Greetings from Mottisfont Abbey.

At the time of writing, the leaves are starting to turn and we're just clearing up after a wonderful weekend of creativity when our visitors used the natural bounty around to make

wonderful land art. Leaves, twigs, conkers and much more were made

into all sorts of patterns, from the arty to the fantastical (there was even a T Rex made by one young dinosaur enthusiast!). It's the perfect time for an autumn stroll, and to warm up with one of the new soups and 'one-pot' dishes on the menu – the butternut squash and bean hot-pot is really delicious, and much better for me than the 'blondie', which remains something of an Achilles heel of mine...

We have much to celebrate at the moment, not least the beautiful Kitchen Garden that Jonny and his team of tireless helpers have been finishing off in the first section of the walled garden. All sorts of different gourds and squashes are growing on the long pergolas, and a wonderful array of salads is now being produced for our café, and will be available for visitors to buy as salad bags in the future. If you haven't popped in to see the progress for a while, it's worth a visit now – the grass in the centre is down, and it's just about complete.

We've also been remembering with great thanks the life of a former colleague whom many of you will have known, Phil Marshall, who very sadly died recently. Phil worked for the National Trust from 1987 – 2012, and made a really significant contribution to landscape and wildlife in our area. He was incredibly lively and engaging, but everything he did was rooted in solid scientific and environmental understanding, and it has had long-lasting effects on our local countryside. Phil was the original advocate for the National Trust's decision to take over active management of the Mottisfont fishery in 2004. He was a lynchpin of the partnership between the National Trust and Mottisfont Fly-Fishing Club from its foundation – a partnership that continues to this day. Phil championed the transformation of the fishery into an exemplar of sensitive ecological management to become a flagship project for the National Trust, and a huge influence on river-keeping practice in chalk stream fisheries throughout the country. Phil was quite rightly proud of what has been achieved at Mottisfont – it is a thriving legacy that he leaves here.

Phil was closely involved in the National Trust's acquisition of our sites on Rockford and Ibsley Commons, and the former plantation at Foxbury near Half Moon Common that we've been restoring back to heathland, and where we're also planting 22,000 new trees. He trained and mentored rangers who have gone on to work in many other organisations, and in more recent years was continuing his work as

part of the Broadlands team and as an advisor both in the New Forest National Park and to the Government.

His love of wildlife and the natural world was only equalled by his interest in history. Phil did extensive local history research, particularly about Mottisfont Abbey, and was always happy to share what he had learned. He was someone with a great zest for life, a mischievous sense of humour, and a playful approach that belied the seriousness of his achievements; he will be very much missed. Our thoughts are very much with Debbie and Phil's family; we will work hard to ensure that the countryside and wildlife that he loved continues to flourish into the future.

In the gallery... The Mottisfont Open Exhibition 2018 Until Sunday 11 November, 11am-5pm (4pm from 5 November)

An exciting mix of work submitted by artists from all backgrounds and selected by a panel of arts specialists. The call out this year saw a fantastic response, with over 400 entries received; works were submitted by a diverse mix of artists, with the vast majority from Hampshire and the surrounding counties. The exhibition showcases a fascinating variety of media and styles, from drawings, paintings and textile pieces to 3D works, including sculptural pieces from some unusual materials.

In the gardens...

The last of the autumn colour will adorn our grounds as November begins. We're home to the National Collection of plane trees, which includes the great plane, thought to be the largest of its kind in Britain; framing the east side of the house, this veteran tree boasts a dazzling autumn display. Another star of our colourful show is the hornbeam, which explodes into a canopy of orange and scarlet. Chestnut trees lining the upper half of our main pathway glow with yellow-orange leaves, and pale gold tulip trees are another autumn highlight. As this seasonal colour fades towards the end of the month, our specially planted winter garden will begin to come into its own.

This year, scenes from the much-loved poem 'The Night Before Christmas' will be brought to life around the house and grounds. Inside the house, oversized books and set-dressed rooms will take you through each verse of the poem,

November is a time for remembering...

This year we are particularly remembering 100 years since the Armistice in Europe. 'Remembrance 100' has been part of the remembering this year; it recalls how, on Sunday, 4th August 1918, the fourth anniversary of the declaration of war, King George V and Queen Mary joined members of the House of Commons and the House of Lords for a special service at the Church of Saint Margaret, Westminster. The King had asked that 4th August 1918 should be observed as a National Day of Prayer: 100 days later the war ended.

On 4th August 2018 churches across the country and across the spectrum of denominations started 100 days of prayer, peace and reconciliation. In the Deanery, some churches are also part of 'There But Not There' which, through the installation of silhouettes, helps to commemorate those who died in the First World War and to educate all generations, particularly today's younger generation who were born nearly 100 years after the outbreak of WW1, to understand what led to the deaths of 888,246 British and Commonwealth service personnel.

In our remembering we also seek to heal today's veterans who are suffering from the mental and physical wounds of their service.

In December there are interviews planned for a new rector for the Mid Test Benefice and a vicar for Kings Somborne. Usually, those taking up the posts will need to give 3 months' notice, so it will be 2019 before they move in. In the meantime, your churchwardens will be busy sorting out worship and events in your church – please encourage them! Below is their guide to what might need doing as we come closer to Christmas.
