In the gallery...

Happy Families: Adventures with the Ahlbergs exhibition, until 5th November, 11am-4.30pm (closing at 4pm from 30th October, last entry 30 minutes before closing)

A family-friendly exhibition exploring the much-loved children's books created by Allan and Janet Ahlberg, featuring original artwork from The Jolly Postman, Happy Families, Funnybones and more. This is the first full retrospective of the Ahlbergs' work and includes artworks that have never been shown publicly before. Over 70 original illustrations and text from the books are displayed in family-friendly ways, and big, bold wall displays provide photo opportunities with colourful backdrops and favourite characters. Outside, the Beech Circle has been transformed into an outdoor garden gallery with illustrations from Each Peach Pear Plum.

For families...

Adventures with the Ahlbergs autumn trail: Funnybones, until 5th November, 10am-5pm (closing at 4pm from 30th October, last entry 30 minutes before closing)

Pick up a skeleton mask to begin your Funnybonesinspired adventure around the grounds. Take part in 'eerie exercises' and guess what's inside our trick or treat boxes. Shuffle bones to create creatures and craft your own dog skeleton to take home.

Property admission applies (free entry for National Trust members and under 5s), plus £3 per trail.

In the house ...

It's your last chance to see our medieval seal matrix on display this year, before we close the house to decorate for Christmas. The matrix – a carved mould used to make wax impressions to seal documents – lay buried in a Lockerley field for centuries until it was discovered in 2022 by a metal detectorist. Dated to between 1470 and 1520 and made of cast copper-alloy, the seal, which measures 60mm x 40mm, is inscribed in Latin with "sigillu[m] officii prioris p[ri]oretas sce trinitat[is] de Motesfont", which translated means Seal of the Official of the Prior of the Priory of Mottisfont. It features a carved depiction of the Trinity and a figure of a praying cleric, likely representing Mottisfont's Prior or Abbot. It is most likely to have been used to authenticate "indulgences" - written pardons granted by religious institutions in return for a financial donation.

In the gardens...

Our gardens are vibrant with autumn colour in October and November. The stately trees which frame our house and grounds are resplendent in shades of red, orange and gold, while the river reveals shimmering reflections of the overhead canopy. The great plane provides a dazzling display as you enter the grounds, and the chestnut trees lining the upper half of our main pathway glow with yellow-orange leaves. Two tulip trees also come into their own during this season, as their acid green summer foliage turns a magnificent pale gold. Families can help with our harvest, gathering leaves to supply our home-grown compost.

Planning for Christmas... A Christmas Journey to the North Pole

From Rev Dr John Rennie

We know little about persecution for our faith in the UK. The Romsey deanery, of which we are part, has been linked to a diocese in south western Uganda for many years (South Rwenzori). There they become accustomed to churches and schools being burnt and whole families being displaced by the incursion of aggressive Islamic militias across the nearby border with the Democratic Republic of Congo.

In the UK most Christians agree that the culture around us is becoming more and more hostile to our faith, even though not on the scale experienced in East Africa. Just this last month in the UK we have had people arrested for praying outside abortion clinics, others sacked from their jobs for articulating Christian views on sexual ethics or some whose bank accounts have been cancelled because of their beliefs.

How should we respond? We might want to fight back to demand fair and equal treatment. Alternatively we might want to engage with those who challenge our traditional viewpoint. But there are those who decide not to engage at all, preferring instead to turn the other cheek. Their argument follows that they would rather be known for what they stand for, than what they are against.

Writing in *Finding hope in a hostile world*, Glen Shrivener uses the story of Abraham to make a point. The patriarch Abraham usually stayed out of wars that were going on around him and instead used his energy and influence to build his household of faith. Just once he made an attempt at an alliance with a foreign king (Genesis 14).

Perhaps this is a guide for us especially if we are not adequately informed about controversial issues. Many Church leaders believe our role is to spread the good news of Jesus so that our culture is transformed by loving, praying Christians empowered by the Holy Spirit. The great social reforms of the 19th century came on the back of revivals in the Church. Rather than trying to create or even to recapture a Christian culture, we should concentrate on building up people who are committed to the Lord Jesus and who wish to live for him.


Save on bills, protect the environment

Set in Paris, a young widowed mother, Sandra (Léa Seydoux) is faced with juggling her job as a translator as well as having twin responsibilities for a growing daughter and an ailing father. A beautifully acted story exploring life's messy, complicated business, filled with moments of insight, great charm and haunting tenderness. [In French with English subtitles]

For documentary-maker and dating app addict Zoe (Lily James), swiping right has only delivered an endless stream of Mr. Wrongs, to her eccentric mother Cath's (Emma Thompson) dismay. For Zoe's childhood friend and neighbour Kaz (Shazad Latif), the answer is to follow his parents' example and opt for an arranged marriage to a bright and beautiful bride from Pakistan. As Zoe films his hopeful journey from London to Lahore to marry a stranger, chosen by his parents, she begins to wonder if she might have something to learn from a profoundly different approach to finding love.

In August members (and some friends) met for a Craft Evening, led by Sophie Baker. Sophie demonstrated how to make a variety of items, including paper flowers, small boxes, paper trees

and some felted items. All the materials were provided, and after the demonstrations it was our turn!

Some people, of course are naturally gifted in such matters, whilst some of us are not! However, amidst great hilarity and some frustration, most of us managed to produce something (although perhaps it didn't quite match our expectations!). However, our teacher was very patient, and we were mostly pleased with our results.

Plans for the White Elephant stall at the upcoming Village Fete were finalised, (which, incidentally, was very successful) and a healthy bank balance was announced.

September brought something quite different. Jeremy Prescott, an ex-army officer, brought us the story of the poppy, "The Miracle Flower - from Flanders to the Tower". He told us how the poppy has become the flower of remembrance, following a poem written by Canadian physician John McCrae published in 1915. He also told of how silk poppies were first sold at a conference in America, and how a French woman was inspired to employ widows and children of those service men killed in WW1 to make poppies for sale.

Major General Houston later bought a disused factory in Richmond and began to employ disabled war veterans to make the poppies, and so Poppies for Remembrance began.

In 2014, 890,000 poppies were planted in the moat of the Tower of London. This display was visited by over 5 million visitors, and later moved to other venues across the country. These poppies were subsequently sold, and raised £9.5 million pounds for the charity.

Jeremy emphasised how important it is that today's generation are made aware of the huge sacrifice made by all those who died or were disabled, both physically and mentally, by the horrors of war.

In October, some members will be going to a production of Little Women at the Plaza Theatre, whilst in November, others will be forming a skittles team for a competition at the Mill Arms.

The speaker on 10th October will be Stephen Beal, who will talk about "Hearing Dogs for the Deaf". If you feel you would like to know more, do come along to the Village Hall at 7.30pm. Visitors are always very welcome.

MOTTISFONT PARISH COUNCIL

REPRESENT YOUR COMMUNITY

Mottisfont Parish Council is allowed to have six councillors but currently has vacancies. Being a member of parish and town councils is about listening to local concerns and getting things done on behalf of the community, often with the help of our Borough and County councillors who have access to funding. There is guite a lot going on at the moment that will take up most of our existing parish council capacity, including the potential Dunbridge housing development reported below, and planning for emergencies – with winter approaching, think about how we would cope if torrential rainfall cut off parts of the parish. So we need more capacity to take forward projects that are already on the parish's to-do list, but also to involve more people in representing the community and suggesting new initiatives.

If you would like to be a parish councillor, drop a line to the parish council clerk via the website at mottisfontpc.org.uk/pc/pc.php a few sentences about why you should like to be involved and what you would bring to the role. Or if you just want to put forward an idea, suggest a project or just offer a view, please do that too and come to one of our meetings (dates of meeting are in the calendar at www.mottisfontpc.org.uk).

We are aware that some people would be happy to become involved but don't necessarily want the commitment of being a full councillor, so we will also be offering something called associate status which enables residents to become involved and promote particular initiatives but in a less formal way. Let us know if you are interested.

MOTTISFONT AND DUNBRIDGE STATION GOODS YARD

You may be aware of longstanding proposals to develop the old station goods vard for housing. The landowners were unable to secure planning permission, and they put the land up for sale some months ago. The latest position is that Orchard Homes of Southampton has agreed terms with them, and we now have confirmation that Orchard is starting on the process of bringing forward a small housing scheme. The company's development team is continuing with survey work to establish the site's constraints which include for example, flood risk, site access and noise attenuation - and these will determine questions like how many homes can be built on the site, their layout, and to some extent, their design.

The proposal for housing will be brought forward under a Test Valley Borough Council planning policy known as "community-led development". This means that our community must be consulted



to establish support for the proposed redevelopment, and the parish council will consequently work with the developer and local residents to consider how the site could best be developed for housing. Precisely how the consultation will work has yet to be finalised but details will be published in the Acorn, updates will be circulated on the parish WhatsApp group, and there will be an exhibition of the proposals which you as a resident will be encouraged to attend and to give your feedback. Depending on the progress of survey work, consultation could commence later in the autumn. The final decision on a planning application will be taken by TVBC.
