DEFIBRILLATORS

On 10th December, Councillor Karen Hamilton, Mayor of Test Valley, came to Mottisfont to inaugurate the defibrillator that had been installed on the outside wall of the Social Club. This was followed by drinks and nibbles inside.



A second defibrillator has been installed at the Mill Arms in Dunbridge.

The next step in ensuring that the defibrillator can be used most effectively is our:

Defibrillator Awareness Event 11am, Saturday, 11th February in the Village Hall

The UK Resuscitation Council guidelines indicate that community defibrillators (AEDs) should be able to be used by members of the public with or without any formal training. This is because the equipment is very easy to use, and when you have called 999, the ambulance service operator will normally stay on the telephone to assist you.

Modern AED equipment is also designed to talk to you and tell you what to do. You cannot make a mistake when using an AED – just follow the instructions being given. However training is desirable, particularly to create confidence in the community, learn CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation, a simple lifesaving technique), and to understand the processes, as well as managing best practice.

I hope you all had a great time with family and friends, and managed a bit of a rest too. We certainly had lots of people enjoying their time off with us at Mottisfont Abbey over the holiday period, and it was lovely to hear so many people singing The Twelve Days of Christmas as they strolled about the grounds. Favourite highlights of our Christmas offering seem to have been the swans, the French Hens, the huge cake, the sparkly dresses of the 'nine ladies dancing' and of course the huge tree. The team are already hard at work planning next year's decorations, so watch this space!

We've just opened our new Rex Whistler exhibition, and were pleased to welcome a BBC South TV news crew and journalists, including one from the *Guardian*. Whistler was an incredibly talented artist, very skilled even aged 9 or 10, and the range of work that he did is phenomenal – much more than the murals for which he's most famous. We've had exclusive early access to Maud Russell's diaries, soon to be published as *A Constant Heart: The War Diaries of Maud Russell, 1938-1945* (The Dovecote Press, 2017), so we're able to tell people much more about Mrs. Russell and Rex Whistler's work at Mottisfont, presenting a more balanced view of her than has perhaps been possible before.

There is lots more planned for the year ahead, including an exhibition of the work of Axel Scheffler in the summer, the artist who created the illustrations for *The Gruffalo*, *Room on the Broom*, and many more books created with Julia Donaldson.

On 1st March, Ash Wednesday, our service will be in St. Mary's, Broughton, and will begin at 7.30pm with Ashing and Holy Communion. Priority services during a power cut

Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) offer a free Priority Services Register for those of us who might need extra support during a power cut.

This is available regardless of who you pay your bills to.

Some of the benefits of the Priority Services Register include a dedicated 24-hour phone number, priority updates during a power cut, and information in the format you need.

You can join the Priority Services Register if you meet any of the eligibility criteria below:

- You are dependent on electricity for home medical care, for example a kidney dialysis machine or ventilator;
- You have a chronic illness or short-term medical condition;
- You are disabled;
- You have special communication needs, e.g. because you are blind or deaf;
- You have a young baby;
- You receive a state pension.

Notes of the Mottisfont Parish Council Meeting on 18th January

Louise Govier (National Trust) confirmed that whilst there are no restrictions on the allotment land in Dunbridge stipulated in Mrs. Russell's Memorandum of Wishes, there are no plans by the National Trust to change the use of this land.

Cllr. Jeffery, our Borough Councillor, reported that the Borough Council is undergoing an Electoral Review by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England. The final reorganisation is planned to take effect from the 2019 elections. The first stage proposes a reduction in the number of local Borough Councillors from 48 to 43. This is likely to be accepted. The second stage involves a review and possible adjustments to the number, names and boundaries of the Borough's electoral wards. It is likely that the Dun Valley ward will get bigger. A 10-week consultation will finish on 3rd April, during which time Cllr. Jeffrey would support any objections to the proposals. The final proposal for the re-organisation will be published on 10th October.

The PC agreed to support the Hampshire County Council design for a virtual footpath in the centre of Mottisfont Village, clearly marked out with appropriate signage for a conservation area. In addition, the PC would pursue the possibility of extending the existing footpath from Hazel Cottage to the visitor's car park with the National Trust. It was noted that this scheme will address pedestrian safety only, and not traffic calming concerns.

Payment diversion alert

Advice from Action Fraud via Hampshire Alert

Fraudsters are emailing members of the public who are expecting to make a payment for property repairs.

The fraudsters will purport to be a tradesman who has recently completed work at the property and use a similar email address to that of the genuine tradesman. They will ask for funds to be transferred via bank transfer.

Once payment is made, the victims of the scam realise they have been deceived when the genuine tradesman requests payment for their services.

Protect yourself

- Always check the email address is exactly the same as previous correspondence with the genuine contact.
- For any request of payment via email verify the validity of the request with a phone call to the person who carried out the work.
- Check the email for poor spelling and grammar as these signs can indicate that the email is not genuine.
- Payments via bank transfer offer no financial protection; consider using alternative methods such as a credit card or PayPal which offer protection and an avenue for recompense.

Filo wrapped pears with orange sauce

This recipe serves 4 people.

Ingredients:

4 medium pears
Marzipan
Filo pastry
40g cornflour
50g orange liquor - optional
Stock syrup
500g caster sugar
500g water
1 cinnamon stick
1 vanilla pod
Orange sauce
1/4 litre orange juice
1/4 litre stock syrup (liquid the pears are poached in)
1 orange

How to make it:

Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan) /350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Carefully peel the pears, leaving the stalk on, and using a small knife carefully remove the core of each pear, leaving behind an upside down cone shape in the bottom of the pears.

Boil the water, sugar, vanilla pod and cinnamon together in a large saucepan. Once the sugar has dissolved and the liquid is clear, reduce the heat under the pan. Carefully place the pears into the saucepan and simmer for about 10-12 minutes. Remove the pears from the saucepan and place on a cooling rack over a plate to cool and drain.

Once the pears are cool, take a small amount of the marzipan and stuff into the bottom of each pear to fill the gap. Cut the 8 sheets of filo into 16 squares measuring 13 cm/5 inches across. Brush one square with melted butter and place a pear in the middle of the square. Then wrap each corner of the filo around the pear until the pastry is wrapped tightly around the pear. Repeat this until you have wrapped 4 squares of pastry around each pear.

Place the wrapped pears on a piece of baking paper on a baking tray, and lightly cook for 10 minutes until golden brown.

To make the orange sauce, boil the orange juice and the stock syrup together. Add the liquor (if using). Mix the cornflour with a little water to make a paste, then pour into the sauce and reboil. Peel the skin off the orange, finely slice the skin into strips, and add them to the sauce.

To serve, place a pear onto a plate and drizzle some of the warm sauce around the plate.
