Hello everyone,

We're gearing up for a summer of bunnies – not in the garden, of course, where every gardener has a bit of Mr

McGregor in them! – but in the gallery, with a lovely new exhibition of original Beatrix Potter illustrations. Many have never been shown in the south before, and one drawing is being exhibited for the first time ever. There's a big family trail as usual, so do pop by if you're looking for something to do in the holidays, or fancy a trip down memory lane.

The lavender is coming into its own in the north garden now, wonderfully fragrant on sunny afternoons (we've had one or two!). We've also finally got both sides of the river path open again – we had to wait for the ground to dry out enough to be able to get machinery in to deal with the large stump left over from a fallen tree earlier in the year, which tore a hole out of the footpath.

Our teams of staff and volunteers have been out surveying wildlife across our countryside holdings, and the results are looking good, as we're finding thriving populations of species from glow worms to nightjars. We run regular walks and talks about the wildlife on our estate and in the New Forest, so do check in on the website, and see if there's something that sparks your interest.

Beatrix Potter: Play and Childhood, until 18 September
A very special exhibition – the only one in the south of England - marking the 150th anniversary of

the birth of Beatrix Potter.

You'll find 30 original drawings and watercolours by perhaps the world's most beloved children's illustrator and author, alongside a small selection of rare vintage Beatrix Potter dolls and figurines. The exhibition showcases some of Beatrix Potter's most famous characters, whilst taking you on a journey into the world of play and childhood, from Peter Rabbit's naughty antics to the Two Bad Mice as they wreak havoc in a doll's house.

This is a unique opportunity to see these original artworks: due to light sensitivity, they are rarely exhibited outside of their permanent home in the Lake District.

Accompanying the exhibition is a fantastic Beatrix Potter-themed adventure trail for younger visitors, inspired by her playful characters and colourful stories. The route takes children on an adventure around the grounds, with activities to complete and puzzles to solve.



River Open Day An Invitation to Local Residents

The National Trust and Mottisfont Fly-Fishing Club are pleased to invite residents of Mottisfont and Dunbridge to enjoy the beautiful riverbanks of the Oakley, Rectory and Dun beats on Sunday 21st August. This is during the August weed-cut period when the rivers are not fished, and so can be opened to local residents. You are welcome to picnic, walk, observe the wildlife and enjoy the riverbanks from 9am until 7pm.

The river margins are protected areas of Special Scientific Interest, so we request everyone to observe certain necessary restrictions. Please do not paddle, swim, or use boats or inflatables, leave litter, light fires, fish, or drive on to the beats

Dogs are permitted, but due to the wildlife habitats they must be kept on a lead and not allowed in the river.

Access

Dun Beat: by the bridge opposite the layby on Hatt Hill.

Rectory Beat: from the road between the main Abbey Car Park and Mottisfont House.
Oakley Beat: by the bridge on Oakley Lane.

The Mottisfont River-keeper, Neil Swift, will be giving a talk about the river ecosystem and river management. Please come to the Oakley Hut at 12noon on Sunday, 21st August.

Parking spaces near the beats are quite limited, so please walk to the rivers if possible.

YOUR BUS NEEDS YOU

The village bus has provided a valued service for the past 34 years (not this particular vehicle, otherwise we would be sending it to an historic vehicle museum). It trundles along to Southampton, Winchester and Andover monthly, and to Salisbury and Romsey weekly. It takes people on longer excursions about six or seven times a year, and is available for use by local community groups.

We are just embarking on a fundraising exercise to buy a more modern bus, but what we really need is a few more drivers, because we are down to lower numbers than for many years. Anyone becoming a driver would only have to go out on a route on 10 or 12 occasions each year. To avoid increasing the load on existing drivers, if we do not recruit new drivers we should have to consider curtailing a number of our services.

No special passenger carrying licence is required; a normal car licence is all, and ample familiarisation and training will be given. It is OUR bus, so let us use it and drive it. Contact me for any further details: George Vaughan, Honorary Secretary, 301045, Gevaughan@hotmail.co.uk

MICHAEL HOWE - A TRIBUTE

Many people in the community will know of the operation of the Village Bus. It is now in its 35th year and continues to provide a valued service to our villages. What people may not appreciate is that For more than half of the 34 years that the village bus service has operated, it was guided and managed by Michael Howe, who has sadly died. He deserves the utmost recognition for his efforts. He was driver, maintenance manager and chairman of the committee for periods ranging from 15 years to more than 20. During that time he initiated and oversaw the regular process of dealing with fundraising and replacement vehicles; ensured the bus was serviced and maintained; undertook emergency work, and dealt with problems as they arose. He played his full part in the regular recruitment of new drivers and checked them out on the bus and the routes.

Michael only retired from active involvement when he reached the age of 79. I think he missed being involved with the bus and we, the committee, missed him. As an example of what a committed individual can contribute to a community he was second to none. The current bus committee has asked me to place this tribute to Michael in order that everyone should know of his work.
