Our new interpretation project called “StoryScape” opened on 20th September and tells the story of this special place across the whole estate, with a new visitor route and accompanying map. Our lower corridor interprets our medieval past and how the house developed through Tudor and Georgian times into the present house that Maud Russell bought and developed. It is all shown via digital renderings, and children can build the priory themselves and dress up as priors in the old Sacristy. The Maids’ Rooms are now open on the top floor and the bathroom there is complete with crocodile! All in all, there are 34 points on the visitor route to see, so please do come and take a look.

Our café refurbishment, should be ready for half-term. Again, we are looking to interpret our past correctly, and as one of the few remaining 1930s-1950s kitchens in the country, we have taken the opportunity to turn our large kitchen table 90 degrees to its original position and restore the range and Aga in the former servery, removing a lot of the clutter. The whole place should work a lot more efficiently and look fantastic. Stage 2 will be the new Coach House café in the stable yard, opening November 2015.

Building starts in earnest for the new visitor facility at the front on 3rd November. I’ll keep you informed on progress.

Around the village, it is tree surveying season. We will be conducting crown lifts along Bengers Lane and removing any limbs from the pines which have become unsafe.

In Queen Meadow, we have a joint project with Jenkins farmers to establish a new area of native broadleaf deciduous woodland. The aims of the project are to increase our woodland cover, strengthen the local landscape and to create a wildlife corridor between Queen Meadow and Clapgate Copses. Corridors are critical for the maintenance of ecological processes including allowing for the movement of animals and the continuation of viable populations. By providing landscape connections between larger areas of habitat, corridors enable migration, colonisation and interbreeding of plants and animals.

The soil characteristics of the site and existing woodland vegetation nearby suggests that the appropriate species mix for planting would be oak (*Quercus robur*) with an understory of hazel (*Corylus avellana*) and holly (*Ilex aquifolium*).

To increase biodiversity, intermittent planting of the following species should also take place: Field maple (*Acer campestre*), hornbeam (*Carpinus betulus*), hawthorn (*Crataegus monogyna*), blackthorn (*Prunus spinosa*), goat willow (*Salix caprea*), cherry (*Prunus avium*), rowan (*Sorbus aucuparia*) and crab apple (*Malus sylvestris*).

It is expected that in time ash (*Fraxinus excelsior*) and silver birch (*Betula pendula*) will naturally colonise.

Planting will be conducted between January and March.

HELP NEEDED!

This is an appeal to the residents of Mottisfont and Dunbridge, and perhaps even beyond. On behalf of St. Andrew's Church PCC I am looking to put together a happy band of willing volunteers to help with church cleaning. No, don't give up...please hear me out!

As most of you know, we have in the centre of our village this beautiful ancient building, not only a peaceful place of worship, but a much visited attraction of which we should be justly proud, and an historic gem in our midst. Regardless of whether you are a regular churchgoer, or a churchgoer at all, you may agree that it is a place worthy of our care and attention. Sadly, in common with most rural churches, there is no funding for cleaning services, and we have to rely on the goodwill of local people.

In recent years cleaning of St. Andrew's has been done on a somewhat ad hoc basis, and sometimes not at all, but it has usually fallen to a conscientious few, most notably a couple in our congregation, who have given of their time and energies on a weekly basis to keep us going. We owe these two unsung heroes, namely Brenda and Brian Turner, a huge debt of gratitude and appreciation. However, the long overdue moment has come to share the burden of cleaning more widely and equitably. This will necessitate a good measure of community spirit, and someone to take the helm as an organiser. Unless anybody has a burning desire to take on the lead role, in which case please come forward, I will do my best to coordinate this, provide guidance, and organise a rota, swaps, etc.

I need responsible volunteers, any age over 18 (or 16 if working with an adult), male or female, who are sufficiently able-bodied to clean for say about 2 hours, in pairs...and who are willing to make a regular commitment. It's mainly dusting, polishing, and vacuuming. There will be some flexibility of course, and it can be fitted in to suit individual availability.

At this stage I'm not able to estimate how frequently we will need your services as the frequency will depend on how many people respond. Obviously the greater the number who come forward, the less frequently we will need any one individual's help. As they say "Many hands make light work."

It is noteworthy that in a neighbouring parish only very slightly larger than our own, a church cleaning rota was instigated with great success. Eventually enough people came forward to enable a rota that allowed a commitment from individuals only once every three months approximately. Interestingly, only 50% of those were regular churchgoers. If they can do it, I know we can!

In addition to a weekly clean we will need, in my opinion, a biannual DEEP CLEAN, a real get-together for a blitz, and I might well provide the coffee and cake! So please give it consideration. Why not ask a friend to be a buddy cleaner with you? It's good exercise, and rewarding to see the church looking better after a bit of TLC.

TEST VALLEY LECTURE: 'Journeys to Australia - with Captain Cook then the Convicts' by Lt. Col Mike Martin, Wednesday, 19th November

With maps to guide our passage, Mike will take us on two very different and entertaining trips to Australia. In the first we shall chart the adventure of James Cook as he made his first voyage via Tahiti to observe Venus for the Royal Society. He then went on to map the entire coast of New Zealand before famously making landfall in Australia near Botany Bay in 1770. We then examine convict life in Britain and explore the need for a new convict colony - prisons were overcrowded because the American War of Independence had deprived Britain of a place to dispose of criminals. So the idea of the First Fleet was hatched: 11 ships carrying 1,400 people of whom roughly half were convicts, would set sail from Portsmouth in 1787 to found a new colony in Australia. Mike will also take us on this amazing 250-day voyage.

Mike Martin graduated from Sandhurst before seeing military service all over the world and eventually becoming CO of the Royal Hampshire Regiment. After retirement Mike spent 20 years with Holts Battlefield Tours.

Dear Friends

'Lest we forget'...

I have found this to be a disturbing and unsettling year. Unspeakable acts of brutality have been perpetrated in different parts of the world. Many thousands of innocent people have been killed, injured and displaced. Parts of the world are again going through a dark and difficult period.

It is against this backdrop that the world has poignantly paused to commemorate some significant anniversaries.

In June, world leaders gathered on the French landing beaches to remember the seventieth anniversary of D Day in 1944 (the beginning of the end of the Second World War in Europe). And then, in August, we commemorated the hundredth anniversary of the start of the First World War.

I read recently that when war broke out in 1914, every member of the British Armed Forces was given a Bible as an essential part of their kit. Many came to rely on their Bible and there are a number of stories from the Battle of the Somme, of bodies being recovered from shell holes of men who died with a New Testament in their hands. We cannot know what their faith meant to them but it seems that perhaps they found some solace in the Word of God in their final few moments.

Other stories have come to light including that of Walter Young, a 25-year old Post Office sorter in London when the war broke out. Walter joined his works corps and fought at the Somme, Ypres and at Passchendaele. He was eventually captured by the Germans and was put to work in a Prussian coal mine. Walter's faith was important to him and he helped to sustain the morale and faith of his fellow prisoners, holding regular services in the ablutions room where the men washed on leaving the mine.



It is remarkable that when it is opened today, Walter's New Testament falls open at Romans 12, which it is believed he used in these services. It reads,

'Hate what is evil, hold onto what is good...Let your hope keep you joyful, be patient in your troubles and pray at all times...Ask God to bless those who persecute you – yes, ask him to bless, not to curse'.

At this Remembrance time, it is right that we should reflect on these words as we pause to recall and give thanks for men like Walter, for all of those who gave their lives for the freedom of others, as well as praying for peace in our own time.

BROUGHTON FIREWORKS

Broughton's fantastic annual family firework event will once again take place on 5th November, with a children's torch procession leaving The Square (by the Greyhound pub) at 6.30pm.

New Type of Nuisance Telephone Callers

I am aware that many people (including myself) have been receiving automated calls telling you that 'you are definitely eligible for a boiler grant' (etc.) and inviting you to press a number to be put through to a call centre to then be assured that this is a Government sponsored scheme (which is total rubbish).

These calls seem to come from legitimate numbers (but are in fact spoof numbers that don't exist, so it is useless to report the call to the TPS) and unfortunately, the intention is to trick you into parting with your money.

The Information Commissioner is trying to terminate the source of the calls, so far without success. However, there is a way to completely terminate the activities of ALL these telephone pests, be they UK or international calls:

Since 2011 I have had a 'Truecall Call Blocker' device connected to my telephone that can be programmed to screen and/or block any type of unwanted call, day or night. It also has a unique recording facility, where pressing the record button at any time during a call, will save the entire call to memory.

I originally purchased it to record illegal sales calls, to send to Trading Standards (which has been far more effective than reporting the call to the TPS), so I have only used a few of the call blocking facilities until now. However, with these new pests, I have now fully programmed Truecall to screen all calls, resulting in complete peace and quiet!

I am usually very cautious about recommending something, but I can confirm that this device does exactly what it 'says on the tin'. There are two basic versions: 'Truecall Call Blocker' (as above) and the 'Truecall Care', which is more intended to protect vulnerable adults from unwanted phone calls while allowing friends, family and care workers to get through. There is also a new BT phone, the 'BT8500

Recipe of the month: Curried apple and mint soup

This soup is just as nice served hot or cold.
This recipe serves 4/6 people.

Ingredients:

50g butter
1 medium onion, finely chopped
1kg cooking apples
1.5 litres chicken or vegetable stock
1-2 dessert spoons curry powder
3 table spoons mango chutney
100g natural yoghurt
Salt and pepper
8 sprigs of fresh mint

How to make it:

Melt the butter in a large saucepan. Add the onion and cook slowly until soft and translucent. Stir in the curry powder and cook the spice for a few minutes.

Peel and core the apples, then cut them into small pieces. Place into the saucepan, add the stock, and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer until the apples are soft.

Add the mint to the soup and blend using a hand blender or a food processor until smooth. Return to the pan and add the yoghurt. Adjust the seasoning to taste.
