Heath Robinson: Dreams and Machines Until 15 April 2018 11am-5pm

From quirky machinery to exquisite watercolours, this exhibition showcases the wit and talent of this household name. In the 1930s, Heath Robinson became known as "The Gadget King", and he is still most widely remembered for his detailed drawings of eccentric, over-complicated contraptions. But he was also a talented painter, trained at the Royal Academy.

Our exhibition features over 60 works covering the extraordinary breadth of his work, from humorous magazine illustrations to dream-like watercolour landscapes and scenes from Shakespeare.

March will see the first spring flowers emerge around the grounds, a welcome sight after frosty winter days. We've planted masses of mixed, naturalising bulbs under ancient trees, in the walled gardens, and in the cherry orchard.

These newly planted bulbs include narcissi, fritularia, leucojum, cyclamen, crocus and thousands of tulips. Meanwhile, the winter garden continues to boast bright colour and fragrance throughout this season.

VILLAGE HALL HIRE CHARGES

The Village Hall Committee has reviewed the charges for hire of the hall.

For regular bookings, i.e. W.I., Art Group and Whist, increases will take effect from 1st April 2018. Any bookings for one-off events that are already booked, e.g. birthday parties, camping weekend, and winter campers, remain at current cost. All new bookings will be charged the new rates immediately.

- Regular bookings increase from £5.50 to £6 per hour.
- Charge to residents increase from £9 to £10 per hour, whole day from £90 to £95.
- Non-residents increase from £15 to £16 per hour, whole day from £150 to £160.
- Weddings for parish residents increase from £350 to £400.
- Commercial increase from £19 to £20 per hour, whole day from £190 to £200.

Charges for use outside Village Hall premises:

- Wooden tables increase from £1 each to £1.50 each per day.
- Blue stacking chairs increase from £1 to £1.50 for 5 per day.

A welcome return visit from Andrew Seber, with another of his lively science talks. This time, what you wanted to know, but were afraid to ask, about....

THE PERIODIC TABLE

Often seen, rarely understood. An opportunity to start from scratch and find out how it is made up and why it's useful.

The Periodic Table is found on posters in laboratories and classrooms across the world. All the chemical elements that have been discovered or made are included.

This talk is a rare opportunity to look at the background to the origin and meaning of the table, and why it has been so important in scientific understanding over the past 150 years or so.

Andrew will build up the picture from basic concepts and will discuss how the table has contributed to greater understanding of our world.

Andrew studied biochemistry at Oxford and York, and spent most of his working life in public service education and leadership. One of his retirement activities has been using his teaching experience to explain to a wide audience the basis of molecular biology and he has presented short courses and talks to a variety of non-specialist groups. He is currently running a series of seminars on aspects of chemistry and biology for groups of people who are interested in science but whose knowledge may be at best a bit rusty. He is a frequent guest at research seminars in the Biochemistry Department in Oxford.

All are welcome, particularly non-scientists, or rusty scientists. £5 includes a glass of wine or soft drink. Full time students free.

REMEMBERING DAVID HOWE

Thirty years ago this month a young(ish) couple moved into Broughton Mill with their extended family – eight of us in all. Our first weekend here was Easter, and so we decided to attend Houghton church. There we were met and welcomed by Canon David Howe who, at that time, was rector of the newly-created benefice of Broughton with Bossington, Mottisfont and Houghton.

Some of you may already be aware that David died during the autumn of last year at the age of 93. Others may not know this, and so it is being suggested that an acknowledgement of his long years of service in these parishes should be included in this article. Those of us who attended his funeral on 27 November in Ramsbury, at the church where both he and his mother had played the organ, were reminded of the many different gifts and qualities he processed – in particular, his sense of humour and love of music. However, it was his teaching to ‘be kind’ that endures in the memory, calling to mind the words of the poet Adam Lindsay Gordon:

“Life is mostly froth and bubble,
Two things stand like stone;
Kindness in another’s trouble,
Courage in your own.”

David felt that kindness should always be a priority as it linked so closely with courtesy, care and compassion.

During march, as we journey through the liturgical season of Lent in preparation for the glorious festival of Easter, we shall again be leading a course to help us focus on what it means to be a Christian in this secular age. (Details can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.) Lent is an important time to take stock of how we live our lives and reflect on our dealings with one another. It seems to me that a good starting point is with that simple but crucial message of David Howe’s: Be Kind.







MOTTISFONT SOCIAL CLUB CENTENARY AND CRICKET CLUB BICENTENARY

In May next year, Mottisfont Cricket Club will be celebrating playing cricket for 200 years. We have a newspaper report of a match between Mottisfont and Houghton taking place in May 1819 to prove it! Since that time the club has played cricket at several locations, and has been at the Bengers Lane ground for about 70 years. This land was given over for the Cricket Club to use by the estate owner at that time, Mrs. Russell. The present pavilion was built in the 1950's.

The Social Club, having been constructed as a memorial to those who gave their lives for the country in the first world war, is 100 years old in October 2019. The club was very fortunate to have two local benefactors: the Barker Mills family who were then the owners of the Abbey and Mottisfont Estate, who donated the land, and The Humbert family, landowners at Kimbridge, who donated the materials and built the first structure.

My name is Peter Holmes, and at the time of writing I am chairman of the Cricket Club and Secretary of The Social Club. I am hoping to produce two booklets, one for each organisation. I am appealing to all in the local community who have any memories or photographs of events that have taken place at either club to drop me a line giving me details of the events, or copies of photographs which you would be happy to have included.

Any interesting facts about the Football Club will also be of interest, given that the Football Club also use the sports ground.

The Social Club has recorded minutes from the day it opened, but these do not include individual memories of special events held at the Club over the years.
