the Ahlbergs exhibition

A family-friendly exhibition exploring

more. This is the first full retrospective of the Ahlbergs' work, and includes artworks that have never been shown publicly before. In the house...

A medieval seal matrix will be going on display in the Red Room from 29th July. The matrix – a carved mould used to make wax impressions to seal documents – lay buried in a Lockerly field for centuries until it was discovered in 2022 by a metal detectorist. Dated to between 1470 and 1520 and

made of cast copper-alloy, the seal, which measures 60mm x 40mm, is inscribed in Latin with "sigillu[m] officii prioris p[ri]oretas sce trinitat[is] de Motesfont", which translated means Seal of the Official of the Prior of the Priory of Mottisfont. It features a carved depiction of the Trinity and a figure of a praying cleric, likely representing Mottisfont's Prior or Abbot. It is most likely to have been used to authenticate indulgences, written pardons granted by religious institutions in return for a financial donation.

In the gardens...

Colourful herbaceous borders in the walled gardens provide changing displays until early autumn following peak rose season. Late and repeat-flowering roses continue to bloom, and richlyscented lavender attracts swathes of bees and butterflies.

Most of our old-fashioned roses only flower once a year, and afterwards produce ornamental fruit or hips, which, as well as brightening the garden in autumn, provide local birds with an important source of winter food. For this reason, our gardeners don't tend to deadhead these unique roses – which can be a surprise to some of our visitors.

Look out for 'parch marks' on the south lawn – dry spells reveal the footprints of Mottisfont's Medieval and Tudor buildings hidden beneath the grass.

BIRD SURVEY: CAN YOU HELP?

Swifts, Swallows and House Martins. Do you have any?

Hello, my name is Kurt Love and I am a countryside Ranger with the National Trust at Mottisfont.

I would be keen to hear of any nest sites of the above birds local to and around Mottisfont Estate.

Since joining Mottisfont I have noticed swallow and house martin nesting sites but have yet to discover any swifts nesting nearby. If you are aware of or even lucky enough to have swallows, swifts or house martins nesting on or near your property, then I would like to add them to our survey data records, to help monitor their numbers. I would be very grateful if you could help by contacting me through email about any known nesting sites. Or alternatively, you could add them directly to a survey record

monitoring app/website such as the RSPB's Swift Mapper.

These three species of birds can and do suffer from building works preventing them from accessing suitable and previous nesting places when they return to breed.

DOG WALKING ON NT PROPERTY

Whilst commercial dog walkers are not allowed to conduct their business on our land without permission and a licence from us – as it renders their insurance policies invalid – we are aware that sometimes they do.

We cannot be everywhere all the time to speak to any that may be using our woodlands, and we know that sometimes members of the public challenge them to ask if they have a right to be here. Whilst we applaud that people are being conscious of abuse of our woods by irresponsible walkers (those who let lots of dogs run out of control, chasing wildlife and not picking up poo), we also want to ensure our licensed dog walkers do not get subject to the sometimes angry accusations put to them that they are not allowed to be there.

Scenter Barks is currently the only company licenced to walk on our Mottisfont estate. They come with a special reference from the Test Valley dog warden to allow them to walk up to six dogs, and they stick to the rule of the licence beautifully. To this end, please do not ask or challenge any Scenter Barks dog walkers you come across in our car parks, as it rather ruins the walk for them as well. They usually come in vans marked with their business name, so should be easy to distinguish.

If you see groups of dogs being taken out of an unmarked van, we do not ask people to challenge them, as technically we have no way of proving that those animals do not all belong to that walker! It's a tricky thing to navigate and we have to ensure everyone is welcome to access our woodlands – but in a safe and appropriate way.

Any issues you may see with dogs out of control can also be reported to the Test Valley dog warden service on 01264 368463.

From the Rector

Time off

August is the start of what I think of as "the silly season". Children are off school, families are spending time together, there are fewer people in the office and it is impossible to get anything much done, as there will always be one person necessary to whatever you are trying to achieve who is on a beach somewhere hot.

This is a natural part of the cycle of being a human being. Following periods of hard work, the body and mind can benefit from the opportunity to rest, not worry and to heal. We each have our own preferred ways of relaxing, for some it is to travel, or engage in a particular activity; for others it is to go somewhere quiet, or even just take the phone off the hook!

Rest has deep biblical roots, being first instituted in the very first chapter of Genesis, where God is described as resting after his work in creation, and from which emerges the idea of weekly sabbath rest. Elijah is described as meeting God in the silence, and Jesus himself is described in the gospels as regularly "withdrawing from the crowd" in order to find quiet and space, that he might pray and find God.

In the early centuries of the Church, the idea of retreat or the aesthetic life was exemplified by characters such as John the Baptist, or Anthony of Egypt, and some of the other "Dessert Fathers" who pioneered the practice of silent isolation in order to discover the divine, and eventually gave rise to monasticism and the religious life.

People often ask me if I will be going away, or having time off in the summer. To be honest I have no plans, but will be trying to create some space, some silence and some peace. Whatever you like to do with your summer break, I urge you to find some sort of rest, and in it be open to the idea it may provide an opportunity to meet with God.



Well, the ladies of M&D W.I. have certainly had a busy summer so far

INSPIRING WOMEN June started with a visit by some members to Bishops Waltham. It

was a glorious evening and we took part in a Quiz Walk around the town, which was great fun. Several local residents were most intrigued to know what all these ladies wandering around their streets with pens and clipboards were up to! Although we didn't win, it was a pretty close call. This was followed by a good ploughman's supper in a church hall nearby, and a chance to meet members of other WIs throughout the county.

At our meeting in June we welcomed two ladies who help to organise the Romsey Food Bank. This opened in 2016 in a container loaned by Bradbeers. It is now part of the Freedom Church in Budd's Lane, and is part of the Trussell Trust. All the food is donated, and those needing to take advantage are often referred by schools, Social Services or workers in the Health System. There are also opportunities for advice on life skills, such as cooking and budgeting. Our WI supports the Food Bank by donating items every month.

Then at the very end of June a large number of members spent a lovely evening in the beautiful garden of Mrs. Clutterbuck. Here we could wander along the river bank, admire the colourful herbaceous also from the

borders, and compare the vegetables in the walled garden with our own! We then sat on the terrace enjoying glasses of wine and nibbles kindly provided by our committee.

The speaker in July was Sarah Delves, an antiques dealer and lecturer at the V and A museum. Usually her talks are hilarious, but this one on 'Fashion and Sustainability' was on a more sober note, although we still managed to have a laugh or two! We were told how the fashion industry is second only to oil production in polluting our planet. The global apparel market is worth 1.5 trillion dollars; it is responsible for slave labour and child exploitation in third world countries, and by 2050, unless things change rapidly, there will be more plastic than fish in our oceans. Some of us felt that we ought never to buy another new item of clothing, and to search the charity shops or eBay instead.

Finally in July, a large group of members visited Lyburn Farm at Hamptworth, where we spent a very exciting evening sitting on straw bales in a trailer behind an enormous tractor. We had a bumpy but enjoyable ride through the fields of organic vegetables, which all looked superb, and through a herd of curious black and white cows who must have wondered why we were disturbing their peace. The farmer, Mike Smales, gave us a potted history of the farming activities on his farm and the difficulties which farmers endure, not only from the weather, but also from the

Lengthsman

Mottisfont Parish is covered by the Parish Lengthsman Scheme in Hampshire County Council's Test Valley Central electoral division. A Parish Lengthsman's role includes jobs such as cleaning village and street nameplates, and clearing vegetation from roadside footways and other highway infrastructure such as ditch grips, usually within 30mph and 40mph speed limits.

Our lengthsman has been asked to cut back vegetation along the roadside footway north of the station, and on the footway adjacent to the former station goods yard.

Unfortunately, the Parish Lengthsman has been poorly recently, so planned work has been delayed. All being well, this work will be done soon along with other tasks requested, including strimming verges along Hatt Lane.

The RSPB recommends avoiding hedge cutting during the main breeding season for nesting birds (typically March to August). A careful inspection of the hedge for any active nests should always be done prior to cutting. If you are sure that there are no active nests, the hedge can be cut during the breeding season.

The RSPB web site has a page titled "Hedge trimming and cutting - the law" (the URL is quite long, so just search for "RSPB hedge cutting" or similar to find it).
