacted John Millns, chair of our local Parish Council, who said: "We would have known nothing about this if the landowner hadn't contacted me to ask if this was some sort of April Fools joke. I then contacted Neville Whiteley (Test Valley Councillor) and it now seems that I am responsible for opening a large can of worms. The key issue is that the TVBC people responsible for this survey decided that there was no need to inform the parish councils involved - how's that for open democracy!!

"Whatever their reasoning", Millns continued, "it is clearly completely unacceptable to even consider locating a site of this nature in the middle of a residential area."

Over 60s Gardening Support

Are you over 60 and need help managing your garden? If so, the Shaw Trust's Hampshire County Council Over 60s Gardening Support Service may be of interest.

Launched in 2009, the service has recently been extended to cover the Test Valley area.

Customers must be 60 years of age or over and be responsible for the maintenance of their garden. In addition, there must be no other person living in the property who is under the age of 60.

The service is available to those living in private, council or social housing, but is not available to those who already have professional help in the garden.

The maximum number of visits per year is 6. The first visit will be for 1 hour, and subsequent visits will be for 1 or 2 hours. If you request 2 hours, the gardening team will assess your garden to ascertain if this is required.

Work can include grass cutting, weeding, planting, border maintenance and pruning of shrubs. Hedge cutting will not be carried out on a first visit; the gardeners will assess any hedge cutting required and the length of time it may take.

For those in receipt of a means tested benefit, the charge will be $\pounds 10$ per hour. For those not in receipt of a means tested benefit, the charge will be $\pounds 25$ per hour.

Charges for the removal of green waste generated at the time of a visit will be a minimum of $\pounds 2$ for the removal of one bag, approximately the size of a compost bag; for more than one bag the cost will be $\pounds 5$.

As there is a strong demand for this service, customers who cancel at the door twice will have the service withdrawn.

The Gardening Support Service does not include major tree work, hard landscaping or garden redesigning. These, along with extra gardening hours, can be purchased at the commercial rate.

Advice from Hampshire County Council

Most collection and appeals are legitimate but, unfortunately scammers can exploit people's charitable nature and steal money which the donor thinks is going to help a charity.

Do not stop donating money to your good cause of choice. Instead take a few simple precautions to protect yourself and your charity from online fraud:

■ Visit the charity's own website by typing the address into the browser yourself, rather than clicking on a link in an email.

Before you donate any money, check the website is secure. There should be a padlock symbol in the (Continued on page 8)

TEST VALLEY LECTURE: 'HOW DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY REVOLUTONISED MEDICINE' Wednesday, 19th February

Today we take it for granted that a wondrous array of computational technology will be available to assist doctors, both in the diagnosis of our ailments and during complex surgery. 3D body scanners and virtual reality tools are just two examples. Of course, it wasn't always this way.

This talk is a rare opportunity to hear David Morgan, who pioneered the use of computers in clinical medicine. Back in 1968 at Westminster Hospital, he was appointed director of the UK's first research centre to study the use of computers in this field. For the next 11 years at both Westminster and the Department of Health, he pursued his medical innovations and has followed progress right up to the present day. No one is more qualified to tell us the fascinating story of how digits changed the practice of clinical medicine forever.

Do you come into contact with elderly and vulnerable people?

Elderly or vulnerable members of the public have been receiving unsolicited telephone calls from criminals purporting to be from their bank or the police. The caller states that they have spotted a fraudulent payment on their card or fraudulent activity on their account. The caller gains the person's trust and explains that the bank will need to collect the card, or require them to withdraw large sums of money from their account.

The victim is then advised to place their card (or money withdrawn) into an envelope to disguise its appearance. The criminal will then arrange a courier, taxi driver or similar, to call to collect the envelope. The courier is given the address (most frequently in London but now in Hampshire) where they are met by the offender outside the address to take the envelope enclosing card or money.

The advice from Hampshire Police is if you have the slightest suspicion about a transaction of this nature, contact the police immediately by telephoning 101 or 999 if it is an emergency. Please also advise the victim that this may be a scam.

KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

Venison and Mushroom Stroganoff

This recipe serves 4 persons.

Ingredients

- ◆350g green and white tagliatelle
- ♦2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- ◆350g lean boneless venison fillet or loin, cut into strips
- $\bullet\,1$ onion, halved and thinly sliced
- ♦1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- ♦ 350g chestnut mushrooms, thickly sliced
- ♦2 tablespoons dry sherry
- ♦75ml beef or vegetable stock
- 1 teaspoon cornflour
- ◆150ml crème fraiche
- 2 teaspoons fresh thyme leaves
- Pinch of nutmeg
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- Pinch of cayenne pepper

How to make it

Cook the tagliatelle in boiling water for 10 to 12 minutes until al dente.

While the pasta is cooking, heat 1 tablespoon of oil in a pan. Add the sliced venison and stir fry for about 1 minute until browned all over. Remove from the pan and set aside.

Add the remaining tablespoon of oil to the pan, add the finely sliced onions and fry for about 4 minutes until softened. Add the garlic and the mushrooms and continue to cook for 3 to 4 minutes until tender.

Stir in the sherry, cook for a few seconds, then add the stock. Blend the cornflour with 2 teaspoons of cold water in a small bowl or jug, then add in the crème fraiche, thyme, nutmeg, paprika and cayenne pepper. Stir this mixture into the pan and heat until it starts to bubble.

Return the venison to the pan and heat for a few more seconds to warm through. Season to taste. Tip the tagliatelle into a colander over a sink and drain thoroughly. Add to the stroganoff mixture. Gently toss together and serve.

browser window frame when you attempt to log in or register.

If you receive unsolicited emails from charities you have never heard of or have no association with, do not respond, and do not click on any links. It is best to delete them.

Do not respond to requests that ask you to donate through a money transfer company. This is a tactic commonly used by scammers as it makes the payment hard to trace.

Ensure the charity is genuine before divulging personal information or payment methods.

When supporting disaster relief abroad, consider donating through the Disasters Emergency Committee.

If you do not want to make an online donation check with a legitimate charity if they accept other
