In 1972, Graham Thomas (Garden Advisor for National Trust) created the Mottisfont Rose Garden. His collection of 19th century roses is now a heritage collection and one of the most significant rose gardens in the world, attracting many thousands of visitors in June each year who come to experience the wonderful colours and scent of over 460 distinct and separate varieties of rose.

On 17th May at our Country Fair (see details below), we will be launching our "Walled Garden Appeal." This is the former Frame Yard in front of the Rose Garden and our project will aim to create a new garden, which will complement the Mottisfont Rose Garden and extend our garden season beyond June through planting that blooms much later. Design submissions have been made, and towards the end of last year we were pleased to choose Tristan Knight's submission. Tristan is RHS Young Designer of the Year 2012, so we are very excited about working with him and Aralia, who are the design company who will be working with him.

We have raised half of the funds required to build the garden, and our appeal will hopefully generate the funds we need to complete the project in 2016. Parish Council Chairman's Report 2014

Dunbridge Footpath

The Dunbridge footway should have been completed by April 2013. We were given a new start date of February, but unfortunately this was cancelled due to the major flooding problems. However, I am delighted, to note that work has finally started.

Walkers' Safety in Mottisfont Village Centre

There is a safety issue with walkers in the village centre, who walk round the blind bend by the Social Club against the traffic, which is a dangerous thing to do at that location! One resident suggested painting footprints on the road surface by the Tythe Barn to take them over to the other side of the road. This was an excellent and very simple idea that walkers would easily understand, particularly if combined with some form of marked footway on the other side of the road. Unfortunately, footprints are not an official road marking, so this cannot be done. We now hope to have a meeting soon with HCC soon to discuss how to progress this.

The Dunbridge Phone Box

This was the last working phone kiosk in the parish and has now been removed. Admittedly, it would only do 999, or 0800 calls, but it was better than nothing, particularly with such an abysmal mobile reception in many parts of the parish.

The Disused Sewage Tank at Mill Rise

For some years now, we have been trying to establish who is responsible for the disused Mill Rise sewage tank, which has a potentially unsafe cover. The usual response has been a variation of 'Not ours gov!' but last year we thought we had narrowed down ownership to Southern Water, which was a reasonable assumption after we ascertained that effluent from Mill Rise properties still ran through it. But very surprisingly, they also denied ownership!

We have recently tried one new idea, which is reporting it to local Building Control as a dangerous structure. This seems to have produced a result, in that both the Environment Agency and TVBC Health Safety Department have confirmed that Aster Housing (who are currently in charge of Test Valley's Council Housing) own this tank.

Parish Lengthsman Scheme

This scheme is supervised here by Andrew Simmonds, and has continued to be of excellent practical use to us around the parish, with grass cutting, verge cutting and road sign cleaning. We are also looking to see if he could deal with the resurfacing the end of Church Lane up to the cemetery.

An additional Lengthsman scheme may be

introduced to specialise in maintaining ditches and drains.

Pot Holes

Last year I reported that pot holes were still a major problem and that repairs were slow and to a poor standard. Unfortunately, I expect everyone will have noticed that they were even more of a problem after this year's storms. So I can only hope that when they are being repaired this time, it is to a high enough standard to ensure a lasting repair, which is something that hasn't happened in the past.

Council Tax & Our Precept

I am pleased to report that, as last year, there is no increase in our precept for this year.

BT Openreach

Over the last 12 months this parish has suffered three major breakdowns in telephone and broadband services.

In the first incident in March/April 2013, five properties in Spearywell were cut off for four weeks. In the second incident last September/October, five properties in Dunbridge were cut off for between two and six weeks, and one had intermittent problems for 9 weeks.

With the most recent incident in February, two properties were again cut off for two weeks in Spearywell.

While none of these breakdowns was the fault of BT, the unacceptable delays in fixing these faults are down to BT's repair division, Openreach.

The main concerns were poor communication on behalf of BT, the difficulty reporting the situation, compounded by a poor or non-existent mobile signal, and concerns that older people are very vulnerable with no phone and no mobile.

People had contacted their MP and HCC, but got no further. Most impact seemed to be from going to the press.

However, I was involved in both the first and the latest incidents, and this highlighted something important that I had missed the first time round, in that Openreach lie to the end customer. They in fact lied to me three times, so I recorded the last occasion and gave it to Andrew who produced a suitable article in the Advertiser.

In addition to this it seems that faults reported by other utilities, such as Southern Electric damaging the BT line, are ignored by Openreach as happened with the latest incident.

TOOLS FOR SELF RELIANCE (TFSR)

Tools are needed for: carpenters, builders, metalworkers, shoe repairers, mechanics, plumbers, electricians. Sewing machines need to be: Singer round-bobbin hand operated (treadle machines by arrangement) and electric machines.

The following are particularly needed: 240V arc welders and accessories, wire strippers, heavy duty footpumps, sharp half-round files, metric taps and dies, tailor's shears, woodcarving chisels, gouges and mallets and lathes.

There are a total of 236 Lifeboat stations around the British Isles and Ireland. Most recently they provided help with flood victims where it was impossible for other services to reach.

Our next walks will be:



TEST VALLEY LECTURE Workhouses and the Andover Workhouse Scandal by Andrew Harris, Wednesday, 21st May

In 1834 Parliament reformed the Poor Laws because parishes were increasingly unable to support paupers living in their own homes. The new Poor Law Commission aimed to share costs among Unions of parishes, and to force poor families into uninviting workhouses.

Andover's new Union built a workhouse in 1836 and appointed as its master a former soldier, who was a violent bully and alcoholic. He ran the institution with an incredibly barbaric regime leaving the inmates starving. In 1845 the scandal was exposed when a workhouse guardian saw starving men fighting over marrow in some rotting animal bones. With an exposé in the Times and questions in Parliament, the hated Poor Law Commission soon collapsed.

Andrew Harris will tell us the whole story at Broughton Village Hall at 8pm (doors 7:30). A former businessman living in Droitwich, he is now a respected historian and writer who has made a special study of the Andover Union Scandal. Price £3 (free to students) including snacks and wine.

KIMBRIDGE RESTAURANT

Chicken breast stuffed with apricots and stilton, on a stilton cream

This recipe serves 4 persons.

Ingredients

300g stilton
300g dried apricots
4 rashers of smoked back bacon
4 chicken breasts
100ml chicken stock
300ml double cream

How to make it

Place one of the chicken breasts on the chopping board so that the fillet on the breast faces up, then make a slice just below the top of the breast to make an envelope under the chicken flesh. Repeat this to the other 3 breasts.

Place the apricots in a blender and blitz into small pieces. Add 150g of stilton and blitz again until all is blended together. Then take a large dessertspoon of the mix and roll it into a sausage shape. Push the stilton mix into the chicken breast until the envelope in the chicken is full, then cover over with the fillet so the slit in the chicken is covered. Repeat with other breasts.

Place a bacon rasher on the chopping board. Place the chicken on top of the bacon, and wrap the bacon over the chicken. Then wrap the chicken breast tightly in cling film, tie the ends off, and place in a roasting tray. Once all 4 are wrapped and in the tray, place the tray into the oven on 160°C for 25-30 minutes**.

While the chicken is in the oven, place the cream and chicken stock in a pan and heat. Once hot, add the stilton and melt into the cream. Once all combined, set the mixture aside until the chicken is cooked. Once the chicken is cooked unwrap the chicken, place it in a frying pan and fry the chicken breasts to colour them.

Pour some of the sauce onto a plate. Cut a chicken breast in half on an angle, place the two pieces on top of the sauce, and serve.
