"Big Bertha" was the name one of our property team called the rather large construction vehicle at the front of the property yesterday. I'm just pleased to see it on site for the piling work for our new visitor facility. Work is well and truly under way now, and the new building can't be finished soon enough in my opinion. We'll have to wait until September/October to see the end result, but it's all very exciting nevertheless.

We have also been making the most of the relatively dry weather to start work on our car park too. Hopefully this work will weather-proof it a little better.

Our current "Light Works" exhibition includes some incredible pieces and the walks and talks we now host all year round always give our visitor supporters something to look forward to as our estate changes through the seasons, and plenty of good reasons to come back (see events article).

Our Mottisfont Estate Ranger – Ryan Scott – has sent the following update:

"We are heading swiftly towards the end of the felling season and are busy finishing winter forestry and scrub clearance work. This year's compartments of hazel coppice have now been finished, and we will be erecting the deer fencing to protect them shortly. To make the coppice more productive we will be layering some hazel stems to make new coppice stools. We do this by selecting a hazel stem, roughly 2-4 cm diameter at its base, and cutting almost all of the way through it, just leaving enough of the vascular system connected to keep the shoot alive. The shoot is then laid, pegged flat to the ground and lightly covered with soil to encourage rooting. This can be repeated along the length of the stem to establish multiple new stools. In order for coppice to be at its most productive, many stools are needed at close proximity as this helps to drive the young hazel shoots straight up towards the sunlight, which in turn produces long straight stems ideal for weaving and other estate produce.

Contractors are about to start work in Spearywell Wood clearing an area of windblown Douglas Fir. Signs will be going up in the car park and along some tracks warning about heavy machinery and ongoing felling works.

If you have been out and about across the estate recently you may have seen that the snowdrops have burst into life and the hazel trees are adorned with catkins. In the coming weeks other signs of the arrival of spring will include bluebell shoots and lesser celandine. As the temperature increases and the sap in trees begins to rise, the blackthorn bushes

will be the first to display their flowers. It is also at this time of year that tawny owls have begun to nest and mistle thrushes can be heard across the estate. If you keep your eyes open, and are extremely lucky, on sunny days in March you might see goshawks displaying over our conifer plantations. Definitely one to watch out for!"

In the garden...

If you've not had chance to visit the winter garden, come along now! The garden is at its best, with vibrant stems contrasted against the stark white of snowdrops, it looks simply divine!

The walled garden is a hive of activity at the moment with pruning the roses and digging over the herbaceous borders in time for the main season display. The shop has just had its first delivery of plants – come and take a look, you might even find a bargain or two!

In the gallery...

Light-works: Contemporary Photography 17th January to 19th April

This show brings together leading artists whose work particularly focuses on the effects of light. Reflected light is central to many of the artists on show, such as Christiane Zschommler, whose rippling patterns of light and shade on water showcase the beauty of natural light. Pekka Nittyvirta uses digital technology to create dramatic, fictitious landscapes that glow with an eery light. Susan Derges and Chris Bucklow don't use a camera at all, preferring pin-holes and direct exposure onto paper as ways to capture luminous images. Banish the darkness of winter by stepping into the light.

Art in Focus: People, 17th January to 19th April

The first in a new series of mini- exhibitions focusing on Mottisfont's own art collection, this display explores the ways in which people have been represented in 20th century art. TEST VALLEY LECTURES: 'Hill Figures - A Brief History' by Dr. Mark Hows, Wednesday 18th March

Dear Friends,

March is upon us. Where are the months going? After a long and cold winter, the days are gradually lengthening and I am beginning to look forward to the spring. The dormant trees and shrubs are slowly coming back to life and early bulbs are nervously pushing their way up as the next cycle of their growth begins.

It seems only days ago that we were taking down the Christmas tree, and now in the Church we have entered the season of Lent. One of the lovely things about being part of a church community is that it reminds us of the seasonality of the year and the cycle of life.

We observe Lent, and rightly so, not just as a time of fasting by giving something up, but also as a period of refreshment and renewal. For me, it's a period to take time out to reflect on where I am in my walk with Jesus and the transitions and changes that lay ahead.

At the start of his ministry, Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness. During this time he faced many temptations, but he chose to stay faithful to God. At the end of this transitional time in the wilderness, Jesus was strengthened for the tasks that lay ahead.

Why not using the coming few weeks of Lent, quietly reflecting on where you are and on the journey that might lie ahead?

COULD YOU BECOME A STEWARD AT ROMSEY ABBEY?

Romsey Abbey stewards come from all walks of life. They are not guides, but are there to welcome all visitors to the Abbey. Stewards also answer questions where they can, and point visitors in the direction of further information. They are there every day, and play a vital role in creating an open and welcoming atmosphere for all those visiting the Abbey.

We need over forty stewards every week. Most attend for two hours every week or fortnight, others are prepared to step in for absences. Recipe of the month: Beef pot and banana curry with cashew rice

This recipe serves four people.

Ingredients

800g stewing beef cut into chunks

- 2 white onions chopped
- 2 lemongrass stalks, bashed
- 2 tablespoons grated ginger
- 3 garlic cloves, crushed

1 teaspoon ground turmeric 2 tablespoons medium curry powder

2 teaspoons brown sugar 400ml can coconut milk 500g halved new potatoes 2 tablespoons garam masala

3 small bananas Small packet of coriander

140g chopped cashew nuts 300g basmati rice

How to make it

Heat the oven to 180°C. Heat two tablespoons of sunflower oil in a large frying pan. Brown the beef and transfer to an oven proof dish. Add the chopped onions to the pan and fry gently until softened. Then stir in the lemongrass, ginger, turmeric, curry powder and sugar. Fry for a few minutes and place in with the beef.

Add the coconut milk and one can of water to the beef. Cover and place in the oven for one hour. Meanwhile toast the chopped cashew nuts in a dry frying pan until golden.

After one hour remove the beef from the oven and stir in the potatoes. Place back in the oven and cook for a further hour or longer if the potatoes are not cooked. Remove the lid halfway through cooking.

Once the potatoes are cooked, remove the dish from the oven and place back onto the hob. Stir in the bananas cut into 2cm chunks, and also stir in the garam masala. Simmer for 10 minutes until the sauce thickens.

Cook the rice, and before serving mix in the cashew nuts. Serve with a scattering of chopped coriander.
