Food waste caddies begin delivery across Test Valley

Each standard household should have now received a five-litre kitchen caddy, a 23-litre kerbside caddy, one roll of caddy liners, and an information leaflet explaining how the new food waste collection service works.

For households that share bins, deliveries included a 140-litre grey-lidded food waste wheeled bin for the bin store, rather than a kerbside caddy.

Residents are being reminded to store their caddy liners in a dry place and keep the information leaflet safe for future reference.

The new food waste collection service will officially begin on Monday 13 October 2025, so the caddies should not be used until week commencing 6 October.

Residents will also soon receive postcards telling them what day their food waste will be collected.

The service aims to reduce the amount of food waste sent to landfill and increase recycling rates across the borough. Food waste will be collected weekly and taken to an anaerobic digestion facility, where it will be turned into renewable energy and nutrient-rich fertiliser.

The Environment Act requires all councils to have food waste collections in place by 1 April 2026.

Courier Fraud Advice #PreventCrime

Officers are asking people to stay vigilant to possible fraudulent phone calls wherein criminals are targetting potential victims by cold calling them and pretending to be police officers, a bank or another law enforcement authority.

The caller will explain that they need help in a secret investigation and will ask the victim to provide their PIN and credit card details, or to attend their bank and withdraw cash. The bank cards or cash are later collected from their

home address. Often, the victim will be given a 'password' to exchange with the courier, to make them believe this is a legitimate transaction. You may be asked to call your bank, or 101 or 999 to verify an officer's identity. This convinces you that the call is genuine, but the scammer has kept the line open, so when you make the call, you are unknowingly connected straight back to them. If you

straight back to them. If you receive a call like this, please wait 15 minutes after hanging up before calling the police or your bank, or use a different phone, to ensure that the line is no longer open.

The History of The Acorn

Some time back there was a request on the Mottisfont web site, for older than October 2006 editions of the Acorn.



Well, during a clear out, one of our neighbours has come across nearly all of the editions from Volume 1, edition No 4 (April 1996) up to Volume 5, No 12 (December 2000).

At the beginning The Acorn was an A5 publication called the 'Mottisfont Acorn' and was produced by the Education Department of HM Winchester Prison (no doubt providing the inmates some useful tips on how to produce authentic looking £10 notes in the process!). This came about because one of our residents, John Crumbie (who lived at Station House), was a prison warder at that time and coordinated the production in those early years. In fact, without the help of the prison, there would never have been an 'Acorn', as the original church newsletter 'The Mottisfont News', was about to cease due to the cost of printing it.

The prison continued to print The Acorn until late 1999 and the name was changed to 'Mottisfont & Dunbridge Acorn' in January 2000, to better reflect the community that it served.

Peter has kindly agreed to scan the old issues and put them up on the Mottisfont web site - Has any-one any earlier issues or any from between 2000 and 2006 hiding away anywhere?

Mottisfont Cricket Team News

Plenty to celebrate at Mottisfont Cricket Club after all three teams bounce back from last year's adversity.

Starting with the Indoor Team, who in March completed the winter season with an unbeaten record, winning the league and promotion to Southampton Indoor League Division Three. We finished with the leagues top batsman award, captain Matt Stroud, and best bowler, Billy Allan, with two other bowlers in the top ten Jon Perret & Daryl Lawrence. Last year the team won just one game but are now looking to field two teams for the coming season.

News from the WI



At our August meeting we welcomed Blue Badge guide James Fernandes,

whose topic - 'Red' - had us all guessing. He cleverly examined things in Hampshire which had a red connection. Items covered included the amazing trade in strawberries which were grown in great numbers around the villages of Swanwick and Bursledon and transported by train to Covent Garden market for many years until, in the 1960s, foreign imports killed the trade. He also covered the red bricks made at brickworks in Fareham, six million of which were used to build the Royal Albert Hall, red post boxes and their royal cyphers, red telephone boxes, red squirrels and the red deer of the New Forest. A fascinating evening indeed. We plan to do one of his guided walks around Southampton or Salisbury in the Spring.

In September, Richard Murphy encouraged us all to think about 'The Good News'. A conversation with his motherin-law in which she maintained that life was better a century ago, made him think of all the things which had actually improved during the last hundred years. He cited the health of small children and their mothers, which has improved world-wide. Deaths from disease had also dramatically declined, due to the benefits of immunisation and vaccination. Last Chance to see Gilbert's Dahlia Field



Visitors to Sherfield English are once again being treated to a breathtaking display of colour as Gilberts Nursery opens its much-loved Dahlia field for the season.

Nick, who runs the nursery, is always experimenting with creating new varieties. Using a careful process of "hand-brushing" the flowers with a paintbrush before covering them to prevent cross-pollination, he plays the role of the bees. "It's really exciting, because you never know what you're going to get," he explains. "When the first flower blooms, I usually grow that plant true for three years to make sure it doesn't change shape or colour. Then comes the hardest part—choosing a name!"

The nursery has also felt the impact of climate change. "Eighteen years ago, we used to open the field at the beginning of July. Now, it's August, and each year it gets later," Nick notes.

The Dahlia field is free for visitors, something Nick feels passionate about. "I just want people to come in and enjoy the space," he says.

But the field is more than just a visual delight—it also supports an important local cause. Nick has long been a supporter of ROMDAG (Romsey Dementia Action Group), a charity close to his heart after seeing family members affected by dementia. Donation buckets are placed at the entrance, giving visitors the chance to contribute. In 2024, a remarkable £1,254.40 was raised.

For those looking for a moment of peace, beauty, and community spirit, Gilberts Nursery's Dahlia field is the perfect place to visit before the 8th October 2025.
