

MOTTISFONT & DUNBRIDGE DEFIBRILLATORS

Each year we have to raise approximately £350 to cover the maintenance of the two defibrillators and their associated satellite phones. Hopefully they will never be needed, but they have saved lives in other towns and villages. There are collecting tins in The Mill Arms and the Social Club; over the last few months these have raised over £70 just from people donating their small change.

The Community Heartbeat Trust have now set up an on-line donation page where anyone can add funds, anonymously if they wish, for our defibrillator. The link is:

For now, we're still clearing up fallen trees and branches and doing our best with localised flooding around the Abbey. We had a tree down in the river which caused flooding in new places, and knocked out some essential services for a couple of days, but that's all been sorted out now.

If you need something to make you smile after all the terrible weather, pop up to the gallery to see the 'Comedy and commentary' exhibition of cartoons and satire from the 18th century to the present day. From witty observations about every day life to cartoons that poke fun at players from every side of the political divide, there will be something to make you chuckle I'm sure.

We've had an incident of someone shouting at a licensed dog walker in our woods, so I did just want to clarify the position with commercial dog walkers on the Mottisfont estate. In response to local concerns about commercial dog walking companies using the woods to exercise large numbers of dogs who were not always under control, we talked to known dog walking companies about how they needed to behave in our woods. The lady who was shouted at was in fact someone who is licensed by us to walk multiple dogs on our estate, and she is very clear on how we expect that she and the animals in her care will behave. If you do see what looks to be a commercial dog walking outfit and you're not sure if they should be in the woods, rather than challenging that person directly, please do contact the Mottisfont Estate Office and our rangers will check out the situation. That keeps everyone safe – thank you.

You may also by now have heard my news: I'm going to be leaving Mottisfont in mid-May, to take up the position of CEO of Artwork, a Southampton-based charity that helps provide opportunities across the South East for children and young people to be creative, access cultural activities and gain extra skills for the workplace. It's something that's always been close to my heart, and when the job came up, I just couldn't say no! I will however be very sad to be leaving both the National Trust, and this lovely parish. I will have a few more Acorn contributions to make before I go, so it's not goodbye quite yet, and I will no doubt be back to visit often and replenish my jam and marmalade stocks from Mrs Clutterbuck's range of fine preserves! The first spring wildflowers are beginning to emerge in the estate woodlands. Wildlife survey season begins in March with breeding birds; this is when we can monitor the effects of our winter conservation projects such as scrub clearance and coppicing.

From the Rector

February has been a difficult month in the Test Valley. Not only has the weather been horrendous, I have conducted the funerals of two significant figures in their communities: Garry Headley and Dieter Dent.

The usual cycle of the year means preparations for annual church meetings, which is a good opportunity to celebrate all that has happened in church life in the last 12 months, but is a lot of work.

Now that March has begun so has the season of Lent, traditionally a penitential 40 days during which Christians seek to put right all that is amiss in their lives in preparation for the Easter celebration.

The question of what is amiss in your life is left as an exercise for the reader, but it is one that I encourage you to answer.

None of us lives a perfect life, and none of us is

exactly in the place that we would want to be - both individually, and collectively as a Church, a community or even a nation.

However, as winter draws to a close, spring brings with it the promise of new life, fresh growth, renewal, and the hope of abundance.

As we seek to put aside all the things that separate us from God during Lent, we are preparing to marvel in the mystery of the defeat of death, won for us by Jesus sacrifice and resurrection.

So I encourage you to engage with the spirit of Lent: look honestly at all that is not the way you would like it to be in your life and faith, and look forward with hope to the fulfilment of God's promise that "behold, I make all things new."

All of March is within Lent (the six weeks leading up to Easter). Lent was a long, strict religious fast when people gave up all rich food (it does not include Sundays, which are always days of celebration – remembering Jesus' resurrection!). It is a time of preparation when some Christians try to overcome their own faults. Christians try to put aside more time for prayer so that they can really let God into their lives. It can also be a time of learning, so I have been asked to explain some of the obscure language we use about Church. Here's a starter that might help:

Benefice: One of those words, loved by the lawyers, that are difficult to define. The Shorter Oxford Dictionary says “an ecclesiastical tenure”, whatever that may mean. For our purposes, it may do to say that it relates to all that an incumbent accepts on appointment to a parish – any endowments, the cure of souls in the parish, the freehold, the occupation of the clergy residence, be it vicarage or rectory. It used to include tithes, when they were payable to an incumbent.

Communion: The Holy Communion service is a memorial of the institution of the Lord's supper by the Lord Jesus Christ on


the night of His betrayal. Indeed, its alternative name is the Lord's supper. The Book of Common Prayer requires communicant members to attend at least three times a year, one of these attendances being at Easter.

Eucharist: An alternative name for the Holy Communion service, meaning thanksgiving.

Matins: This service, like Evensong, follows the pattern in The Book of Common Prayer and consists of choral music, scripture readings, and prayers.

Evensong: This service follows the traditional pattern in The Book of Common Prayer and consists of choral music (psalms, canticles, and anthems) from the rich Anglican musical tradition, scripture readings, and prayers.

At the February meeting, attended by 19 members, we had a talk from Pip Hollingsworth from the Hedgehog Rescue centre at Wellow. We learned a lot about the habits of these creatures, and also about some of the reasons why they turn up at the Rescue Centre. Unfortunately hedgehogs seem to be in decline, but we all can help in their survival by feeding them, making our gardens more hedgehog-friendly by not using pesticides or slug pellets, and making provision for them to move from garden to garden. Much emphasis was put on the fact that hedgehogs don't sunbathe so if you see one out during the day it may mean they are poorly, so a call to the Hedgehog Rescue centre is needed. Their telephone number can be found online under 'Hedgehog Rescue'.

The next meeting will be held on 10th March at 7.30pm in Mottisfont Village Hall, when the speaker will be Stephen Hackett, telling us about Horatio's Garden. Guests will be very welcome on this evening, and to come and share a cup of tea or coffee and a friendly chat.

Hall and The Royal British Legion, as well as the country market pop-up stall until 20th March.

The draft plans form a number of short, medium and long-term proposals covering the potential future of the area for the next ten years. The short-term goals include enhancing the passageways and access to green spaces, while the medium-term plans consist of a new green area along Broadwater Road that could make more of the River Test and potentially house new shops.

It would also improve the road layout and allow for more flexible transport options by forming a new bus station.

In the longer-term, the plans consider the possibility of a new site for the Aldi supermarket, the relocation of a new large community facility similar to the current Crosfield Hall but closer to Romsey Rapids, and a smaller venue within the town centre. This would help to meet the growing needs of the town, as well as cater for the provision of car parking, enabling residents to park just outside the town and walk in, using improved pathways and access routes.

Along with the developments, a number of accessibility improvements have also been suggested. New access points to Broadwater Road from the bypass have been proposed, alongside better pedestrian access from the area towards Romsey Rapids.

The first draft of the plan for the area has also taken into account the recommendations of the citizens' assembly which was held late last year. Around 50 residents, selected to represent the demographic makeup of the town, spent two weekends listening to experts and casting their votes on how best to maximise the area including the bus station and Crosfield Hall.

The main themes of the assembly included improving the night-time economy, and creating more green spaces and better transport connections, for vehicles and pedestrians.

Chair of Romsey Future and deputy leader of Test Valley Borough Council, Nick Adams-King, said: "At the beginning of the first stage of this consultation, I was clear that all ideas were welcome as this was a completely blank slate. Now, although we've had a considerable amount of input from residents and members of the citizens' assembly, we are still very keen to hear what the community thinks of the plans so far.

"There were many suggestions in the first stage of the consultation but hopefully it will be clear why these participants' proposals have been taken
