**From the General Manager, Paul Cook:**

When the call went out for a new sponsor for the *Acorn*, National Trust at Mottisfont were very pleased to answer positively and we've agreed that we will start this regular column to inform parish residents about some of the conservation work we do and projects that we are involved with. Last year we were pleased to see Mottisfont FC get re-established and the new youth group too, both of which we were keen to support. In the last issue of the *Acorn*, we also launched our new "Wild Card" children's play initiative for all of the children in the parish to coincide with the opening of our new Wild Play and Wet Play areas in the spring.

The main construction work for our new visitor facility will start in September, and includes a new visitor reception and toilets at the front of the property by the existing car park, as well as the shop moving to this location too. It will be replaced by a new additional café in the stable yard. We hope that the new facilities will benefit our local community and you will enjoy many happy hours enjoying our estate.

To coincide with this large infrastructure project, we also have an interpretation project called "StoryScape," which will help visitors understand the history of Mottisfont better and get more out of visiting. This includes opening up new rooms in the house, such as the maids' rooms, for the first time to the public and interpreting the lower corridor around our medieval heritage. Overall 20 points across the property are included, which should really bring the place to life for all of our visitors. This project is due to complete in the Autumn.

**Parish Council News**

The Dunbridge sewage treatment plant was completed on 20th November, and has been handed over to Southern Water. All construction plant and welfare equipment, as well as the security CCTV and alarm system, have been removed with the exception of the boundary fencing which remains to secure a reduced area around the works and along the Southern Water access track. The fence remains as 4D have further been engaged to carry out works to restore the performance of the treated water disposal soak-away, but are in discussions with the Environment Agency as to the final design.

PCSO Cole has a supply of the 'Slow Down' stickers for dust bins, which she is happy to hand out to residents. Please remember not to obstruct the highway with your bin – we have received a number of complaints.

The council discussed its budget at the January meeting and has unanimously agreed not to increase the precept for 2014/15.

If you have any suggestions on commemorating the centenary of World War I, please let us know.

Hampshire County Council agreed this week to release an additional £9.2 million to extend the Hampshire Superfast Broadband Programme so that 95% of Hampshire premises benefit. This is an increase of more than 27,000 premises over and above the current programme. It will mean that 90% of premises can access faster reliable broadband by the end of 2015, and they are working on extending to at least 95% by the end of 2017.

## The Broughton and Mottisfont Community Bus Committee

Charity Number: 284910

I am occasionally asked, "How does the bus work?" Tempted to reply, "Suck; Squeeze; Bang; Blow," I know they really need something more. I sit them down comfortably with a large mug of coffee and explain. About 34 years ago a group of far-sighted village activists worked out that the village was poorly served by the commercial bus operators, and decided to do something about it. (All the best stories start like that.) They did the necessary: routes were planned and approved; the bus obtained (where did that money come from?); volunteers found - both drivers and others; and the bus started operating. Something must have gone right, because here we are all these years later, doing much the same. The bus is not 34 years old; neither are the drivers or committee members, but we tick on.

That is history; what about today? Well I'm sure that passengers feel they can depend on the service, but may well not know what is behind the scenes. At this time of change in the life of the committee, it may be as well to outline something of this. We operate as a charity, satisfying the requirements of the Charity Commission. We are a licensed transport operator, receiving our licence to operate from the Traffic Commissioners, under the provisions of the Traffic Act 1986. The vehicle has to be serviced and repaired as necessary. We have to satisfy the safety provisions relating to passenger carrying vehicles, and an extra overlay from Hampshire County Council. Drivers have to be trained and assessed. In addition there is a host of insurance cover to obtain.

But what is really important is people. At any one time there are about 20 plus drivers, who have to remember what day it is, where they are driving, at what time, where the route runs, and who needs help with their shopping bags. Without them we do not have a community bus service. Behind them is the committee, some long standing, some new(ish). That really is the point of this note - to let people know their committee. **Chairman**, for at least 14 years has been **Michael Howe**. He also undertook the duties of **Technical Manager** for many more years than that. He has been an example of almost unparalleled commitment to the village, and deserves an accolade as he steps down. With Michael, you also got two for the price of one; he was strongly supported by **Janet** throughout his years of office. His place has been taken by **Peter Broome**, who also acts as the **Broughton Parish Council** representative. Remembering that we include **Mottisfont** and **Dunbridge**, **Jacque Horne** fulfils the same role as their **Parish Council** representative. There are two ladies who muster the drivers into an orderly list for driving duties. They are known as the **Operations Officers**, and are **Chris Hoskins** and **Janet Dobinson**. I believe that Chris had support of the bus made a condition of the sale when she moved into the village, and has been observing the commitment ever since. Someone has to make sure the tyres are pumped up, and the diesel topped up (and all the other related jobs you can think of). He is known as the **Technical Manager** and is presently **Alasdair Murray**, assisted by **Robbie Gerhardt**. If, as a local group, you wish to make use of the bus, out of hours or away from our scheduled timings, then **Julie Smith** is your saviour. She has been

doing this long enough to know all the wrinkles. Give her a ring. We are hoping that **Lucy Almond** will take up the challenge of driver training/assessment.

There has to be someone to count the money, (not that we have a lot) and he is **David Mason**, the **Treasurer**. A better number-cruncher you will not meet. He seems interested in all numbers, not just money. So in addition to grappling with the complexities of the repayments under the Free Fare Pass scheme, and extracting money from central government under the BSOG ('What's that?' Merely the Bus Service Operators' Grant), he also analyses numbers of passengers carried, by route, mpg and full costs per km and mile, routine fuel expenditure, and even which excursions are most popular. We have one essential, non-committee member in the shape of **Pam Dawkins** who guards the keys, summarises stats (for David) and takes bookings for excursions.

So there it is; one long standing village service, provided entirely under voluntary arrangements, guided nobly by **Michael Howe** over all these years, moving forward progressively, under a peaceful change of regime. Do feel free to jump on board. Now, as your **Hon Secretary**, I shall dry the ink blots and lay down my blunted quill.

## KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

### Orange and Cranberry Posset

This recipe serves 6 persons

#### Ingredients:

3 oranges, zest and juice  
900ml double cream  
250g caster sugar  
60g cranberries  
2 leaves of gelatine or 1 sachet of gelatine granules

#### Biscuit:

190g plain flour  
125g butter  
65g caster sugar

#### How to make it:

You will need 6 champagne flutes or something similar to put the possets in.

Grate the zest of the oranges using the fine side of the grater. Place into a saucepan with the cream and the cranberries. Gently heat until it starts to simmer and after about 5 minutes take off the heat.

While the cream is on the heat, place the sugar and the juice together in another bowl and mix. Once the cream is hot, pour into the other bowl and mix together until the sugar has dissolved.

Once the mix has cooled, pour into the glasses and place in the fridge to set for a minimum of 5 hours; overnight is best. Then whip a small amount of cream and pipe in a swirl on top of the set posset.

To make the biscuit, soften the butter in the microwave, but do not melt it. In a mixing bowl, combine the flour and sugar together and add the butter. Mix together until it becomes a smooth dough, then roll into a sausage shape about 2cm deep and wrap in cling film. Chill for 1 hour. Once chilled, remove from the fridge and cut into biscuit sized pieces and place them on a baking tray lined with paper. Cook for 7 minutes at 180°C (160°C fan)/Gas Mark 4 to 5 or until the shortbread starts to go golden around the edge. Remove from the oven and while still hot, sprinkle with caster sugar and leave to cool.

Serve a biscuit with each posset
