On 24th May, National Trust launches this year's "50 Things To Do Before You're 11¼." This is a fabulous campaign where children are given a scrapbook with 50 things to complete, and receive a prize once they've completed the tasks. Things like "Play pooh sticks," or "Roll down a hill" are particularly relevant for Mottisfont, so please bring your children and have a go (...number 6 is "Run around in the rain"....not too often this summer please!)

As you can see from our events programme, there's plenty going on at this time of year at Mottisfont. As mentioned in the last issue, our rose season is the busiest time of year, with tens of thousands of visitors coming to see our collection of 19th Century roses. One consequence is that there is increased traffic to the property during June – especially at weekends. Our overflow car park (next to the main car park) was flooded until March due to the exceptionally wet winter weather, and it is likely that it will not have dried out sufficiently. This means that we will probably have to use the Oakley Road field behind the property so that visitors have a place to park away from any roads.

We will only use this as an overflow when the existing car park is full and it will be manned at all times. As 20% of our traffic approaches via Bengers Lane, we will mainly be diverting this traffic so that it will not pass through the village. However, please be aware that there might be some increased traffic in the area at this time.

**CRIME PREVENTION:  
uPVC Doors Warning**

Hampshire Police are advising that there has been an increase in residential burglaries in Hampshire.



Thieves are targeting properties with uPVC doors, and police are urging residents to pay extra attention to their home security.

uPVC doors can easily be opened from the outside if they are not locked with the key from the inside. Simply lifting the handle does not completely secure the door.



Burglars have also been known to put their arm through a letterbox or cat flap and use a tool to push the handle to gain entry to homes.

**REMEMBER:**

- uPVC doors must be double locked to be properly secure;
- Deadlock your door with the key. Do not just lift the handle;
- Keep house and car keys upstairs or store them somewhere safe;
- Use all door and window locks fitted to your home;
- Consider fitting an internal letterbox cage.

Addendum from Jacqui Horne

*As many of you will have seen, the new footpath in Dunbridge is coming along well. Many have also noticed and wondered about the dip in the pavement edging. Editors' note: Many people have commented how good it is at last to have a safe and complete footpath.

Dear Friends,

Some people today suggest that Christianity is nothing but an overplayed fairy tale, and that the Bible is no more than a collection of myths and legends.

I would challenge this because I see things quite differently. 'Well, you would', I guess most people would say to me, since I'm a Church of England priest. But let me explain in a few words, why I believe what I do.

I haven't been a Christian for very long, but in this short period I have personally experienced some amazing transformations.

After I was baptized and confirmed in 1999, my life gradually changed as my faith grew. In 2010 I found myself prompted to leave a job that I loved, and my home in Guernsey (a place that I love), to follow an uncertain pathway that has led to training for ordained ministry and subsequently to my curacy here in the Broughton Benefice. As someone who has mostly had her feet very firmly rooted to the ground, this was an extraordinary step to take.

It was either a moment of complete insanity or a faithful response to the prompting of the Holy Spirit to serve God in a new place and in a different way.

I firmly believe it was the latter (though some of my former work colleagues would possibly have said it was the former!) because I know that the Holy Spirit prompts people to do extraordinary things.



This coming month, on the 8th June, we thank God for the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and we celebrate this as the birthday of the Church (please see the grid for details of our services). At Pentecost, men and women who had felt uncertain about what to do after the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ were suddenly equipped and enabled by the Holy Spirit to do some extraordinary things. As a result of their preaching and witnessing to their experiences, many, many thousands became Christians and this, as historical accounts confirm, led to the spread of the Christian faith and the establishment of the first churches.

This is one of the reasons why I think that Christianity is more than a fairy tale and the Bible is rather more than a collection of myths and legends!

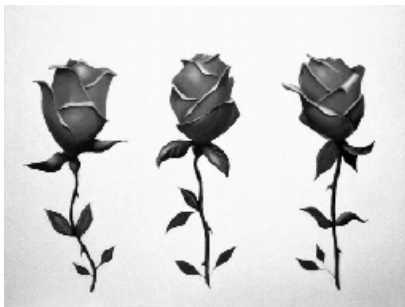

# KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

## Ratatouille and goats cheese crumble

This recipe serves 4/6 persons.

### Ingredients:

4 courgettes  
2 peppers  
1 small tin of chopped tomatoes  
1 white onion  
1 small aubergine  
2 dessert spoons tomato puree  
2 dessert spoons Demerara sugar  
4/6 slices goat's cheese  
50g chopped parsley  
Salt and pepper  
150g plain flour  
50g butter  
250ml vegetable stock

### How to make it:

Pre-heat the oven to 200C, gas 6, fan 180C.

Peel and dice the onion into small pieces and place in a pan with a little oil. Sweat the onions until soft, but colourless. Then dice the courgettes, aubergine into small pieces and add to the onion. Cook for five minutes. Dice the peppers and add to the saucepan and continue to cook for a few minutes.

Add the tinned tomatoes, puree and sugar to the saucepan and boil until all the vegetables are soft. Take off the heat and place the ratatouille mix into an oven proof dish and then put the goat's cheese on top. Set aside while you make the topping.

For the topping, rub the butter into the flour, with a pinch of salt and pepper. Once all rubbed through, add the chopped parsley and spread the mix over the top of the goat's cheese. Cook in the oven for 10-15 minutes or until golden brown.
