PCSO report

PCSO (Police Community Support Officer) Marie Stubbington has been in contact and asks us to mention the following:

"There have been a couple of incidents of criminal damage around 10th January to a network rail van parked in the station car park and a resident of Mill Rise had a ball bearing flung into a UPVC door causing a large hole within the door frame.

"We completed a letter drop to nearby houses and have been out and about in the area at night time, but can you please ask residents to remain vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour. Unfortunately there is little that can be done when persons are shooting catapults with ball bearings from a passing car when it's dark! It is extremely frustrating all round and causes such upset and worry. We are patrolling every evening that we are on duty and just ask that if anyone has seen or heard anything to report it to us with the crime reference number 44220014173."

National Trust

In wider works going on in the parish, our ranger team reports that we have

several contractors working across the estate this winter with a focus on tree safety management. This includes the felling of diseased ash trees close to roads, properties and busy footpaths. In some cases we are manging the potential risk by removing the crown of the trees but retaining a standing stem (monolith). This helps to reduce the risk of the tree failing, but retains a valuable habitat. Where conditions allow, we will protect natural regeneration, or plant suitable species to encourage the next generation of trees.

This winter will also see a continuation of our woodland restoration works in Spearywell Wood, focusing on thinning several soft wood areas to improve conditions for native broadleaf species. We anticipate that during these works our tracks and rides will sustain some damage; once works are complete will look to reinstate any tracks and assess opportunities for improving access.

Nature news

We have again spotted salmon redds on several of our chalk streams. A redd is the name given to the nest in which a salmon lays its eggs. Wild salmon in the UK are in rapid decline, so any sign of potential breeding is a positive, although exact numbers are unknown. With increased awareness and improvements to river management, hopefully the rivers across Mottisfont will continue to play their important part in this delicate life cycle.

Mottisfont Parish Pass Renewals 2022/23

Current parish passes expire on 28th February so now is the time to request an application form for our 2022/23 pass expiring 28th February 2023.

The Parish Pass is for everybody who lives in the parish of Mottisfont & Dunbridge, so you can enjoy Mottisfont mansion, gardens and estate whenever you want, for free, all year round.

Mottisfont tenants do not need to apply for a parish pass as they have free admission through the custodial system.

There are some terms and conditions to point out:

1. The pass is only for Mottisfont and cannot be used on any other National Trust property. For that, you will need to purchase National Trust Membership.

 You will need one pass for each member of the family who are five years and older during that year.
The pass is not transferable and only residents of Mottisfont & Dunbridge can use it.

4. Our Visitor Reception staff might ask for proof you are a resident in the parish.

5. You will need to re-apply each year and prove you are a resident.

6. The pass cannot be used in conjunction with any other offer and is subject to National Trust terms and conditions.

From the Rector

Dark times

February can be a dark time. Although the days are starting to draw out, the weather often gives little reason for cheer, and there are few signs of life in the world. The celebrations of Christmas and New Year seem long past, and yet the credit card bills now need to be paid.

In the life of the Church, our Christmas and Epiphany celebrations come to an end on the 2nd February on the feast of Candlemas, when we give thanks for the idea that Jesus Christ came, a light to brighten the whole world – that means all people.

Yet, for many people, this time of year can be particularly difficult, and is each year. Seasonal Affective Disorder affects many of us, and all sorts of people struggle with low mood at this time of year. I would like to be able to say that I could suggest a solution, but I cannot. Religion is not a means of addressing medical problems.

Our faith does however provide a framework in which we can understand joy and sorrow, hope and despair. It tells us of a God who created a world that was good, and created us to dwell in it. It tells us of a God who seeks us out when we fall, and who redeems us to overcome our failings. It tells us of a God who has shared in our humanity, who knows our pains and sorrows and who is alongside us in our despair.

I thought I had a good understanding of things relating to NT Mottisfont and the New Forest, but I had no idea how much the Countryside Team look after and manage, and how varied it is.

From the crystal clear river Test, through the Mottisfont wider estate including farms, the New Forest 4000 Acres, Stockbridge Marsh and Down, to the river Hamble, the team are responsible for ecology, conservation, restoration, wildlife such as trout, salmon, butterflies and sheep....!!!

Yes, that's right, we have 15 Wiltshire Horn sheep that graze our land to help keep scrub in check, maintain and improve grass which is hugely beneficial for the habitat and diversity of the Down and its wildlife.

We have a team of volunteers who twice a day check on the sheep's welfare 365 days a year, and update the team by email.

Having the pleasure of being given a guided tour of the greater Mottisfont estate by Dylan Everett, NT Countryside Manager (7 hour walk), having the history, demographics, environment and wildlife explained, along with the strategy, I started to get an understanding of the complexities, responsibility and privilege it is to help look after such a beautiful and special place.

My first offical task started on Tuesday 18th January when we welcomed back our fantastic Countryside Volunteers who unfortunately have been away for the last 18 months due to the pandemic.

Mike (NT Countryside Ranger) and I, along with volunteers, have started working at Mottisfont to enhance the wetland biodiversity potential of the duck grounds, through initiating scrub control to provide increased light levels and secure the historic geo-profile of the area, through the removal of deep rooted vegetation on the concentric spiral.

This work is essential to ensure we deliver the vegetative outcomes expected through the Mottisfont HLS (Higher Level Stewardship) agrienvironment scheme.

We will also be deconstructing the boardwalk in that area, and where possible we will reuse the material to repair, improve and support the signage, gates, boardwalks and furniture of the greater Mottisfont estate.

I look forward to meeting you when I am out and about. Please do stop me and say hello.

Do you know where to report scam messages?

From Action Fraud, via Neighbourhood Alert

Fake emails and text messages are a common tactic used by cyber criminals, whose goal is often to convince you to click a link. Once clicked, you may be sent to a dodgy website which could download viruses onto your computer, or steal your passwords and personal information.

In order to try to convince you that their messages are legitimate, criminals will pretend to be someone you trust, or from some organisation you trust. This could be your Internet Service Provider (ISP), local council, even a friend in need, and they may contact you by phone call, email or text message.

Reporting suspicious emails

If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, you can report it by forwarding the email to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service at: report@phishing.gov.uk.

As of 31st October 2021, the number of suspicious email reports stands at more than 8,100,000, with the removal of more than 67,000 scams and 124,000 URLs.

In a small number of cases, an email may not reach our service due to it already being widely recognised by spam detection services. The vast majority of reports do reach our system, so please keep reporting any suspicious emails you receive.

Reporting suspicious text messages

You can report suspicious text messages to your mobile network provider, free, by forwarding the text to 7726 (on a keypad with both numbers and letters,

this spells out "spam" - Eds).

If you forward a text, your provider can investigate the origin of the text and take action, if found to be malicious. If 7726 doesn't work, you can find out how to report a text message by contacting your provider.

(On many Android devices and iPhones, pressing and holding on the message bubble should present the option to forward the message.)
