#### Thelwell: Laughter and Landscapes Saturday 5 January – Monday 22 April

A welcome return to the world of Norman Thelwell. There'll be old favourites on show, including the antics of iconic characters Penelope and her mischievous pony, Kipper. The exhibition also includes other satirical cartoons, with astute and amusing observations on country life, and breathtaking landscape art. Some of this work has never been publically shown before, including a selection of Thelwell's early sketches.

#### In the gardens...

The winter garden glows with brilliantly coloured winter bark from dogwood and ornamental bramble, while berries, fruit and late- and early-flowering perennials such as bergenia and hellebores also provide colour during the shortest days of the year. Sweet-scented daphnes and winter-flowering honeysuckles, wintersweet and witch hazel all contribute to a subtle fragrance in the crisp cold air.

Delicate drifts of snowdrops will begin to appear beside our waterways from January.

#### On the wider estate...

Essential forestry works are being carried out across the estate over the winter season. These include thinning operations to allow the remaining trees to grow to maturity and the felling of trees to improve light conditions along our ride networks to improve wildlife habitats. Please take note of safety signs and path closures; they are for your safety and the safety of the forest workers. We will try to keep disruption to a minimum.

## Seasonal Thoughts from St. Andrew's

Greetings all! What a challenge....'Thoughts' that encompass all that unfolds over the next two months...the waiting season of Advent with its heightening anticipation week by week, the festival of Christmas itself, the drama as 2018 slips into 2019. January's end will herald early spring and Easter beyond that. You might reasonably assume I am approaching this from a religious point of view, even though I sidestepped Christingle, Epiphany, and the journey to Lent. Yet, might it not equally well be the agenda of any self-respecting retailer preparing his workforce at this time of year. Can anyone escape the hype that conditions us both consciously and subconsciously in growing intensity from the end of August and beyond. For many it is the harbinger of 'seasonal overload', fraught with pressure, stress, anxiety and deadlines. Spectacular expectations are set by the media, by advertising, and by long standing traditions that MUST be met lest we disappoint. And who do we fear disappointing? Well, above all, I think it is ourselves. So, we promise TOO much, fret about how to finance it, and rush about in a frenzy to build the perfect Christmas, and sadly completely miss the point! So often the glitz, the glamour, and even greed may subordinate the life changing reality of Christmas. We've heard it all before; we hear it every year.

Now, it's not for me to preach to anyone about how to do it differently; I'm as brainwashed as the next. Ah, do I hear some of you musing that I am surely brainwashed....by faith!? (In truth, that would be a blessing). However, I do believe that by stopping and reflecting regularly in the weeks ahead on the true meaning of Christmas, that one may become more spiritually grounded to face the madness that ensnares us. Likewise, remembering that for others Christmas brings a different type of stress focuses us on a more human and compassionate perspective. It may turn up the volume on loneliness, loss, grief, nostalgia, any emotional burdens, social problems and all forms of neediness.

Maybe treating yourself to the best Christmas ever is as simple as opening yourself to Advent's preparation. It's there in the Gospel, and the CofE website, as is Epiphany for that matter. There's plenty there to reflect upon and inspire us. And what about mindfulness? Mindfulness has apparently now established itself in the repertoire of self-help strategies. One definition of Mindfulness is "the basic human ability to be fully present, aware of where we are and what we're doing, and not overly reactive or overwhelmed by what's going on around us." (https://www.mindful.org/what-is-mindfulness/)

Combine it with prayerfulness and it may just be the perfect antidote to the Christmas 'Hyperactivity-no-Nativity' syndrome. (I made that up myself...and I'm well chuffed with it. Just joking!) But let's not forget the original meaning of mindfulness, which is "to stay aware and be heedful of our responsibilities." At this time especially, those responsibilities are to loved ones, friends, to the needy, to ourselves, and to God. Maybe in this way we come closer to the profound sense of awe, the joy, the peace, and the hope held in the mesmerising story of the coming of God as a wee baby in a stable, no less.

And finally, I thought I'd share this moment....familiar to many I'm sure:

"Granna, Santa Claus isn't real is he? He can't be," asks my granddaughter, citing her reasons for doubt, all quite logical to be fair. Somewhere deep inside me my heart sinks, but thankfully I'm driving and she's in the back seat, so misses any non-verbal clues. She's only 5 years old! Wasn't I asking the same questions at 10 years of age? Things were different then. So, what does one say? What came out, no doubt inviting criticism, was:

"I know what you mean, darling. I've had those worrying thoughts myself, but what I think is that its a special kind of magic that no-one can understand, but it doesn't mean it's not real. I don't know how Santa can be in so many houses delivering to children all over the world in one night either! But when you believe the magic, and its special powers, then mysteriously and amazingly it becomes real. But you must believe it first. It's called having faith." Silence, no more was said, for now anyway.

And it suddenly struck me, not for the first time... the beautiful innocence... and the wonderful coincident analogy! Matthew 18 v3.

Please join us at St. Andrew's for the Advent and Christmas services listed in this edition and in the parish Christmas card. Let's get together and fill our church when the world about us seems to be going slightly crazy, and find peace there. Have a wonderful Christmas, and happy new year to everyone.

The total cost of sending the tool kits, including transport, will be over  $\pounds$ 3,000. We have already been given a  $\pounds$ 1,000 donation, ring fenced for this project. We need a further  $\pounds$ 2,000 by early next year. Can you or your parish help raise this sum?

The bulk of the funds which we currently hold are needed to pay the fees for the 250+ vulnerable children and orphans who we support. (As the school year begins in January, we make our largest contribution in December each year). Can we as a Deanery meet the challenge to complete the tool kit funding by the end of January 2019?
