MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON 19th MAY 2022, 7.30PM, AT MOTTISFONT VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr J Channing (Chairman), Cllr Mrs J Barnett (vice chairman) Cllr P Barnett, Cllr J Millns, Cllr A Simmonds & Cllr G Jenkins.

In attendance: Hampshire Cllr David Drew

Apologies for Absence

1) Apologies for absence were received from Cllr Johnston TVBC, and Heather Bourner – Clerk.

Election of Chairman

2) Cllr Millns took the chair. Cllr P Barnett nominated Cllr Channing to be Chairman for the forthcoming year and this was seconded by Cllr Simmonds. All agreed and Cllr Channing signed an acceptance of office form.

Election of Vice Chairman

3) Cllr Simmonds nominated Cllr Mrs J Barnett to be Vice Chairman for the forthcoming year. This was seconded by Cllr Jenkins. All agreed and Cllr Mrs J Barnett signed an acceptance of office form.

Review and agree standing orders, financial regulations & code of conduct

4) All documents had been circulated to Councillors prior to the meeting. These were all based on NALC model documents and the Clerk had confirmed no amendments had been published. All documents were re-adopted for 2022-23.

All Councillors confirmed there were no revisions required to Register of Interest forms.

Report from PCSO Stubbington

5) PCSO Marie Stubbington summarised local crime figures over the past year and last three months. There had been a number of burglaries from sheds, an ASB incident, break-ins at car parks and recently, thefts of car catalytic converters. She encouraged people with hybrid cars to park where there was surveillance from CCTV. She confirmed she holds regular beat surgeries in various locations around her area and PCSOs were very happy to attend events such as village fetes. She encouraged people to report non-emergency incidents on the Hampshire Police website or Crimestoppers or to dial 101. These reports added to Police intelligence about an area.

Report from National Trust

6) No representative of the National Trust was present.

Public Participation

7) No matters were raised by the members of public present.

Declarations of Interest

8) There were no declarations of interests.

Planning

9) The following decisions by TVBC were noted: 20/02493/TREES, tree works Mottisfont Abbey - No objection 22//00177/LBWS-replacement of modern windows and removal of modern paint finishes internally to oak frame - consent

Resolved: that the planning decisions on the following applications were endorsed: 22/00845/FULLS-roof conversion and boundary fence replace with wall - no objections 22/01197/FULLS-replace garden room and double doors - Spearywell Lodge- no objections

The following planning decision was opposed:

22/01173/FULLS-installation 5 bay garage, Oakley. The parish council felt this was a large development out of scale with its surroundings. Councillors were aware of other 'garages' or 'stores' constructed in the parish that have subsequently been used for residential accommodation and, given that a 4-bay coach house already existed, queried the use to which the new building would be put now or in the future. It was therefore resolved to oppose this application.

County Councillor's Report -

10) HCC Cllr David Drew had provided a report which is at appendix 1. He also reported that Cllr Rob Humby had been elected as Leader of the County Council. He said that potholes should be reported on the Hampshire website and he would follow up if necessary if he was given the report reference number. In reply to a question about footpaths and stiles, Cllr Drew said he would contact the relevant officer in the Countryside team and ask them to contact Cllrs J and P Barnett.

Minutes

11) **Resolved**: The minutes of the meeting held on 17th February 2022 were agreed unanimously as a correct record. These were signed by the Chairman.

Request for funding from Village Hall Management Committee

12) Cllr Channing confirmed that the village hall committee had made a request for funding to partially replace the patio area at the village hall. He said that the Responsible Finance Officer had advised that it would be unusual for the parish council to grant-aid another body with a bank balance well in excess of the parish council's own resources. These were reported to be reserves held against future maintenance liabilities. There was also some discussion of the need for, and cost of the proposed works. If the parish council let the contract, then VAT would not be payable. A decision was deferred until the position in relation to the application for grant from the National Lottery Fund was known.

Road repairs, potholes, road signs & Lengthsman tasks

13) Cllr Simmonds reported that work to repair the road surface at Dunbridge level crossing was now being contracted. He said that Hatt Lane had been reclassified as a private road as opposed to a closed highway and he would be following this up. As part of a programme being agreed with HCC, speed limits would be painted in roundels on the B3084, damaged signs would be replaced and he was hopeful that signs would be erected advising HGV drivers to use the A3057 and not to seek alternative routes through Kimbridge and Dunbridge.

Kissing Gates

14) Cllr P Barnett had circulated a comprehensive report about registered footpaths in the parish along with details of stiles and gates and suggestions as to which of these needed improvement. These details had now been sent to the National Trust as some footpaths cross their land, and to the HCC Countryside access team to establish how they might encourage improvements to be made to footpaths for which other landowners are responsible. There had been no feedback from Hampshire and this had been raised with Cllr Drew under item 10. Cllr Barnett would contact the National Trust again.

15) Clerk's Report

The Chairman presented the Clerk's report in her absence as follows:

The Clerk had spoken to the Chairman to confirm that the year-end accounts and audit return had been completed. The Chairman will arrange to sign the return before it is submitted. It was resolved to authorise the Clerk to submit the accounts.

The Clerk had also confirmed the insurance renewal notice had been received. Details had been circulated. The annual premium was £631.70. The Chairman explained that because the renewal notice had been sent close to the renewal date of 1st June 2022, the Clerk had no opportunity to seek alternative quotes. The Clerk will review the insurance early in 2023 and seek comparative quotes. Renewal of the insurance was agreed.

The owners of the property had one reserved parking space. Cllr Simmonds would follow up with the Rail Partnership and Network Rail.

- offers advice on state benefits and planning for the future
- facilitates local carer support groups across Hampshire.

Primary school place offers confirmed by Hampshire County Council

The County Council has processed more than 21,000 applications (21,288) for children to start school in reception year (Year R) and to move from infant to their first year of junior education (Year 3).

Just over 98 per cent (98.31 per cent) of parents have been offered a reception year place for their child in one of their three preferred choice schools, with more than 93 per cent (93.25 per cent) allocated a place at their first choice of school.
