Dear friends and neighbours,

Well, what a rose season it has been! A combination of particular weather conditions and of course the hard work and care of our gardens' team resulted in a truly spectacular display in the walled garden. Both the roses themselves and the companion

planting have really seemed to burst forth with intensity this year. Coming in through the side gate because of the building work in the frameyard, you're also hit by a wall of fragrance that's very special.

It was so lovely that GMTV decided to come and broadcast the national weather from here on Friday 15th June – it meant a bit of an early start for the gardens' team, but we were very proud to share our beautiful walled garden with people across the country. The garden is still looking lovely, and of course the lavenders and later summer border plants are now coming into their own, so do use your Parish Passes and pop in if you've time.

We tried a different approach with the overflow car park this year, and directed members to the upper overflow from the start of the day when we expected to be busy, and it's worked well to keep the traffic flow steady. We're also working on another kind of flow – the weed cut taking place on the rivers. This is an essential part of our river management, keeping the flow of the water steady and ensuring that we have a balanced mix of wildlife habitats and stretches that are suitable for fishing. Watch out for the emerald-green clumps moving downstream, where they will be collected and recycled as fertiliser.

At the Abbey, we'll be gearing up for a summer with *The Tiger Who Came to Tea* and *Mog the Cat*. We will have a wonderful exhibition of illustrations by Judith Kerr, who created these much-loved children's book characters and many more. I'm most excited about the giant tiger model that is coming with the pictures – visitors of all ages will be able to sit down at the tea table with him, and he's absolutely lovely!

In the gardens...

The peak of the rose season may be over, but there's still plenty of colour in the walled gardens throughout July. The herbaceous borders provide a wonderful floral colour palette right through until October, showcasing a huge variety of plants chosen for their structure, scent and eye-catching colours. Agapanthus, geraniums and peonies mingle with pinks, lilies and phlox. The centres of the borders are a mass of soft blues, pinks and whites, whilst stronger yellows, oranges and dark pinks draw your eye along the length of the border. Avenues of purple lavender give both the walled gardens and north lawn a distinctive fragrance.

In the countryside...

Weed cutting on the River Test continues in July. This is a vital management practice that enables us to maintain diverse and productive habitats. 'Clearing off' days - when the weed is freed from any bridges or obstacles in its way and pushed downstream - result in huge rafts of weed can often be seen floating down the river at this time. The weed will eventually reach Romsey, where it will be removed from the river, collected by the Environment Agency and composted.

ROAD CLOSURE ORDER EXTENDED

An extension of the temporary closure order relating to part of Oakley Road, Mottisfont, has been granted to allow BT access for telecom network maintenance and upgrade works.

The order applies from the junction of Oakley Road with Bengers Lane to a point 200 metres to the north. It applies from 1st July for 3 months, or until the works are complete, whichever is sooner, but is expected in practice to take from 2nd to 6th July.



The Hampshire Superfast Broadband Programme has upgraded the BT roadside cabinet between the station and the Mill Arms. This means that homes near this cabinet should now be able to get much faster or even superfast broadband (with speeds of more than 24Mbps - megabits per second).

If you are too far away from the upgraded cabinet to get superfast speeds, please note that the Hampshire Superfast Broadband Programme is looking to reach more premises all the time, so an upgrade may come in due course.

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They romped through a hunting song full of musical imagery by the Scotland enthusiast Mendelssohn. They sang the much loved *Ave Maris Stella* by Grieg (his great grandfather was Scottish), and a group of traditional folksongs, one of which was the pastoral love song *Ca' the yowes* (drive the ewes to the hills) arranged by Vaughan Williams. This was a truly special performance, a solo tenor's voice filling the church accompanied by chorale style chords.

A Child's Prayer, by the Scottish composer James MacMillan, written in response to the 1996 Dunblane tragedy, was also sung beautifully by two sopranos from the church's west end, accompanied by the choir in the east.

Index Cantorum's membership may have changed since Mr. Williams founded the choir thirty years ago, but the philosophy hasn't – themed concerts of the highest standards. *Caledonian Connexions* was a fine example.





Review: Stockbridge Music – Index Cantorum

St Peter's Church, Friday 8th June, 2018

This concert, called *Caledonian Connexions*, proved full of contrasts, twists and turns: choral music that intrigued and enlightened at once. Obviously the theme was Scotland – mostly by association. As Index Cantorum's founder and director Mark Williams described in the programme, through the evening we'd hear anything from Scottish composers and those inspired by Scotland, music for Royal courts, folksong, contemporary music, and works from the Renaissance – eighteen pieces in all, some short, some longer.

Scotland's greatest 16th century composer was Robert Carver. To open the concert, Mr Williams sang an ancient tune, *L'Homme Armé*, on which many composers at the time based their works, including Carver with his Mass of the same name. The choir performed its Gloria. This is beautiful music that warms the soul, with long phrases, ornamentation and wide compass between the treble and bass parts.

Equally first class singing in the first half expressed ably grief and anguish in the Scottish-born Robert Ramsey's *How are the mighty fallen* in his setting of David's lament from the Book of Samuel at Jonathan's death. Many harmonic suspensions and musical false-relations here.

We enjoyed a charming rare secular Scottish part-song by that great musical survivor of four reigns, Tallis; a poignant anonymous Scottish Lament; and a couple of short madrigals, one by a certain Cipriano de Rore, an innovative composer with a dramatic style expressive of the text, who influenced later developments in the madrigal.

The choir relished the 16th century tribute to St. Andrew, Scotland's Patron Saint, by the Flemish composer Thomas Crecquillon. His *Andreas Christi famulus*, is a supreme piece of sustained eight-part writing.

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ACTION FRAUD ADVICE

There is concern that victims of previous Computer Software Service Fraud (CSSF) are being re-targeted for "owed money".

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) reports that CSSF scammers are returning to contact previous victims, requesting that they pay money owed for a fake malware protection service they had provided. Alternatively, the fraudster will ask for a new subscription fee in return for protection from a new threat.

The victims that have made payments to the fraudsters have done so via credit/debit card payments. In some instances threatening and aggressive language has been used against victims, as part of the attempt to coerce them into sending money.

Computer Software Service Fraud involves the victim being contacted, told that there is a problem with their computer, and that for a fee this issue can be resolved.

The aim of the fraudster at this point is usually to gain remote access to the victim's computer and, subsequently, access to their online banking account. No fix actually occurs. The victims will often be cold-called or will receive a pop-up on their computer, prompting them to phone the suspect.

Since the beginning of this year (2018), the total loss for repeat victims of CSSF has been reported as £16,712.85. The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has noticed an increase in such reports since the beginning of May.

Protect Yourself

- If you receive such an unsolicited call or pop-up, do not make a payment. Always ensure you know who you are talking to. If in doubt, hang up immediately.
- Do not allow remote access to your computer.
- Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank, or another trusted organisation, force you to make a financial transaction on the spot; they would never ask you to transfer money into another account for fraud reasons. Remember to stop and take time to carefully consider your actions.
- Listen to your instincts. If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. Criminals may lull you into a false sense of security when you are out and about or rely on your defences being down when you're in the comfort of your own home. They may appear trustworthy, but they may not be who they claim to be.

DISTRACTION PURSE THEFTS IN ROMSEY

Please be aware we have had an increase in distraction purse thefts in Romsey town.

Over the last couple of weeks we have had reports of customers who have been approached in the car park after they have paid for their shopping.

As the suspects approach, and one will ask for directions to distract the victim while the other suspect will take the cards from purses, wallets and or bags.

It is believed the suspects have been watching their target entering their PIN when paying at the tills.

The suspects have then used the cards to purchase items and to withdraw cash from ATMs.

Please be extra vigilant when paying for items at tills, and

always shield the key pad when entering your PIN. We also advise not to engage in conversation when approached by strangers in car parks.

The suspects are described as smartly dressed males, who are believed to be Eastern European.

FAKE TEXTS ABOUT EE BILLS

These fake text messages purport to be from EE and claim that you haven't paid a bill. The link in the message leads to a phishing website designed to steal your EE account login details, as well as personal & financial information.

Don't be tricked into giving a fraudster access to your personal or financial details. Never automatically click on a link or attachment in an unexpected email or text.
