
Parish Council approves traffic calming measures for Barley Hill

At its January meeting, the Parish Council approved a number of measures to help reduce the speed of traffic on Barley Hill.

There has long been a problem with vehicles speeding on Barley Hill to get past parked cars before oncoming traffic blocks the way.

The measures approved include:

- 6ft (1.8m) high white fencing to be fitted either side of the road to give the impression of a narrower road width. Known as a village gateway, this type of feature has been shown elsewhere to reduce traffic speeds significantly;
- replacing the speed limit signs with more prominent versions;
- replacing the worn coloured road surface;
- adding road markings for further emphasis.

The coloured surface and road markings are yet to be agreed with Hampshire County Council's Highways Department, but the gateway should be installed in the next few weeks.

We had hoped to have a raised road surface at the gateway, but apparently this is not permissible in areas without street lighting.

Register your car to access Household Waste Recycling Centres

Hampshire residents will need to register their car for free access to Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRC).

During 2020, automatic number plate recognition systems will be installed at HWRCs such as the one on Bunny Lane. If, as a resident of Hampshire, you have registered your vehicle, you will be allowed to enter and use the facility free of charge.

BROADBAND: LAST CHANCE TO REGISTER INTEREST

In the December edition of the Acorn, we invited anyone interested in getting improved broadband from Virgin Media to contact the Parish Council. Unfortunately we have only had 17 replies, well short of the roughly 50% of households that Virgin Media say they need to justify the costs.

All change at the station!

South Western Railway (SWR) is due to take over the management of Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station in April.

The embattled rail company has provided passenger train services at our station since December 2006 when GWR withdrew its stopping services. But management of the station remained under the umbrella of GWR.

National Trust Greetings from Mottisfont Abbey!

Well, the ground is sodden, but signs of spring are already starting to appear – we've had some snowdrops out since the middle of January. If you can dodge the raindrops, the Winter Garden is looking really lovely, with all the bright stems of the dogwood and

vivid colours of cyclamen glowing through the gloom. It's 10 years since we created this garden, so we're celebrating it with a little trail exploring different plants that really come into their own at this time of year.

Our big anniversary this year is the 125th birthday of the National Trust. There are all sorts of things going on nationally, and we'll have a special photographic exhibition later in the year that features 125 people who work or volunteer for the Trust. It features no less than three people from Mottisfont: Neil our River Keeper, Clair our Gardens Apprentice, and of course John Surplice, who was our very first suggestion when we were asked to suggest key people who might be photographed for the project. John of course worked for the Trust for many years as a forester, and has continued to volunteer for us, as well as painstakingly removing dead material from fallen trees to create his beautiful 'found wood' forms.

Another key date for us is Saturday 16th May, when we'll be taking part in Springsong, a region-wide celebration through (you guessed it!) song. We're inviting local people, as individuals or community groups, as existing choirs or just people who fancy a singsong, to come and join us in the morning. We'll all learn a special anthem being written to celebrate the Trust's birthday, taught to us (no need to read music) by a choral leader who knows just how to get everyone singing – it's lots of fun, and anyone can join in. We'll then take our place in a 'beacon of song', rippling out from Alfriston Clergy House, which was the first house acquired and restored by the National Trust. We'll sing the anthem, and a few other songs, and then individual choirs are welcome to stay on and sing a bit of their repertoire at different points around the property. If you're part of a choir that might be interested, or just an individual who fancies this, do look out on our website for details of how to book.

We all have jobs that we need to do at this time of year, from cleaning the gutters to starting a spring clean. Another is of course that it's time to renew your Parish Pass to Mottisfont Abbey! For new residents or people that don't have them, this is a pass that gives you entry into Mottisfont Abbey (sadly not other National Trust properties, you need membership for that!) as many times as you like throughout the year. We offer this to all parish

residents as a benefit to being on the doorstep of a National Trust property – we'd like you to feel welcome to come here whenever we're open.

A few key points: you need one pass for every member of the family, except under-fives (but if your child will turn five this year, you will need to get a pass for them). The pass is not transferable, and only residents of Mottisfont and Dunbridge can use it. To apply, please either call the estate office on 344001 or email Mottisfont@nationaltrust.org.uk, and they'll send you the form. You need to provide proof that you do live within the parish (a copy of a utility bill with your name and address on it is usually the best way to do this). We will look forward to seeing you soon!

In the gardens...

The winter garden is ten years old in 2020, and we've created a new, self-led trail to help you explore it, highlighting some of our gardeners' favourite plants. The one-acre garden glows with brilliantly coloured winter bark from dogwood and ornamental bramble, while berries, fruit and late- and early-flowering perennials such as bergenia and hellebores also provide colour during the shortest days of the year. Sweet-scented daphnes and winter-flowering honeysuckles, wintersweet and witch hazel all contribute to a subtle fragrance in the crisp cold air.

Delicate white clusters of native snowdrops emerge

around the grounds in February, especially along the font stream and at the start of the river walk, where a woodchip path meanders through an ancient buxus plantation on the banks.

In the house...

The winter is a busy time for our house team, who are busy working on the annual 'deep clean'. You'll be able to get up close to some of this conservation work when you visit. Look out for the team using a huge array of interesting equipment to make sure our rooms are looking their best for the year.

On the wider estate...

Look out for overwintering birds such as redwings while you walk the wider estate; fieldfares and waxwings may also be spotted later in the season. As part of ongoing woodland restoration and improvement works we'll be planting 3,000 trees across the estate this winter to improve wildlife habitats. This includes large scale planting in areas previously cleared of soft woods and improving our orchard species mix with reginal heritage fruit tree varieties. We'll also be carrying out other essential forestry works, including felling trees to improve light conditions along our ride networks, and thinning operations to allow the remaining trees to grow to maturity. Ongoing coppicing in Queen Meadow paves the way for displays of ground flora in spring and provides a supply of produce such as charcoal and faggots which you can buy from Mottisfont's shop. Please take note of safety signs and path closures; they are for your safety and the safety of the forest workers. We will try to keep disruption to a minimum.

Work is also being carried out to reinforce and replace cracked brickwork inside and outside the hall. The work shouldn't disrupt any village hall bookings, but areas of the car park will be fenced off to enable the builder to have safe access to the work.

Future Plans

This year we are planning some alterations and improvements to the village hall. These include:

- 1. Refurbishment of the old outside toilets to form a store for garden machinery and general items.
- 2. A new metal ramp to the side fire exit to comply with Building Regulations and The Equality Act 2010. This will provide safe access and emergency exit from the building for wheelchair and semi-ambulant users of the village hall.
- 3. Sand and re-seal the wooden floor in the main hall.
- 4. Improve the insulation above the ceiling in the main hall. This will reduce heat loss through the roof and reduce our heating costs.

We will be applying for funding for this work through the National Lottery and other grant providers.

TIPS ON WASTE DISPOSAL

At the beginning of a new year, householders often have a clear out or begin house improvements.

All householders have a duty to check who they pass their waste onto. Any third parties must have the correct licence to show that they can carry the waste and to confirm where it will be taken for disposal.

If a householder's waste is found fly tipped and they did not take the correct measures, they could be liable and face an unlimited fine – even if they didn't do it themself.

You must use a licensed waste carrier to dispose of waste, or take it to a household waste recycling centre (hants.gov.uk/recyclingcentres).

You must show you took reasonable steps to prevent your waste being fly-tipped. This is called your duty of care. When using a waste carrier:

- 1. Check if your waste carrier is licensed. You can do this quickly with their name or licence number at hants.gov.uk/fly-tipping.
- 2. Ask what will happen to your waste. A licensed

waste carrier should not object to this.

- 3. Keep a record of their waste carrier licence number by taking a photo of the licence, or take a screenshot when you check online.
- 4. Keep a waste transfer note or receipt to say where the waste was collected from, by who, and where it is going.


SPEARYWELL HANDBAG THEFT

In mid-January, Test Valley Rural Police received a report that a handbag had been stolen from a vehicle parked in Spearywell car park. Please be aware that thieves will take the opportunity to break into parked vehicles and take valuables if this is presented to them. Putting items in the footwell is not enough to hide them.

The police include beauty spot car parks in their regular patrols but they can't be everywhere at once.

The Thomas Dowse's Charity: What do we do? Can we help?

The Thomas Dowse's Charity is able to provide grants to individuals, up to the age of 25, living in Broughton, Bossington, Mottisfont and Dunbridge, for educational purposes, including such things as the cost of school trips, music tuition, overseas educational trips, uniform, swimming lessons, transport to educational establishments, laptops, and books.

Applications are treated in strict confidence. Applicants must demonstrate need, but there is no means testing.

Applications for consideration at the next meeting should be received by the secretary at least 10 days before the next meeting (i.e. by Sunday, 16th February).

Grant applications should be made on the new application forms which have the Trust's Privacy Notice attached for your information. These are available from St. Mary's Church, Broughton, Mottisfont Church, Broughton Primary School or by email from tina-stuart-1-at-gmail-dot-com. (remove the dashes, and change "at" to "@" and "dot" to ".").

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Having a single operator carrying out both duties should simplify day-to-day operations and make it easier for passengers to contact the company if problems arise.

Signage at the station will be changed to recognise SWR as the new operator.

However, SWR's plans could soon hit the buffers because doubt has been cast over the long-term future of the train operator following the announcement that the company has made colossal losses.

Auditors for SWR have warned that the company is on the brink of collapse after it was announced the rail operator had lost a staggering £137million during the financial year ending March 2019.

In January, the company's auditor, Deloitte, issued a stark warning that SWR's future is in serious doubt and the company's franchise could be terminated by the Department for Transport (DfT) and transferred into public ownership.

Deloitte warned there is "significant doubt" over the future of the strike-hit firm, which could be nationalised by the DfT in order to keep its rail franchises running. The DfT may even insist that First Group and MTR submit proposals for a short-term contract to keep running South Western's rail franchise.

South Western Railway says it holds a "reasonable expectation that the discussions with the DfT will have a positive conclusion".

During December, would-be passengers at Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station were left without any train services because of strike action by SWR employees and more industrial action is planned in the near future.

Numbers are up

A record number of train passengers are now using Mottisfont & Dunbridge station.

Figures released by the Office of Rail and Road show that there has been a steady rise in passenger numbers since 2006 when the dual name Mottisfont & Dunbridge was applied.

For the period 2018 - 2019, 33,622 passenger journeys were made using our station, nearly two thousand up on the previous 12-month period.

These encouraging statistics are good news for rail

authorities and the community in general, because they should help ensure the long-term future of the station.

However, figures due out later this year or early 2021 may see a slight fall in passenger numbers because of last December's rail strike, when no passenger trains stopped at Mottisfont & Dunbridge Station.
