


### **MEET THE NEIGHBOURS**




### Local author, David Stone, has announced the publication of his first novel.

### In Honour of John Rolfe (A Few Words Written by Tracy Sheppard - Nee Holmes)

Born at Spearywell Farmhouse in 1935, he lived at No 5 Spearywell, Yew Tree Cottage and then Newlyns Farm, John Rolfe (JR) was Mottisfont through and through.

I can't recall the first time I met John, I just know he and his family have always been part of our lives. My Great Aunt Mada tells me that she can remember the first time John and my Great Uncle Billy rode up to Scotland on motorbikes for a visit and John was 16. He and my father (Rob Holmes) have been the best of friends since dad was young - a long time ago!! I remember being at my grandparents, the house I now live in at Spearywell and conversations would often begin with 'You won't believe what JR has done now!' or more often than not 'Speak to JR, he'll sort it'. That's what he did, sorted things for whoever needed them sorted at the time. He was hard working and out from the crack of dawn until late at night in his tractor, feeding cattle or later in life flailing the hedgerows. Always looking for the next deal to be had but not always doing things 'by the book'; a bit like the Mottisfont version of Delboy Trotter. He loved whole heartedly and spoke his mind freely whether you wanted to hear it or not.

It has been an absolute pleasure to spend one on one time with him these past few months at Greenview and then Fleming House. During those weekly visits we have discussed past events and laughed about his past escapades. John talked about my family and his, and also about my great grandparents on my granddads side whom I had never met but John had.

John knew everyone and I know that he will be missed by all who knew him.

Whilst reunited with his son Paul, he leaves behind his 2 daughters; Julie and Maria, his grandchildren Matthew, Daniel, Ava and Paul and his great grandchildren.

For all those who would like to join us, there will be celebration of his life at Test Valley Crematorium 14.30 Friday 5th December. There are a few tractors forming a convoy to lead John on his final journey out of the village. If you have a tractor and would like to be part of the convoy please let me or Matthew know.

### **News from the WI**

In October, nutrition expert and dietician Natasha Beatty talked to us about 'Eating for our Health'.

We were advised to read carefully the details on the packaging of our foods before adding them to our shopping trolleys. Who knew, for instance, how much sugar is in a single savoury biscuit, or a portion of bran flakes? A diet high in protein but low in carbohydrates is the aim. Myths were also dispelled; fats are not the enemy we once believed, as long as they are natural and not processed. Full fat yogurt is better for us than the low fat variety, and eggs, whatever a certain female politician once led us to believe, are a wonder food - so be sure they are on your shopping list! We all went home determined to take our reading glasses with us when we next visit the supermarket.

In November our visiting speaker was Peter Ashburn, joint chairperson of the Wessex Orchid Society, who told us many fascinating facts about this seemingly rare plant. However, amazingly, orchids are not rare at all. Indeed, they are the second most common flower in the world, with over 28,000 species world wide and 1 in 12 wild flowers is an orchid. Global warming means that their numbers are increasing rapidly, and in Britain there are 55 native species, although the British only discovered them some 200 years ago, when Joseph Banks, who sailed with James Cook, brought some plants home. The Victorians developed Orchid Mania and tried to impress their friends with their collections. The orchids which we now display in our homes are all hybrids, totally dependant upon fungi for germination. We were given several tips on how to keep our orchids at their best and perhaps some of us might be adding a new plant or two to our Christmas wish lists!

Thinking of Christmas, several members are planning to see 'It's a Wonderful Life ' at the Plaza in early December and even more will partake of our Christmas meal at the Wheatsheaf in Braishfield. But before that, on 9th December, we will welcome Richard Light, with a wine and spirit tasting evening to get us in the party mood. Who said the WI was 'all jam and Jerusalem?'

The Royal Scottish National Orchestra provides the sumptuous musical backdrop, with innovative choreography creating magical cinematic moments.

Life seems easy for picture-perfect couple Ivy (Olivia Colman) and Theo (Benedict Cumberbatch): successful careers, a loving marriage, great kids. But beneath the façade of their supposed ideal life, a storm is brewing – as Theo's career nosedives while Ivy's own ambitions take off, a tinderbox of fierce competition and hidden resentment ignites.
